



 "9) The minimum *lot area* in a P-2Q zone shall be 930 m²" after the words
 "8) The minimum *lot area* in a P-2O zone shall be 0.5 ha"
 - c. Adding the words "P-2Q" to the list of zones in the heading in Section 802
 - d. Adding in Section 802.1 the words "7) supportive housing (defined as supportive by the Province of BC) subject to Section 802.2"
 - e. Adding as Section 802.2 "16) In the P-2Q zone, a maximum 49 units of supportive housing (defined as supportive by the Province of BC) shall be permitted."



BACKGROUND/HISTORY:

The subject site is designated "Regional Commercial" in the Willowbrook Community Plan, and is currently zoned Community Commercial Zone C-2. A Development Permit was approved in June 2005 to permit a 2,378 m² (25, 594 ft²) hotel development on the site. The hotel use on the property ceased following the purchase of the site by the Provincial Rental Housing Corporation.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

BC Housing (on behalf of Provincial Rental Housing Corporation) has applied to amend the property's designation in the Willowbrook Community Plan from "Regional Commercial" to "Institutional", and to rezone the site to a new Community Care Facility Zone P-2Q to facilitate the conversion of a former hotel at 6465 – 201 Street to 49 units of supportive housing.

The proposed supportive housing facility will include programming space along with offices for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness. The ICM team's role is to provide health and social services by focusing on client engagement, housing stability and brokering services, which includes provision of and access to health care. The applicant has indicated that ICM works with clients to create a plan to improve and stabilize their lives. Clients are engaged through a multi-disciplinary team (consisting of clinicians / case managers, nurses, nurse practitioners, addiction specialists, psychiatrists, housing specialists and peer support workers) and services tailored to the needs of clients.

The applicant has identified the Stepping Stone Community Services Society (SSCSS) as the operator of the facility, which will in turn provide support services and programming for residents. SSCSS is a non-profit organization dedicated to improving quality of life for individuals and families living with mental health issues, homelessness or risk of homelessness. SSCSS provides services to the Township of Langley, City of Langley and surrounding areas, assisting with the integration of individuals into the community through social, housing and employment opportunities.

The existing property contains a former hotel building (currently unoccupied) and surface parking areas. The southwestern portion (approximately half of the site) between the existing building and 200 Street contains a red-coded watercourse (Logan Creek) in a treed non-disturbance area (protected via covenant at the time the site was originally rezoned and developed). Surrounding land uses include:

North: A commercial property zoned Regional Commercial Zone C-1 containing the

Home Depot, designated Commercial in the Willowbrook Community Plan;

South: Two commercial properties containing a variety of businesses zoned Community

Commercial Zone C-2 designated Commercial in the Willowbrook Community

Plan;

East: A parking lot for the Home Depot store zoned Regional Commercial Zone C-1,

designated Commercial in the Willowbrook Community Plan, beyond which is

201 Street;

West: 200 Street, beyond which are two townhouse complexes zoned Comprehensive

Development Zone CD-1, designated as Multifamily 2 in the Willowbrook

Community Plan.

Planning Considerations:

In 2013, Township Council endorsed the *Housing Action Plan* to guide decision-making related to market and non-market housing. The Plan states:

[The] Township has little transitional and affordable supportive housing for special need groups, including youth-at risk of becoming homeless, low fixed income seniors and mental health clients. Service providers working with at-risk clients who qualify for rent supplements indicate that it is very difficult to find market rental housing as there is very little turnover in the existing supply.

Accordingly, the *Housing Action Plan* acknowledges the lack of housing for people with special needs in the Township and provides policy support for the proposed facility.

In 2016, Council endorsed the *Metro Vancouver Regional Affordable Housing Strategy* as a collaborative approach to addressing regional housing needs. The regional strategy included a number of recommended actions for Metro Vancouver, its member municipalities and other stakeholders. The strategy identifies five goals:

- 1. Expand the supply and diversity of housing to meet a variety of needs,
- 2. Expand the rental supply and balance preservation of existing stock with redevelopment while supporting existing tenants,

- 3. Meet housing demand estimates for very low and low income earners,
- 4. Increase the rental housing supply along the Frequent Transit Network, and
- 5. End homelessness in the region.

The strategy states that municipalities will consider through plans, policies and programs in support of Goal 5: End Homelessness in the Region (Section 5.i, j &k):

- i. Ensuring that housing action plans and or homeless plans include specific actions to be taken to facilitate partnerships to address homelessness
- j. Working with non-profit housing providers and private landlords to facilitate housing options for people who are homeless
- k. Supporting agencies that serve the needs of homeless population in the community

The Provincial Rental Housing Corporation proposal is consistent with the strategy, as the proposed housing project will aid in reducing homelessness in the region.

Official Community Plan

Section 3 (Social and Cultural Policies) of the Township's Official Community Plan lists in Section 3.1 (Housing) the following objectives:

- provide tools and incentives to encourage affordable housing options, including rental, social, and emergency housing, for all who need them
- ensure each community provides a diverse range of housing types, tenures, densities, and sizes to meet the needs of the population
- address the scope of special-needs housing in the community

Section 3.1 also includes the following policies:

- Policy 3.1.10 Allow the distribution of special needs or supportive housing in all neighbourhoods and in the majority of zoning districts. Develop partnerships with community groups and other agencies to increase the availability of well-managed, supportive and transitional housing for special needs groups."
- Policy 3.1.11 Collaborate with and support non-profit agencies that provide short-term emergency and transitional shelter, food, and access to social services for those in need."

The Provincial Rental Housing Corporation proposal is consistent with the housing objectives and policies outlined in the Township's Official Community Plan.

Willowbrook Community Plan Amendment

The subject site is currently designated as "Regional Commercial" in the Willowbrook Community Plan. Bylaw No. 5391 proposes to change the designation of the site to "Institutional". As the subject application is consistent with Official Community Plan policies, staff are supportive of the redesignation.

Proposed Zoning Bylaw Amendment:

Rezoning Bylaw No. 5392 proposes to add Community Care Facility Zone P-2Q to the existing Community Care Facility zones to facilitate the proposed conversion of the former hotel site to accommodate 49 units of supportive housing.

Official Community Plan Consultation Policy:

Council's Official Community Plan Consultation Policy requires Council to consider the OCP amendment in conjunction with the financial plan and any applicable waste management plan. Staff recommend that Council consider the proposed OCP amendment consistent with the Township's financial plans (both operating and capital) and Metro Vancouver's waste management plans as the plans anticipate development in the Willoughby Community Plan area.

Public Information Meeting

As per Policy No. 07-164, the applicant held a public information meeting on October 3, 2016. Results of the Developer Held Public Information Meeting were compiled and are provided in Attachment A.

The applicant subsequently conducted supplementary voluntary meetings in the form of small-group Community Dialogue sessions held on May 15, 17, 25 and 26 in addition to a Community Open House and Dialogue held on May 28, 2018. Results of the additional meetings were complied and are provided in Attachment B.

Servicing:

Full urban services exist to the subject site.

Intergovernmental Implications:

As the subject site is located within 800 m of a controlled access highway (Highway 10), approval of the rezoning bylaw by the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is required prior to Council's consideration of final reading.

Environmental Considerations:

The Township's Sustainability Charter includes environmental objectives to protect and enhance rivers, streams, wildlife habitat and environmentally sensitive areas in the Township. These environmental objectives are supported by policy and guidance outlined in the Township's Environmentally Sensitive Areas Study, Wildlife Habitat Conservation Strategy, Schedule 3 of the Township's Official Community Plan, Erosion and Sediment Control Bylaw, and Subdivision and Development Servicing Bylaw (Schedule I – Tree Protection) which promote sound environmental management practices and outline Township environmental performance expectations. The provision of stormwater management and sediment control measures, and compliance with the Township's Subdivision and Development Servicing Bylaw (Schedule I – Tree Protection) satisfies the objectives of the Sustainability Charter. A red coded watercourse (Logan Creek) is located between the existing building and 200 Street in the southwestern portion of the site. In conjunction with the original rezoning of the site, the watercourse was protected by registration of a restrictive covenant with respect to setbacks, non-disturbance areas and environmental protection measures.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS:

The Provincial Rental Housing Corporation proposal is consistent with the Township's Official Community Plan, which encourages the distribution of supportive housing in all neighbourhoods and in the majority of zoning districts. The proposed conversion of the former Quality Inn site to accommodate a supportive housing facility is also consistent with the Township's Housing Action Plan and Metro Vancouver's Regional Affordable Housing Strategy. Accordingly, staff recommend that Council give first and second reading to Bylaw Nos. 5391 and 5392 (subject to the one (1) development prerequisite) and authorize staff to schedule the required public hearing.

MEETING REPORTING

OCTOBER 30 2017 PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING FOR PROPOSED SUPPORTIVE HOUSING IN LANGLEY SUBMITTED NOVEMBER 6, 2017

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to fulfill policy 4.3 Meeting Reporting, as outlined in the Developer Led Public Information Meetings policy 07-164, as part of the Township of Langley rezoning application process:

4.3 MEETING REPORTING

The applicant is required to provide a record of the meeting to Community Development Division not less than three weeks prior to the presentation of the application to Council. The results shall be submitted in summary report format (to be advanced to Council as an Appendix to the staff report) and should include the following information:

- Sign-in sheet from the meeting;
- Completed feedback / questionnaire forms;
- Summary of comments received;
- Discussion of how any issues / concerns identified from the meeting and/or feedback forms are addressed in the project.

BACKGROUND

On October 10, 2017, BC Housing submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the property located at 6465 201 Street. The property is current zoned as Community Commercial Zone (C-2) and BC Housing is seeking Institutional (P-2) zoning. We propose to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, with an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team funded through Fraser Health and BC Housing to provide access to treatment for people who are homeless. This is in response to the growing need in Langley to provide housing for people who are homeless or at risk to help them transition from shelters, the streets or unstable housing into housing with supports, and ultimately, into independent living.

NOTIFICATION

On October 3, 2017, a notice was sent to all neighbours within a 1KM radius, with information about the proposal and an invitation to the public meeting on October 30. On October 16, to fulfill the requirements of policy 4.2, a second notice was sent out to the same group using the template dictated by the Township, as a reminder about the public information meeting. Half-page advertisements (identical to the second notice) were placed in both the Langley Times and Langley Advance starting on October 18 for a two-week run. See *Appendix C* for copies of the notices.

ADVANCE STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

BC Housing and Stepping Stone began stakeholder meetings on September 13. The Langley Homeless Task Force, Langley Meadows Community School PAC, CIBC, Home Depot, Langley Chamber of Commerce, RCMP, Langley Meadows Community Association, Fraser Valley Elementary School PAC, BC Liquor Stores and the local homeless population were contacted. Only the Fraser Valley Elementary School PAC and BC Liquor Stores did not respond to set up a telephone / in-person meeting. See *Appendix E* for a summary.

MEETING SUMMARY

On October 30, to fulfill policy 4.1, BC Housing hosted a public information meeting in partnership with Stepping Stone and Fraser Health at the Langley Events Centre, from 5:00-7:45PM. The meeting started with an open house to view poster boards (see *Appendix D*) and talk with the project team, followed by a short presentation by BC Housing and Stepping Stone and a facilitated dialogue. 445 attendees were manually counted and 413 signed in (see *Appendix A*); 54 speakers participated in the facilitated dialogue; and 229 comment forms (see *Appendix B*) were submitted at the meeting. See *Appendix F* for a summary report of the facilitated dialogue as prepared by professional facilitator Catherine Rockandel.


SUMMARY OF COMMENTS RECEIVED



BC Housing was searching for real estate in the fall of 2016 to address the homeless issues in Langley. We looked to find an existing resource as opposed to land for a purpose-built project, which takes longer to be completed and ready for occupancy. We were committed to looking for the design of the asset to lend itself to a supportive housing project. Criteria included ability to provide a secure and safe development with self-contained units. BC Housing has successfully purchased/leased hotels in several other communities including Vancouver, Chilliwack, Penticton, Hope and Victoria to provide supportive housing. We also wanted to accommodate a number of units within the Langleys, therefore a larger hotel was sought. BC Housing reviewed three hotels for purchase in both the City and the Township of Langley. The Quality Inn was selected. It had internal corridors providing a more secure environment, a commercial kitchen to serve meals, enough units to try to house a significant amount of Langley's homeless and the location was at a busy intersection surrounded predominantly by businesses. The hotel was relatively new and in good condition, so renovating the units for use as supportive housing could be achieved more quickly than a new build.

Has any research been done to choose this location? What criteria did you use to determine the appropriateness of such a residence in the centre of long standing local businesses, schools and family homes? Was business impact assessment done?

BC Housing conducts a large real estate search on basic criteria. We use multiple evaluation criteria to come up with the final selection including meetings with the municipality, context within a neighbourhood and meetings with local stakeholders. We choose sites that are close to services and neighbourhood amenities, and located on transit routes. We prefer to locate housing within neighbourhoods to aid in the integration of vulnerable populations within the broader community. BC Housing and Stepping Stone have talked with the immediate neighbours about the proposed project and will continue to communicate to ensure we address concerns as they arise. A Community Advisory Committee will be formed to include representation from community partners (including Parent Advisory Committees), BC Housing, Fraser Health, RCMP, the Township and the Chamber of Commerce, and will meet regularly.

Why wasn't the community consulted before the purchase?

BC Housing is mandated to provide housing for those who need it most. Where a property requires rezoning, a bylaw amendment or official community plan amendment, there will be opportunity for the public to provide input. This property was purchased due to the factors that made it ideal for supportive housing use, which is urgently needed in the community. This phase of the rezoning application includes the opportunity for the community to provide input to the proposal.

How much did BC Housing pay for the hotel?

\$8 million dollars. This information is available on MLS.

Is this a done deal?

No. BC Housing has purchased the building and has begun minor renovations to prepare the units for supportive housing use. The site is not appropriately zoned, so an application for rezoning has been submitted to the Township of Langley. The public meeting on October 30 is a part of the required municipal process. BC Housing and Stepping Stone are meeting with stakeholders and holding the public meeting to gather feedback and input towards the proposal. All input gathered will be provided to the Township. There will be an opportunity to participate in a public hearing as set by the Township in the future. Council has the final decision.

Why put this in an area already experiencing issues with drugs, needles, crime?	Stepping Stone is committed to being a good neighbour in developing new supportive housing that is an asset to the community. Giving people stable housing and access to supports will keep them off the street. However, crime and needle use can also be attributed to the non-homeless population - not all homeless people are drug users and not all drug users are homeless. Our commitments include communication with the neighborhood; identifying resident expectations; rules and regulations and addressing concerns in a timely manner. BC Housing will have expectations on administration and management of the housing units. A Community Advisory Committee will be formed to include representation from community partners, BC Housing, Fraser Health, the Township and the Chamber of Commerce, and will meet regularly.

How will the program be run? What exactly is the plan?	Stepping Stone will operate the supportive housing and will be accountable to BC Housing. There will be an application process for people to apply for housing with priority given to people in Langley who are homeless. The VAT (Vulnerability Assessment Tool) will be use d to determine the need and level of support individuals require. Once accepted into the housing people will sign a Program Agreement. The Program Agreement enables us to add some expectations such as regular suite visits and wellness checks. People will move into their own unit and that will be their home. There will be staff on-site 24/7. The staff team will consist of facility operations staff, resident support workers and cook/kitchen staff. The Intensive Case Management Team will have their office on-site and provide direct clinical service for their clients living in the building. There will be a medical room where people will have access to primary care from a Nurse Practitioner. Resident support workers and the ICMT will work with people on an individual basis to help people identify areas that they need support in and goals around wellness, employment and housing. We will support

 	
	people to access community resources and use the existing Outreach team to support people in the community. Stepping Stone already works in partnership with many organizations and groups in the community including the faith community. We will use these partnerships to offer on-site programming for residents based on their interests and needs. Some examples are community kitchen, recovery groups, life skills, employment skills, etc. When people are ready to move on from supportive housing we will support people to find housing, provide a rent supplement if needed, and offer on-going support through the Outreach team.

Do they have rights as tenants?	They will have rights as residents. We plan to use a Program Agreement which includes additional expectations. If people are not meeting those expectations, for example not paying rent, displaying behaviors that are putting other residents and staff at risk, we would first try and work with the individual to resolve the issues. If we cannot resolve the issue or there are safety concerns, then we go through an eviction process and the person would have to move out.
What will residents do during the day? How will you handle loitering during the day? Will residents be barred from soliciting drivers and pedestrians for money/panhandling and how will this be both monitored and enforced?	People living in the building have the right to plan their own daily activities. Staff will support people to engage in both on-site programs / services and access community resources. If people are isolating, we will be checking in with them to ensure their safety. If we know certain residents are involved in activities in the community that put themselves or others at risk, we will address it with them. Depending on the issue we may involve other community partners such as by-law or RCMP. The RCMP has indicated that the solicitation of drivers and/or pedestrians for money will be monitored and enforcement activity taken when appropriate in accordance with enforcement activities throughout the policing jurisdiction of the Langley RCMP.
How will the opiate epidemic be considered? Don't closed doors increase risk of overdose?	Yes, we have an opiate crisis. The majority of people who have died alone were not homeless, they were housed and used drugs alone. Some of the highest risk groups of the opiate crisis are males aged 20-40 working in trades. Not all homeless people are drug users and not all drug users are homeless. All Stepping Stone staff are trained to administer Naloxone in case of an overdose and have policies and procedures in place. We will be providing on-going education and awareness for the residents. Stepping Stone is also working with the Community Overdose Response Committee to try and figure out ways to best address this crisis.

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








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

I applaud the efforts of the agencies moving forward with a plan to help persons with mental illness and homelessness.

I have received in my mailbox a lengthy plea from a group of citizens to block this proposal, it prompted me to write this letter to all involved.

The casual contact I have had with Stepping Stones tells me they are a credible and respected resource in the community. Who better to help counsel, house, feed, medicate these poor souls.

FEAR

This reminds me of days gone by when we, as concerned citizens, tried to place our folks with mental handicaps into the community from the institutions. We were petitioned to stop moving these gentle souls back closer to loved ones.

Back in the day... fear took over reason. But we persevered and won the battle slowly but surely.

The Quality Inn, which I did not even know it existed until some time after it was built, is an Ideal location. In my opinion there is no threat to schools or businesses, at least not more than exists now by people living on the streets.

As another point of argument, I refer to the placement the day program for persons with mental disabilities placed out in the woods as far away from people and community as possible. They are still there, and it suits the needs of some of the folks that attend there...but with forward thinking agencies, we have moved to placing other programs closer to the population.

While I heartedly applaud the Township of the day for facilitating this land for the Langley Association for Retarded Children...it really was 'out of sight' 'out of mind'. There were little opportunities to be included in the community unless the transportation and staff were available to bring the folks closer to town.

In addition, I am happy that SOMEONE is trying to do a proactive plan to help the less fortunate of our community. It has been a long struggle and devastating to me to see the poor and mentally ill amongst us being left out on the streets and bushes. We treat animals better!!

I do know some of the background of the history of Riverview and Cease Clinic, and rue the day that the Charter of Rights allowed people to walk away from these facilities. I had the opportunity to visit Cease in the 1970's and the person that I visited was well cared for and got her meds sorted and returned to community.

WE need Riverview and places like that more than ever before... with the chronic abuse of drugs.

What the opponents fail to realize, is that these folks will be supervised and cared for...they say they support the effort but do it somewhere else! Such a disappointing knee jerk reaction by some people.

I believe the site chosen is absolutely the best choice. No residents or schools will be impacted... we already have people living in the bushes.



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



The Quality Inn hotel is undergoing renovations to provide more supportive housing options for homeless individuals who live in our community. The new proposed supportive housing would provide **49 new supportive housing units** for the community, with space for programming and support services, and **24/7 staffing**. In addition, an **Intensive Case Management (ICM)** team would operate from this location, to provide clinical support to help stabilize high-need individuals both on-site and throughout the community.



BC Housing has purchased and is renovating the building, and would provide operating funding for the supportive housing units, and rent supplements to the Intensive Case Management team.

BC Housing works in partnership with the private and nonprofit sectors, provincial health authorities and ministries, other levels of government and community groups to develop a range of housing options.



Stepping Stone Community Services Society (SSCSS) would operate 49 units of supportive housing and on-site support service.



BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the Quality Inn at 6465-201 Street. BC Housing purchased the property and is undertaking renovations to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, and an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. Stepping Stone Community Services Society would operate the supportive housing units and provide support services and programming for the residents. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Q & A (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- C1 I am happy with the proposed project and it seems to be following the successful Housing First model. I am happy to see the addition of the integrated case management team on site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It gives people respect and dignity in terms of being able to move forward in their life.
- C2 I am fully in support of this project. I know a lot of people say "not in my back yard" but we need to support these people in a proactive and supportive way.
- C3 My concerns are mostly about the proximity to the schools and the townhomes around there. I have concerns about drug use in the area and temporary tent cities that may set up because of temporary housing in the area.
- C4 I object to this coming into the area because I am concerned about drug issues and mental health issues. I am worried about the safety of our children.
- A4 I want to respond to the concern about safety. As the operator we are also concerned about safety but we believe having staff on site 24 hours a day in that site and area will make the area safer. There will be cameras inside and out and it will be well lit. We want to make it is a safe place for people who will be living there as well as be a good neighbour.

- Was there an analysis done from the 2014-2017 study on what percentage of the population that is homeless in Langley is actually from Langley? Is a facility like this really appropriate to be 320 meters from an elementary school and 50 meters from a liquor store?
- We hear time and time again all the concerns about safety and we want this program to work. All the issues around safety still need to be addressed. The homeless population is already in this community whether we open this program or not. Homelessness is addressed so often by First Responders. The most expensive way to treat homeless is to keep people on the street. A study a few years ago showed it cost approximately \$50,000 per person to keep people on the street. That is what it costs the Province every year for people who are chronically homeless. We believe it is important to put wrap around services at the site for people to have access to clinical support and treatment.
 - In regards to the case management team, the ICM team is an engagement with the individuals to try to link them to services. It may be the first time they have had a chance to sit down with a counsellor, nurse or psychiatrist. It will be somewhat like a one stop shop so they will have their needs met in a greater capacity by coming to that site.
- **Q6** Will any of the concerns brought up tonight make a difference to the project going forward?
- A6 The Township Of Langley Council has the final decision for the project. BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application because the current land use for the site doesn't allow for supportive housing. It does fit into the OCP for Langley where they want supportive Housing dispersed in different neighbourhoods. We will listen to what you have to say about this proposal and what you would like your elected officials to do about it. After the public hearing, there is no more chance to have your voice heard.
- C7 We can't be in denial of the fact that homeless people and drug addicts are already in our neighbourhoods. Your greatest fear is already realized but the facility that is being introduced is going to help us. It will make sure that these people have a place to go where they can access counsellors. If it was your family member having the issue, wouldn't you want them to have a place to go? I am in support of this and at the same time a little afraid because it is an unknown to me but I feel it is the right thing to do.
- C8 I have concerns about safety and how close it is to the elementary school. I say no to this proposal.
- C9 I have no problem with the program but I do with the location. Why does it have to be so close to our elementary schools? Are we going to have needles in the playground? I don't feel safe for my children to be around people with drug and mental health issues. BC Housing, I understand the importance of your work but I am against this location.
- Q10 How much did BC Housing pay for this hotel? I ask because the Mayor of Port Coquitlam would love to see their hospital re-opened. Maybe that money could have been better

- spent in a place that the Mayor and community want it and there is already a facility that could hold more than 49 beds.
- Q11 I think programs like this are vital to the community and helping people get the help they need is priceless. It is very clear that the location is a concern. Is it a clean and dry facility and if so will there be testing? Is there a curfew? Is there direct liaison with the RCMP? Is there onsite security? What steps are being taken to ensure that the surrounding communities have the same level of security that we have now or more? How long will Stepping Stones be running this facility?
- A11 There is no requirement for people to be clean and sober in order to live in the supportive housing so some people will have substance use. With this project, we are trying to provide the right services on site so that we are not closing our doors to people. As an operator, we are going to ensure it is a safe place to live and for staff to work as well as be safe for the neighbourhood. Stepping Stones has been providing services in Langley for a long time and currently supports hundreds of people scattered throughout the community. These people have alcohol and substance issues and our role is to help them maintain their housing. We have been doing it very successfully for many years. This will be even more successful because we will have more services and clinical services on site that will really help us.
- Q12 My concern is that this program has already been planned to have washouts. It will not be covered under the tenancy act so if somebody doesn't meet up to the rules or do what they are supposed to do, they can be removed from the facility and be put back out on the street. So we start bringing people with homeless and addiction issues into the area and if they wash out of the program they are basically removed from the building. This will increase the number of homeless and vagrant people in the Langley area right around the Quality Inn. Am I correct in understanding that it is not covered under the Tenancy Act and they will have no rights as tenants?
- A12 We are looking at using a program agreement that would be very similar to the Residential Tenancy Act. There will be expectations and rules. If there are safety issues that we can't manage, there may be some people who will not be able to continue to live there. In response to the man who asked about the last homeless count, 74% of the 206 people counted have been in Langley over a year and 50% for over 10 years. These are Langley people and it will not increase the number of people in Langley.
- **C13** So now we are going to drag the 206 homeless people to one neighbourhood. If they wash out in the program they will be in that neighbourhood, they won't go back to where they came from.
- A13 If an individual that is living in the Quality Inn isn't successful and ends up leaving, the ICM team is an outreach team as well that provides support out in the community. There will be housing rental subsidies available for those who could find market housing.

- C14 How can you control needles being left around and do you send people out to go and collect needles? I am concerned with it being so close to a school and kids finding needles. Will there be an educational program for kids so that they know to stay away because it is dangerous?
- A14 Fraser Health has a regional Sharps Management Strategy that has recently been developed. It involves community sweeps that have already been implemented. It also employs people who are clients of the program and because of their knowledge of the community they know where to go to collect sharps. We are looking at working with Community Partners around implementing evidence-based strategies that enhances the collection of used needles in the community.
- Q15 Is this the same business that went through the Port Coquitlam Park where the 3 year old got pricked recently?
- A15 No, this is a different community. Part of the six-part strategy includes education, increased disposal options as well as sweeps.
- Q16 Did crime increase around the opening of the Gateway of Hope when it first opened up? Or has it increased over the past few years?
- A16 The RCMP don't take a side on this, we are here to make sure that everybody is as safe as they possibly can be. We respond now to crime hot spots and if this project goes forward we would be involved in trying to make sure it is as safe as possible. Right now our members are out there working with bylaws moving people around. I was not here when Gateway opened but we can dig that information up before any public hearing comes up. I talked to a woman who lives across from there and she says that in her opinion it wasn't that bad.
- Q17 We already have challenges in the neighbourhood with drug use and crime. Do we really need to have this right beside a liquor store? I love the idea of an ICM team but there doesn't seem to be enough hours to support 49 units that could possibly have 98 residents in them. How long is the funding in place and who provides it?
- A17 This is not a shelter, it is supportive housing and provides long-term housing not in and out. One of the things we track is stability of housing, it is a performance indicator for groups like Stepping Stones so we want people to stay there and not bounce in and out. The funding contract comes from BC Housing and is for a five-year period and would be reviewed at that time. BC Housing also partially funds the ICM project. This is an important program for BC Housing, Fraser Health and most importantly for this community.
- Q18 How big is the common space on the inside of the building and what types of groups can you get in there? What about the outdoor space because I don't see any green space? Will participation and outreach be part of being able to stay long term or can they opt out and not go to any of the services that you will have on site?

- A18 On the second floor, there is a big common room with a full kitchen. We will be able to provide group programming such as skills development, community kitchen or things that will meet the needs of the people living there. Outside is a concrete parking lot, as it is a hotel. We anticipate that not many of the residents will have vehicles so there are lots of opportunities to make some changes and add green space. There is a covered patio outback that borders the green space in the ravine area. We can build things into the program agreement and we want to try to engage people. We want to be there to support people to make positive changes in their life. We are not going to impose it and it will be more about engagement and meeting people where they are at.
- Q19 How are you going to approach vulnerable women to come into this long term housing?
- A19 There will be an application process and a vulnerable assessment tool that BC Housing has been using already. We need to work with people individually to make sure that the space that we are able to offer is safe for them. This means different things for different people and we are really going to pay attention to that.
- C20 I am 13 and I feel that this affects my friends, siblings and me more than the adults here. We are the ones that go to the park to play and have fun. But the homeless people are coming in because they hear there is housing for them. They are leaving their stuff in the parks and I don't feel it is safe for us. Kids are still learning what is wrong and right and might pick up needles so it is not safe for any of us. It might be better to have low cost housing for single parents who can't get by with their children and can't afford to pay for them. I feel that would be better than having homeless drug addicts.
- C21 I have the same concern with needles and broken beer bottles and unfortunately it has been going on for the 35 years that I have lived here. Obviously this isn't the first supportive housing you have done so how have others you have done impacted the neighbourhoods around them? Does the RCMP have any concerns with it being so close to a liquor store or elementary schools?
- A21 The RCMP promotes block watch which is community streets coming together to watch out for your own street and neighbourhood. It would be the same type of situation with the parks but there are concerns in every community in Langley and other communities. If we could come up with a solution for needles, I think we would all be a lot richer. This is a cross the board problem that happens over the entire Lower Mainland and across the country. This is the first program that we have seen with all encompassing support within and this is very encouraging notwithstanding the location concerns. The common thing is to paint the homeless as criminals, drug dealers and those with mental health issues. We do some analysis of who is out there and we are looking at mostly males with an average age in their forties. There is some mental health and drug issues but you would be surprised at the low level of crime involved with our homeless folks. They are probably our lowest level of criminal that we have out there. The solution isn't easy, we can't police our way out of this situation but we do have to open our eyes to what you are all raising here tonight and look for workable solutions as we go forward.

- C22 I think a program like this with all its supports will make these people stay and never want to leave. Send them to live and work on farms. If you let this move forward residents of the community are going to move away.
- C23 I hear tonight that if you build it they will come. They are already here and have been here since 2000 plus. Homelessness has been steadily growing, we have not invited people in they are just coming. I took part in the homeless count in March and we went from 92 in 2014 to 206 and it is growing every year. I support low barrier transitional housing for our homeless friends. As a society we have to do something, there is never going to be a location that is seen as acceptable. The last homeless count in the Metro area showed that 23% of the homeless population are 55 and up. We have a growing issue of seniors who have the potential to be homeless. What efforts will be made to accommodate our seniors? What efforts will be made to make sure that vulnerable seniors are protected?
- A23 We use the vulnerability assessment tool and it helps get a good kind of healthy community mix in a building and also helps target the right level of support for seniors. The supports from Stepping Stones are twenty-four hours a day, the ICM support will be seven days a week. It is a real provincial standard team that we are putting in place there.
- Q24 I feel that this is a time bomb. It just takes one case, say a 3 year old gets picked with a needle, and it can cause the whole neighbourhood to flee from this. We picked this location to settle down to because it is safe. Now we will have that support shelter right at the core of downtown Langley. It is turning into the downtown eastside. Now we will be concentrating all the problems from the neighbouring neighbourhood and putting them in one place. I have concerns with the health care system because we already spend long wait times in the emergency room. Will we be experiencing way more wait times because of the drug addicts and mental health issues?
- A24 The benefit of these supportive housing programs is that it diverts people who have addictions and mental health from taking up space in ERs. As I said before, the most expensive way to treat homeless is to cycle them through ERs because that is what is happening right now. The ways to prevent that are to build more supportive housing.
- Q25 The question of why this location has still not been answered. Why is our taxpayer funded BC Housing choosing this location? Where are the slides to show us you have done your research and this is the best area in Langley to put this place? It feels like our hands are being forced by the Township and BC Housing, you just went and bought the building and are telling us this is going to happen. What made BC Housing go and buy this? It has been asked and you still haven't answered.
- A25 We bought it because it was there and there was an identified need in this community. Because there were already drug users in the community and people camping around the area, we wanted to bring those homeless people inside and minimize the impact on this community.

- C26 It is easy for us to stand here and complain but these people are actually doing something about homelessness. The homeless are crying out for help, why is it that you are saying get rid of them.
- C27 It all sounds good to house the homeless drug addicted but what about the homeless that are not drug addicted? They didn't do anything to put themselves in that position except not be able to buy food and pay their rent whereas the drug addicted kind of did it to themselves and they are dependent on the rest of us. If we give them housing, like we are about to do, and put them behind closed doors, this is when overdoses happen.
- A27 We do have an opiate crisis but let's be clear here. The majority of those people were not homeless, they were housed. A Fraser Health report came out a few weeks ago and we saw that some of the high-risk groups are males aged 20-40 who work in the trades. I want to emphasize that not all homeless people are drug users and not all drug users are homeless.
- Q28 I understand that they were housed but not homeowners. All those people you put in there will be housed also. They will be behind closed doors and overdose there. It is low barrier where you are not going to stop them from doing their drugs, they don't have to be clean and there are no rules and they can come and go as they please with everything paid for. How is that helping them or anybody in the community?
- C29 There is definitely a lot of "not in my back yard" here tonight. I am not opposed to this because it is already in my back yard. For the last three years they were camping out in the woods at 66th and 200th and every night there would be something stolen from our back yards. I am for this but I don't understand all of it. Right now the drug dealers meet them in the back alley and shoot them up themselves, I have seen it. Will there be people going out there and policing it, is that what the outreach is?
- A29 The building will be staffed twenty four seven. There will be lighting and cameras. We don't want that activity on the property either. I am not sure if I have the answer for you because if it is not happening in this building, then you would be phoning the RCMP to report thefts or drug dealers.
- C30 I think everybody here agrees that BC Housing and Stepping Stones is trying to support homeless people. How successful is your ICM program when homelessness continues to grow? It was said earlier that Fraser Health has a program to educate kids about not picking up needles. Do you think it is fair that kids need to be taught this? They should have a safe place to play.
- A30 The ICM team has just started in Langley within the last few months so we are tracking statistics and will do an analysis at the end of it in a yearly report. The benefits of having better connections to services and linkages to health care services such as nurse practitioner and psychiatrist on site, in terms of better engagement to the services out there, it will be much more stream lined. There will be a linkage with the current Langley Health Centre and a nurse psychiatrist liaison working with the ICM team.

- **C31** I think you can implement this idea in a new location, which is far from the schools and shopping centres.
- You are all worried about the safety of your kids and druggies in your neighbourhoods and parks and sleeping at the schools. They will be a lot safer if you gather them up and have them in one place. As to the location, it doesn't matter where you put it because no one is going to like it. I have volunteered at homeless shelters for five years and believe it or not, they are real people. They have desires and wishes to have a place, they don't like being on the street. This is way over due and you have no idea how happy these people will be to have a place to go. As far as the washout goes, I don't think you will have very many because they are going to be very happy to be indoors with a place of their own. They will have a place to shower, wash their clothes and cook meals. I am really happy to see this and hope you get it going before the winter sets in.
- Q33 I am very happy to see what I saw tonight because my first reaction was initially fear and anger because it is so close. I am happy to see that it is a supportive housing plan, not just a drop in kind of flop house. There is definitely a need in the community and the entire Lower Mainland. What is the city's stake hold in this because I am not sure how they fit into the puzzle? As far as the numbers of homeless, I would say that probably the majority of the homeless population are city residents and we are bringing them to the Township. How does that affect tax burdens, services, allocation with the RCMP? Is there an accountability plan with our neighbourhoods as far as policing? If I have a tape of one of your residents taking something from my property and I bring it, what happens then? How does that fit in with the program?
- **A33** I think it is a good idea moving forward, to have a Homeless Task Force with representatives from the Township and City, the RCMP, Fraser Health and a provincial representative. That would be a move in the right direction.
- Q34 My concern is about density. You said that the City's plan was to have people spread around the city. You also said there were 200 homeless people in Langley and you want to house at least a quarter more, if you talk about the temporary beds, in one area. That doesn't sound like it is spreading it around or speaking to the City plan. I think this is asking for trouble when you have one or two people to watch over 50 individuals. Please speak about the density.
- A34 There are no temporary spaces at this site. It will be 49 units of supportive housing. The shelter, which is operated by the Salvation Army, is in the City.
- C35 Just because the hotel is available, and you have invested a lot of money into it, doesn't make it a good idea. It is a bad idea because of the location.
- A35 I do not believe that 49 units is high-density supportive housing. As I said before, this is supportive housing not temporary housing. This would represent 25% of the homeless count, which we know is a snap shot in time. Through groups like Stepping Stones, we have what is called our scattered rental subsidy program. We provide an additional 30

- rent subsidies for this population and they are scattered throughout the Township and City of Langley.
- C36 I commend you on the collaborative efforts that you are demonstrating here. I also appreciate the evidence based Housing First model that you are proposing and the Intensive Care Management team along with the support that the RCMP and others will bring. We recognize that just throwing more money at policing and acute care is not going to solve the problems. I don't know if this is the best solution because I am not an expert. I am relying on you, as the experts, to make a good decision. I thank you for your efforts in trying to get these people supported, given dignity and an opportunity to work and receive the long term treatment and care that they need.
- Variable C37 I really think that it should have been brought to our attention that this is what you wanted to do, before you signed papers. I have been working with the homeless for the last few years, reaching out to them personally to see what I can do to help them because nobody else wants to. I was able to contact the mother of a young homeless girl and get her help. She is now housed and five months clean. I think so many people don't want to look at the homeless issue because it makes them uncomfortable. The homeless are people too. They deserve a roof over their head and a nice warm bed and meal. This is a great idea for Langley and hope people get behind it.
- C38 I agree with this program but not the location. I don't feel safe or comfortable for my child having to walk by there at dark. Our government needs to take more action and find solutions in preventing people from becoming homeless.
- C39 To me this issue is about community integration and engaging people who want to become members of the community. I look at the panel and don't see anybody who is outwardly a member of this community who is willing to engage in this forum to discuss what they feel is important. I am a little concerned for what appears to be active disengagement and non-participation of the community that you are trying to help. Homelessness is the sexy topic of the day. We have a lack of housing for adults with developmental disabilities. They are being placed in long-term facilities with much older people because they have aged out of the system and have nowhere to go. We have single working parents who are desperately trying to find secure housing and seniors who have paid into the system for years and now have nowhere to live. In terms of priority, after talking about the average resident of the supportive housing model being a 40 year old male, I am sorry but I pick the adult with the disability and the senior who has contributed to the system over the person who is perfectly able to work if they get help. Your priorities are so backwards.
- Q40 Housing is a challenge and is not just an issue for those that are already homeless, or at risk, it affects everyone in the middle class. As housing affordability diminishes, you raise the poverty line so the middle class can then no longer afford to be in housing. My question is actually for the province, BC Housing. What is the province doing to address the root cause of the housing crisis? Homelessness stems from being out of a home so

- why are we allowing people to be priced out of a home and their communities? They then end up having to rely on these supports and services. I want to know what the government is going to do, that has a meaningful impact? The NDP and Green coalition were elected for this issue and have done nothing to address this yet.
- A40 This forum is about one program in Langley that targets the homeless population. I am not a politician but this is a new administration who said that in the next ten years they want to build 114,000 units of affordable housing for low-income seniors and families. It is up to us to hold them accountable for that figure.
- Q41 Where is our City Council in petitioning both the provincial and federal government to do something about housing affordability? Homelessness is never going to be solved if people keep coming out of their homes when they actually have meaningful incomes. What funding will be made available from the Province to support the City and Township with additional services that will be required from the RCMP and parks to clean up the green spaces?
- A41 The Federal Government is committed to the National Housing Strategy because the Feds jumped out of housing in 1990. Many argue that that may be part of the reason we are into this housing challenge at the moment and is why they want to get back into it. We need the Municipal, Federal and Provincial parties at the table to address housing challenges.
- C42 I would like to thank you for bringing this proposed solution for homelessness to our Township and Langley City. I believe the proposed project is evidence-based which means it should not be a waste of taxpayer's money. I believe this building was a smart purchase because it requires few renovations. Can you please talk about how this program might be part of a more regional program so that we are not just setting up shop at one place in Langley and drawing everybody in? Hopefully there is going to be multiple housing projects in the region.
- A42 That is a good point and is why I talked about the need and approach at the community level in Langley as well as an approach that takes across the Metro region and into the Fraser Valley and across the province. People may have heard the announcement from the province, as part of an immediate response, of 2000 units of modular housing. That is in negotiations with a number of municipalities in the Metro, Vancouver, Surrey, New West and North Vancouver to actually talk about where those modules will go. We actually take a regional approach to homelessness, not just one community.
- C43 The gentleman from the RCMP, and a number of people here tonight, said they would like to hear about ways to reduce needles lying around. I have heard about, and like the idea, of a returnable program for needles. It works for cans and bottles so I could see it potentially work well for needles.
- C44 I believe people deserve to have a home. I also believe that this is not the right place and my biggest fear is not the homeless people and drug addicts, it is the element that they

- draw in. I believe that more and more homeless people will come and this will bring in more drug dealers.
- C45 From what you have communicated to us, I get the idea that you have basically already decided. I realize you have already purchased the hotel and it is rather convenient to use it. I understand that we need to address the needs of the homeless but the problem is the location. I don't think the concerns are totally the "not in my back yard" comments. I think the concern is more about the liquor store and two elementary schools right there. The community plan is to build a lot more density in the way of townhomes. What type of people are you hoping to try to draw into Langley? We choose this area because it is safe area to raise kids. Many people feel that this is unsafe for a residential area and 66th borders right around townhomes and homes. This summer, while walking through the park with my small children, my son almost stepped on broken glass that had obviously been used for drugs. If you are listening to public input at all, why could another location such as 200th and Highway One, which is already zoned for commercial, not be chosen?
- I fully support this project. I have worked with the Housing First practice and know what ICM teams can do and there is lots of success there. In Surrey we housed 200 people so I have high hopes for this project. Very few supportive housing places can say that they see this element that you are describing, around their properties. You might see that with emergency shelters and sometimes around food banks and other resources. You talked about an advisory committee, this is a neighbourhood problem and we all need to work together to be part of the solution. We need to all feel safe as well. If you see needles in your area, you can call Lookout Solutions at 604-812-5277 and they will come and clean them up. The things that happen, and activities around supportive housing, look very different than what some of you are fearful about.
- C47 I have lived in Langley a long time and have used all three resources. I have used Langley Community Services Society, Stepping Stones Society and Fraser Langley Mental Health. Having all three resources under one roof is a fantastic idea because those resources saved my life.
- **C48** Is there not social housing already located in the Fraser Highway Logan area, by the Army and Navy, where you have counsellors and mental health resources there?
- A48 The Langley Lions complex is funded by BC Housing
- Q49 Why do you feel the need to bring it into this community? Why not use the resources there where they can get help and you will have them all in the one area? The hospital is there to deal with drug overdoses. I think it would be better to use this site for people with low incomes, seniors and people with disabilities.
- Q50 If you are already having to pay companies or people to come in and clean up needles, shouldn't this be the first clue that it shouldn't be in our neighbourhood? You talked about a safety plan for the supportive housing residents but is there a safety plan for the Langley Meadows residents and children of the neighbourhood? It sounds to me that this

is happening and already gone through. Is this actually a forum or is it done and we are just here for you to humour us? If it doesn't go through with the Township, what are the plans for the Quality Inn and the taxpayer's money?

A50 No decision has been made and if it doesn't go through, we would have to sit down with the Township and explore the options for that site.

We are concerned about the safety of the neighbourhood but are not concerned that there will be safety issues. We will have community advisory committees to be addressing any concerns that people in the neighbourhood have. On that committee will be representatives from the RCMP, BC Housing, and Fraser Health, Stepping Stones as well as business people and people that live in the area.

- C51 I am 13 and many kids my age can be influenced by these people doing drugs or alcohol. Many of my classmates are not driven to school, they walk or go to the bus stop by themselves. That leaves a lot of space for homeless people to approach them and offer them drugs and alcohol. If there is going to be a concentrated area of homeless people, it is going to be hard to avoid it.
- C52 I used to work in a supportive housing program and would like to offer a different perspective from someone who was privileged to work with the individuals in that program. When you give individuals, who have had literally nothing, an opportunity to create community, have pride and dignity and something to look forward to each day, they raise that bar. From what I am witnessing in this room, many of you have had a very negative perception of what our humanity looks like and I would like to encourage all of you to think that we can be better if we support each other. This makes me very sad. The individuals we supported in the program created a block watch and on their own decided to clean up the park across the street. They cleaned the entire area without any money coming towards them and without anyone recognizing that and without any reason for them to do it. They just wanted to support the community that they were now positively a part of. I have heard a lot of concerns about needles in the area. You need to write to your MLAs and talk to your Mayors about this and as a community and society, demand that we have better practices in place. You need to have safe places to put needles all over because people are using them all over.
- **C53** I like the proposal but it is in the wrong place. It is too close to the schools, daycares and senior's centre.
- C54 I work down the street from the shelter that is near Kwantlen and have to step over homeless people almost daily. They are checking the locks on my doors and I have had keys stolen. We had to have our home and car relocked because of it. I don't want to have to step over people stepping into my house. Who gets to select who is going to move into this place? Do we as the residents and taxpayers get to pick and choose who can move in and who can't? The homeless will bring their friends with them so now you are taking all the people from downtown and bringing it here where our kids are not safe.


- How is this going to affect our property values? The RCMP office closes after five pm so what happens after that?
- **A54** Call 911 for an emergency or 532-3200 for the non-emergency line and somebody is at the end of the phone twenty four seven.
- **C55** Thank you, but I have concerns about RCMP response times based on the levels of priority.
- C56 I think the question I would like people to ask themselves is how is it safer to leave people on the streets than it is to put them some place safer where they can be looked after and get the treatment and supports that they need? We have a serious problem in this community and if we just try to shuffle it to another place, it will never get solved. As BC Housing, wherever you go you are going to be told you are not wanted. I do think it is a good location and should be built there. The police are two minutes away and there are lots of supports there. People need to ask themselves, where if not here. I would like to leave you with a quote "A nation's greatness is measured by how it treats its weakest members".
- I think there is a misunderstanding in the room where some people think that we don't like homeless people and don't wish them well. That is not the case and we do consider them human beings. The real issue is the location. Since there are at least 206 homeless in Langley and only 49 rooms available at the housing, why is sobriety not mandatory to be able to live there?
- A57 Best practice and research shows that the more barriers you put into the housing, the more people stay on the street. We want to bring people inside so they can access treatment. If they are out on the street they are causing more problems for the RCMP, our communities, more problems for the ERs and so on.
- **Q58** What is the percentage of homeless people who do have a problem with drug addiction?
- **A58** It is a very good question, it varies and we don't know the answer. The latest count varies from 40-60%
- **C59** I don't think people have a problem with homeless people, I think they have a problem with the drugs and the dangers that drugs bring to the community.
- C60 I don't want this in this location because it is too close to family businesses and schools. I am concerned with the safety and link to criminality.
- Q61 I think this project is needed and don't oppose to it. I haven't heard how many staff that you will have going out every day and picking up needles instead of relying on the community to call in when they see any. Will there be a certain number of people going out doing security checks several times a day to clean up certain areas and policing people shooting up behind the dumpsters?
- A61 There are a number of strategies, like people have mentioned, evidence-based strategies that reduce the number of inappropriate discards. The residents of the facility will be engaged in sweeps because they are really pro-active and wanting to enhance the safety

- of their neighbourhood. I can't give you specifics of how many people but in other communities when there is an increased need, we increase it. It is very responsive.
- Q62 I want the Township Council to take into consideration, before passing this, that it would not be passed unless there is a very concrete plan in place around the pickup of needles. How will you work with the community for people who want to volunteer, be involved and become part of solving this as well? I would like to hear specifics.
- A62 Before you leave tonight, you can take a comment form and put your name and contact information on it and add that you would be interested in being part of a Community Advisory Committee. Our plan is to start meeting with that committee soon.
- C63 The RCMP should talk to the Abbotsford Police about the BC Housing Centre of Hope and all the problems they have encountered because of it. It is of particular relevance to the RCMP and the Township in that it has room for 24 people but there are about 150 people that live in homeless camps all around the shelter. It has been an ongoing issue for the City of Abbotsford for the last five years and they have had to hire Paladin Security permanently to watch over the camps. Abbotsford Police also have to get involved so you will need more police to deal with this. The junk removal companies come and do sweeps twice a month and spend three or four days cleaning stuff out. Low-level crime means that bicycles and strollers will be taken from people's back yards and used to bring bottles to the bottle depot. It was said earlier that it is cheaper to deal with it this way than to deal with it on our emergency services but I don't think I agree with that. I did a quick analysis of the 1,500 homes that are closest to this proposed area, if we factor in a reduction in property value of \$100,000 for each of those properties that is a \$150,000,000 worth of property value that is lost. That is property that Township of Langley will not be incurring property taxes on. There will also be increased policing costs by the RCMP.
- C64 I support the program and don't think it is the right location. We used to feel that this was a safe community and left our door unlocked. Some people ended up breaking into our home and we were scared to death. I ended up locking my kid and wife up and then called the police. We don't feel safe anymore, always lock our doors and don't even answer our door when someone knocks on it. We want to help all the homeless but also need to help people in this community.
- **C65** We are very concerned about the safety issues and don't like the location.
- **Q66** How many people did BC Housing ask to come tonight and speak on behalf of them? If they spoke on behalf of BC Housing it is a conflict of interest.
- Q67 I am not against homeless people. My son and I participated in a coat and blanket drive for them last year so that he could see that there is a real issue with homelessness. What is the difference between the Gateway shelter that is on the Langley bypass and the one that is going to be at the Quality Inn? Is it the same idea?

- A67 No it is very different. Thank you for your question because this is coming up a lot. We fund a shelter program, so if you are going into a shelter it is an emergency shelter program and is often a cot or mat on the floor and that is what Gateway is. This is supportive housing where you go into your own unit and have your own washroom. It is housing not a shelter and is long-term housing. It will have twenty four seven support, ICM services and so on. They are two very different programs.
- C68 I think people are concerned about safety and think this is going to be like Gateway with hundreds of shopping carts and people outside there. I think people envision that happening here and that is scary because we have friends who have lived in that area and had things stolen and been threatening and abused. It has been a big concern and I think that is the picture that people are getting that is going to come to this area.
- **A68** I share those concerns and we will work with Stepping Stones, the RCMP and Fraser Health. It shouldn't happen that supportive housing has people congregating outside of it.
- **C69** Will they make sure this doesn't happen because I think that is a huge concern of people? The idea is great, the location is terrible for a number of reasons that many people have already expressed.
- C70 I was homeless at around 21 years old so have gone through all the hell of being a homeless person. Being assumed that I was one thing instead of something else. Mine was about circumstance, an injustice pertaining to work where I wasn't paid money I was promised. When you are working hard, you keep working hoping you are going to get your paycheck. Suddenly it is gone and the rental place you have tells you that you have to leave. My heart and compassion is very big for homeless people and I know a lot of them. I have my kids go with bags of food, socks, and clothes to teach my kids empathy and to care and love these people. It is not always a certain type of box of how we assume things. This location is a very bad idea. Just from my personal experience, we had a guy high on drugs come to our door and try to break through with a hammer. I think there has to be a serious accountability for our community but also for you guys to be accountable to us.

To whom it may concern,

Today I have just learned that the Township of Langley through BC Housing is proposing to convert the Quality Inn into a 49 room supportive housing unit. Since I will not be able to attend the information session offered on October 30th, as I will be working, I would like to make my voice heard now in a constructive manner. I do not believe that this is in the best interest of the community as a whole as it will create a drain on the already taxed resources of our community. Yes on one hand it will transition some people off of the streets into a housing project where they may be able to move themselves out of poverty and become productive members of society. I hope that this supportive housing unit will be used for those who truly deserve it like the elderly who have fallen on hard times, however, I realize that this will likely not happen.

In my current occupation I deal with various levels of people in BC Housing, youth in transition from the care of the Ministry, and homeless people and it has been my experience that the vast majority of these people lead their current lifestyle not by accident but by choice and addiction. Because of their choices they have spiraled out of control and entered a criminal lifestyle to sustain their addiction. These people often commit robberies, break and enters, theft from vehicles, petty theft from businesses, etc. to obtain property that they can trade or sell to dealers or others. The conversion for this property via trade is grossly disproportionate meaning, an iPad worth \$600 is devalued by more that 1/4 at times to be \$150 creating a demand to steal more to fuel an ever growing addiction for these people. The proposal to place a housing unit near a growing community will create a target rich environment for these people to commit the above offenses.


Consider the current level of policing in the Township of Langley, seriously consider the amount of police per person. At any given time it would be hard to have more than 12 uniformed members working in the entire community of Langley let alone the area which you propose to increase the population of people who commit crime. Consider the amount of property crime which is already taking place in the Township of Langley. Since moving here in 2005 I have seen a steady increase in homeless people on the street corners, outside of Walmart and the Save On. I have not seen an increase in uniformed police nor a change in their policy toward the homeless addicts. I have had to assist Loss Prevention on two occasions were they were struggling to detain people who had stolen from their businesses in the area. On both occasions these people were so high they didn't understand what I was saying to them until the heard the police sirens. The Langley RCMP have a very lack luster approach to the homeless, if they are not overtly bothering anyone don't approach them. Is this the same policy which created the Whalley Strip? The Langley RCMP already have enough on their hands dealing with property crime offenders who rent houses in the community!

Examine King George Boulevard and all of the motels which provided discounted rates to the homeless and addicted, where are they now? The Hare Creek Motel transitioned into the Bollywood Hotel and then was pushed to the ground. Ask the community surrounding that hotel what kind of neighborhood was created, one of violence, property crime, fear, and police sirens at all hours of the day and night. The only time that fear

reduced was when the hotel was nothing but rubble. Think of all of the prostitutes that walked King George Boulevard at that time, you are asking them to come to this area now. Remember that this profession is now becoming legal despite the workers addiction to drugs making it close to impossible to proactively police. You will be drawing in all of the associated persons to that trade, drug dealers, johns, and criminals looking to take advantage of both.

I realize that my concerns and fears will not come to fruition overnight, but rather will take time much like the homeless transients who have invaded the area already. Property crime didn't go up overnight, it took time and now we the residents have to deal with it. I strongly oppose the BC Housing project and foresee that it will tax the community, the police, and will be a blight in the area.

I did attend the October 30 meeting and did not hear any clear, firm and transparent responses to my concerns. Prior to the meeting in fact, I stopped at Wal-mart to shop and was approached for money by several homeless panhandlers. Hmmmmmm. Ironic?

I understand very well the concept of Supportive Housing, Harm Reduction and Intensive Case Management Teams having led several initiatives myself. Each have had clear written Terms of Reference, Objectives and were transparent in their cost. I cannot say the same for BC Housing's presentation on October 30. It was vague, theoretical and ill prepared to inform the community.

What I hear loud and clear from the Langley community is NOT contempt and discompassion for the homeless community and vulnerable populations. In fact, I hear the opposite.

What I hear is empathy and compassion which support long existing and more vulnerable communities in The Langleys which do not have the political and media 'sexiness' that homelessness and fentanyl do. For example, supportive housing for adults with developmental disabilities currently living with aging caregivers, seniors living in poverty after having supported our local economy for years and low income working families who need stable housing for child school enrollment and family development.

The response to one community member's question of why the Quality Inn was bought for the purpose of homeless supportive housing of "because it was there" is unprofessional and nonaccountable. BC Housing needs to own its actions and admit when errors in judgement and due diligence/fair process are made sans public consultation prior to spend.

Open Letter to BC Housing, Fraser Health, Stepping Stone Community Services Society and Township of Langley

Re: Supportive Housing Proposal - Quality Inn at 201 Street and 64 Ave in Langley

I attended the meeting last night for the proposed supportive housing in the Quality Inn at 201 Street and 64 Ave in Langley. While my initial reaction to the proposal was fear, I felt less resistant after taking the time to ask questions and research homelessness and the different housing models. I came to appreciate the wraparound support model and felt it could be a positive addition to our community. However, after attending the meeting last night I have more questions than answers and I have some considerable concerns. Location is not one of them and I live FOIPPA s.22(1) from the proposed location.

My main question and concern - Why was a low barrier housing model chosen? There are limited resources available for the homeless. Why shouldn't available resources go to support people who want help over those choosing to remain in active addiction? With no limits on length of tenancy, a tenant could remain housed and actively addicted in this complex for years, preventing someone who truly wants access to support from getting it. I do believe people with addiction should be provided with opportunities to change, when they express a desire and a willingness to actively work towards that goal. When they are ready, community partners should be available to direct them to supports like this one. If someone isn't ready to change, they're not going to.

While that is my main concern, I have a number of other thoughts and questions that I would like to share, with the hope of getting some answers before the public hearing.

Housing people without addictions alongside those with active addictions seems problematic to me. I don't know many people who would willingly invite addiction into their home, yet this is what we'd be asking many people to do under this model. I understand there are people who choose to go back to the street when they're placed in low barrier housing, as they find the street safer and less chaotic than living in shared space with active addicts. Recent literature reviews also suggest that low barrier housing is less effective at maintaining sobriety for active substance users than sober living. If we want successful outcomes for all tenants, how is the low barrier model setting them up for success?

In Victoria, <u>844 Johnson Street</u> is an example of a recent BC Housing low barrier supportive housing complex. They have faced some pretty major challenges, both in the complex and in the surrounding community, and they are still struggling to find ways to deal with them. How is this project in Langley different and how will the partners in this program ensure that what is happening in Victoria doesn't doesn't happen in our community?

Studies suggest that the success of supportive housing is partially dependent on the availability of suitable housing for tenants to "grow into" as they work through the program and towards independence. Does suitable and affordable housing exist in Langley for tenants to move into? If not, what efforts are being made to ensure these options will be available when needed?

It was stated at the meeting that the funding for this project is guaranteed for five years. What happens at the end of five years if we are faced with a government with different priorities? Maple Ridge recently had a temporary supportive housing complex close because their funding ended. Many of the tenants ended up on the street, creating new tent cities and sleeping on private properties. What guarantees do we have that this won't happen here?

I was very disappointed with the lack of early community engagement around this project and I hope a genuine effort will be made to communicate with the community prior to the public hearing. There have been some valid questions asked that I think deserve answers and I hope the rush to push this proposal through the Township approval process won't outweigh the need to build trust and relationships with the community. If we're going to be neighbours, this matters.

I attended the public open house last night held at the Langley events Centre regarding this Supportive Housing Project at the old Quality Inn Site at 6465 200th Street in Langley. I am a FOIPPA resident of this neighborhood and have raised and are still raising Solding children here.

While I appreciate the forum last night which allowed residents and stakeholders to raise their concerns over this project, I did not have a chance to raise my biggest concern/frustration.

First, I will mention my concerns that were raised that I heavily agree with - this is NOT THE RIGHT LOCATION for supportive housing.

- 1. How can residents of this supportive housing project not be held accountable with drug or alcohol testing to be able to reside here? If they are given housing with tax payer dollars to get them off the streets and out of the problems they have, this should be the first requirement!!
- 2. This location is right behind a liquor store makes absolutely no sense.
- 3. This location is extremely close to an elementary school the risks of this are obvious, and I DO NOT want to wait for an incident with a person living in this supportive housing to occur before it is dealt with.
- 4. This area is secluded and no matter what anyone behind this project says 2 people cannot handle 49 units, including the outside of the property and all of its secluded areas it is impossible! Especially when some units will house couples......we could have up to 98 people to be looked after by 2!

So, on top of this, my biggest concern/frustration is the fact that BC Housing said the reason they are proposing this project for this location here is only because the building became available. There was no study or any insight into why this site was appropriate and the right choice for this program. Last, we were told that BC Housing was opening this proposal for discussion last night to hear what we thought - but I am going to call you on that.

- 1. You have already bought the property BEFORE asking the community what they thought.
- 2. You are already spending taxpayer dollars renovating this site BEFORE you have rezoning approval to run this supportive housing project here.

These two points to me make me feel like this project is being rammed down our throats and you truly do not care about what the residents of this neighborhood, that we live in and call home, (which you seem to have no care for at all!!!) think. I also strongly feel like BC Housing would not have purchased this property and started spending their I'm assuming tight budget on if they did not have a back room deal with the township before the purchase.

So I ask you and will ask the Langley Township the same question - was this already a done deal at the time the property purchase papers were signed off on? 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Maple Ridge residents rally against planned homeless shelter

Province plans to turn vacant Quality Inn hotel into a homeless shelter

In March, people living in Maple Ridge took to the streets to protest a plan to convert a Quality Inn into a homeless shelter. (CBC)

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- Vancouver's new homeless plan: shipping container-sized portable homes
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Hundreds of Maple Ridge residents rallied Saturday in opposition to the planned conversion of a vacant hotel into a homeless shelter.

The provincial government is in the process of buying the Quality Inn Hotel along Lougheed Highway near 217 Street for \$5.5 million. The facility would then be run by B.C. Housing as what's termed a permanent low barrier shelter — meaning addicts would be able to use drugs on the premises.

That has area residents concerned about what it will mean for their community.

"It's going to enable them. It's going to make it easier for them to do what they do and continue doing it," said area resident Sandra Trainer. "It's not a solution."

Other residents say the province should have done a better job consulting with them on the plan.

"There has been no process for public input. No impact study," said Caroline Madsen. "And, no neighbourhood consultation."

Former mayor Ernie Daykin says homelessness has been a long-standing problem in Maple Ridge. (CBC)

Former Maple Ridge mayor Ernie Daykin says homelessness has been a longstanding problem in the city, but has worsened since the closure of the Riverview Hospital in 2012.

"This is an important issue. not only for Maple Ridge but for other communities. It's a problem and challenge that's been 25 years in the making," said Daykin.

Last summer, a homeless camp set up by squatters led to eviction notices. A temporary shelter was set up downtown but is set to close this June.

No city councillors were among the hundreds who turned out at yesterday's rally.

B.C. Housing has committed to holding a community forum on the matter, but a date has yet to be announced.

The downtown neighbourhood where a tourist hotel is about to be transformed into housing for the homeless shouldn't be so fearful, says a resident from another part of Vancouver where the same thing happened.

That's because the city has chosen an excellent non-profit manager who "really has the best interests of the residents and the local community at heart," Lara Davis says.

Her neighbourhood, just east of the Pacific National Exhibition, was up in arms last year when the city bought the Ramada Inn on East Hastings and transformed it into interim housing.

The city recently announced it has leased the 157-room Quality Inn on Howe Street near the Granville Bridge for two years to be used as interim housing, prompting some vocal opposition from nearby condo residents.

A group has formed to express concerns and lobby the city about it, saying members fear it will become a slum and source of crime as they claim has happened with other projects for the homeless.

The Quality Inn, according to a city letter being sent to residents this week, will be managed by the Community Builders Foundation. That group is also managing the East Hastings hotel.

Ms. Davis said the residents around the Quality Inn are "lucky" to be getting Community Builders as the managers.

"I was really opposed to it in the beginning," said Ms. Davis, a realtor who works, lives and volunteers at her child's school, in the area. "I was nervous for my community."

But Community Builders and its director, Gordon Wiebe, worked hard with the neighbourhood, she said. Mr. Wiebe even moved into the hotel himself for four months to make sure it was running well, she said.

"They did what they said they were going to do. They said they were going to screen people and decided on a case-by-case basis how things were going."

There was one case of dial-a-dope deliveries being made to the building and that was dealt with instantly, said Ms. Davis, who sits on a neighbourhood committee that meets monthly with the operators.

She said people who have moved into the hotel participated in a community day in mid-September that brought them together with other residents in the neighbourhood.

A spokesperson for Community Builders, which is an international organization, said Mr. Wiebe is out of the country and couldn't provide information about exactly how the Quality Inn will be managed.

City Manager Penny Ballem said the group will also be getting support from mental-health specialists, including well-known psychiatrist Bill MacEwan, who has worked with people from the Downtown Eastside for years.

A letter is going out to 2,800 property owners within four blocks of the hotel and of a nearby winter shelter, as well as to 1,000 rental and business addresses to let them know about a community meeting on Oct. 29, according to the city.

The city, Vancouver Coastal Health, the police and Community Builders will be there to talk to residents and business owners.

Ms. Ballem said that, although a few residents have been vocal in their opposition to the shelter and hotel, they are among only a handful of complaints the city has received about the two operations.

"There's certainly not a neighbourhood uproar here. There are a lot who are supportive in the community."

She and the mayor both said the Quality Inn, which the city is planning to open as interim housing in November, was rushed because a developer approached the city only recently with an offer to lease it for two years.

"This came up very quickly and we grabbed it," she said.

GOWANUS — If you call the inexplicably busy Super 8 hotel on Third Avenue and ask if they have any homeless people living there, you'll get a flat-out "no."

But the Department of Homeless Services has a different story — the city is renting 53 of the 57 rooms at the Super 8 hotel on 267 Third Ave., between Union and President streets, to single, homeless men and has been since August 2015, DHS spokesman Isaac McGinn told DNAinfo New York this week.

On Tuesday, a receptionist, who declined to give her name, claimed that is not the case even when she was confronted with the city's confirmation.

"No, there are no homeless people staying here and if you want further comment speak with my manager," she said. "We used to have a family shelter here a few months ago but that stopped a few months ago. It's just regular customers now."

She linked the sudden swell of occupants, who have booked up the hotel through mid-December, to simply being "busy." The hotel's general manager did not respond to requests for comment.

DHS spokesman McGinn said one other hotel in the area is being used to house homeless people but citing privacy reasons, declined to say which one.

Queens Councilman Eric Ulrich hopes to crack down on that type of discrepancy and on Wednesday introduced a bill that would require hotel owners inform patrons if they house the homeless and force inns contracted with DHS to visibly post signs stating such.

"The public has a right to know whether or not that hotel or that motel is also being used as a temporary homeless shelter," said Ulrich.

After this story was published DHS replied to DNAinfo's earlier request for comment with their reservations on the bill. "Any disclosure of confidential client information, including addresses where homeless New Yorkers may be sheltered, is a violation of Social Services Law that could put our clients at risk, including domestic violence

survivors, as they work to stabilize their lives," McGinn wrote in the emailed statement. "While we are reviewing the legislation, we have significant concerns about the impact it could have on our homeless neighbors."

A surge of the city booking rooms for the homeless has peppered the five boroughs with inns standing in as shelters. An April report by Comptroller Scott Stringer showed that the number of rooms booked by the city jumped from 2,069 last October to 2,852 in February. Figures of homeless New Yorkers staying in hotels surged from 5,881 to 7,790 during that same period.

But a lack of notice by the city and hotel owners has prompted communities to rail against the facilities.

Vacationers are also left in the dark.

"Unfortunately, the location seems to have a contract with NYC public housing or is perhaps a shelter for women with small children," one hotel guest wrote last summer in a TripAdvisor review for the Gowanus Super 8. "I don't have a problem if the hotel is providing a valuable public resource, but I think it should be disclosed upfront for the general public in deciding where to stay on vacation."

Some locals have also taken notice of the inn's homeless residents and believe they could be linked to an uptick of folks slumped in the streets who appear to be on drugs and who've been spotted publicly urinating, said one long-time Gowanus resident who lives two blocks from the inn.

"At night it's a totally different world here," said Joann Amitrano, who lives in a three-family home on Carroll Street between Third and Fourth avenues. "I've found people laying in front of my property on drugs — it's become like the '80s in the last year. I don't understand it since the hotel would give them a place to be, but I don't think it's people who are paying thousands a month to be here."

Witnessing people collapsed on nearby streets has become a regular occurrence, according to another block local.

"It's really bizarre," said Monica Reese. "I've noticed a lot more people who look like they're on drugs and need help when I come home from work lately. I've heard rumors that some homeless people are staying at the hotel and it makes me wonder."

Of the city's more than 60,000 homeless individuals, there are currently 308 who most recently lived in Community Board 6 — which includes Park Slope, Gowanus, Carroll Gardens and Red Hook — but the neighborhood has beds for only 282 people, according to DHS data.

Part of the city's plan to address the homeless crisis is to close all interim shelters at commercial hotels and cluster sites, and replace them with 90 new shelters across the

city for a more localized approached that allows homeless New Yorkers to remain in the communities they last lived.

"As we implement our borough-based approach, we are ending the use of all cluster sites and commercial hotel facilities citywide, including the two commercial hotels in this district," wrote McGinn in an emailed statement, although he could not offer a specific timeline for when the two commercial hotels in Community Board 6 will be phased out.

The Park Slope area is slated for a boost of 250 shelter beds and locals and area politicians met with city officials in May and June to discuss the selection process. No specific location is being considered at the moment.

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1/ PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to supplement the fulfillment of policy 4.3 Meeting Reporting, as outlined in the Developer Led Public Information Meetings policy 07-164, as part of the Township of Langley rezoning application process:

4.3 MEETING REPORTING

The applicant is required to provide a record of the meeting to Community Development Division not less than three weeks prior to the presentation of the application to Council. The results shall be submitted in summary report format (to be advanced to Council as an Appendix to the staff report) and should include the following information:

- Sign-in sheet from the meeting;
- Completed feedback / questionnaire forms;
- Summary of comments received;
- Discussion of how any issues / concerns identified from the meeting and/or feedback forms are addressed in the project.

A Meeting Report was submitted to the Township on November 6, 2017, summarizing input received through the first public information meeting held on October 30, 2017 (plus all emails sent to the designated email address up to and including November 6, 2017.) This second report seeks to supplement the information provided to the Township of Langley with all input collected up to and including June 4, 2018, from small-group Community Dialogue Sessions held on May 15, May 17, May 25 and May 26; and the Community Open House and Dialogue held on May 28, 2018.

2/ BACKGROUND

On October 10, 2017, BC Housing submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the property located at 6465 201 Street. The property is current zoned as Community Commercial Zone (C-2) and BC Housing is seeking Institutional (P-2) zoning.

The Proposal: BC Housing proposes to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, with an office for the Langley Intensive Case Management (ICM) team funded through Fraser Health. Each of these units would provide a self-contained studio home, with bathroom and kitchenette, for Langley residents who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness, that need additional supports to maintain housing. All applicants would go through an assessment process, sign a program agreement and pay rent. This housing would help to move people off of the streets and out of shelters towards stable and safe housing, and improved quality of life. Stepping Stone Community Services Society has been selected as the operator and manager and would staff the building on a 24/7 basis with a team who will work closely with tenants to connect them to support services.

The need:

The 2017 Metro Vancouver Homeless Count found at least 206 people experiencing homelessness in Langley. This number has increased by 114% in 3 years. According to local service providers, over 900 individuals currently require support from outreach workers, approximately 180 individuals seeking shelter are turned away monthly from Gateway of Hope, and the 80 rent supplements scattered in the private rental market are consistently allocated. To ensure that people can move off the street and out of shelters, there is a need for safe and stable housing with supports. Without this, people will continue to experience homelessness in Langley. Homelessness is usually the result of many factors including a lack of adequate income, access to affordable housing and medical services, experiences of discrimination, traumatic events and personal crisis, physical health problems or disabilities and mental health concerns.

3/ NOTIFICATION

On May 9, a letter was sent to all neighbours within a 1KM radius (see Appendix A), with an invitation to the Community Dialogue Sessions and Community Open House. BC Housing has received feedback that the letter did not arrive to some addresses until May 14 / 15, or at all, for some individuals who live within the 1KM radius. The direct mail drop was coordinated through Canada Post on behalf of a local print company and they confirm that anyone with a Red Dot on their mailbox would not have received this mailing. In response, BC Housing added two additional sessions at recommended after-work hours to ensure people had the opportunity to attend a small-group dialogue session.

Print advertising for the Community Dialogue Sessions and Community Open House ran in the Langley Times on May 11, May 16 and May 23; and the Langley Advance on May 17 and May 24. Online advertising was multi-pronged with both newspapers advertising on their websites May 11 - May 28; the Fraser Valley News online advertisement starting May 18; and geo-targeted advertisements and posts through Facebook and Twitter starting May 10. For advertising see Appendix A.

The <u>Langley Times</u> and <u>Langley Advance</u> published the session dates as part of articles on the proposal. The recent community events were also noted on the project website found here: www.bchousing.org/partner-services/public-engagement/projects/langley-supportive-housing

4/ COMMUNITY DIALOGUE SESSIONS SUMARY

Community Dialogue Sessions were planned to invite small groups (maximum 30 people) of community members to a two-hour session to see a brief presentation, then discuss questions and concerns with representatives from BC Housing, Stepping Stone, Fraser Health and Langley Community Services Society. In total, four sessions* were held, engaging 47 community members. Of the 40 comment forms collected, 35% heard about the sessions from direct invitation through the mail; 27% through word of mouth; 23% through newspaper advertising and 80% found the session to be helpful (Appendix E.) Each of the sessions had diversity of viewpoints contributing to a rich dialogue. The following summarizes the attendance, highlights and unique questions or concerns (beyond what has already been noted to date for this proposal) heard at the four sessions that were held. For transcripts of each session see Appendix F.

Tuesday May 15

Highlights: Eight individuals participated in this session. Most were neighbours of the proposed site (and Gateway of Hope shelter), and most had concerns for the proposal, with one person expressing support.

Summary: Concerns around tenants having overnight guests for lengthy time periods and traffic in and out of the building. Comments that community concerns need to be continually addressed after the development of the project as well. Concerns that residents who are housed there should not be using drugs. Concerns that local law enforcement do not adequately address drug use/theft/safety issues when called. "More will come".

Thursday, May 17

Highlights: 10 individuals participated in this session, including local service providers. Many questions about operations and model of housing.

Summary: Multiple questions about the function of the ICM team and how they will interact with tenants of the development. Community church in the neighbourhood is positive for the local homeless population, offering food and coffee on Wednesday mornings and Sunday evenings. Good police presence in Douglas Park area. A few positive comments on the good work that Gateway of Hope does as well as the outreach of ICM and Stepping Stone in hospitals. Several asks for clarification of the program agreement for tenants. Questions about continual development of tenants and encouraging tenants to find employment. Concerns around if the development is built, more homeless population will appear for a chance at being housed. Comments around the need for local residents to be continually kept informed on the development.

Friday, May 25

Highlights: 19 individuals participated in this session. General consensus is support for people who are homeless and understanding the need for the development in the community. Lots of lived experiences in this session.

Summary: This session had many participants that have been impacted in some way by homelessness or addiction. Awareness was raised about a group called "Rig Riders" who volunteer to remove needles from various sites if called. Quotes from participants to illustrate need for this housing:

- "In April our neighbour's son past away in young man was FO was semi homeless staying sometimes with his parents."
 "My son was diagnosed with FOIPPA s.22(1) a few years ago. Now there are drug issues. We
- "My son was diagnosed with FOIPPA s.22(1) a few years ago. Now there are drug issues. We have been trying to navigate a system that is very difficult. When I look at people living on the street I see my son and we are able to help him now but we are not going to be here forever. I think about the people who are struggling with mental health issues and how easy it is for them to become homeless. I want to believe that we live in a community that will look after those that are disenfranchised and can be re-connected with the community."
- "On a personal note, I would like to share that my daughter was very close to being homeless. She had to be re-located to another community. There are so many of my daughters in this community. I see how many patients in our community don't have people in our community that can support them."
- "When I was 16 my mom, brother and I experienced homelessness. We were Church members and we had a huge family but my mother was so mortified that she could not pay the rent and we were evicted. She felt she had created it. We spent three months navigating it. A boyfriend's family opened up their home for us to stay. I am saying that housing is so important from survival to heal, move on and thrive."
- "I am resident of Langley and recently found myself homeless so I am

 This housing complex is perfect for me and others who want to stay in this community. I am on the community. I am happy out here. I have been looking for a place but it is hard. Rents are high. It is a great opportunity for people to get back on their feet."
- "I think we would be unrealistic to think that all people that are on the streets want to come
 inside and want help. 49 units is a great place to start. We need to start somewhere. I will
 reiterate then our neighbours son would not have died."

Saturday, May 26

Highlights: 10 individuals participated in this session, most neighbours opposed with concerns focused primarily on tenants using drugs at the site and negatively impacting the local community. **Summary:** Multiple questions about tenant program agreement and if drug use is allowed onsite. Concerns about adequate staffing. Comments around the need for zero tolerance of drug use onsite, even in tenant's room. Comment from attendee who is a teacher, is worried about local child protection and local families impacted by the development. Concerns about rising crime in the area as well as increased homeless population once development is constructed. Question about how the proposed housing would impact on the street homeless population in the area.

^{*} Five Community Dialogue Sessions were originally planned for May 12, May 14, May 15, May 17, May 25. May 12 and May 14 were cancelled due to low registration and May 22 and May 26 were added after BC Housing received feedback that people had not received notice until May 14/15 and that the times were not ideal for those who work daytime hours and commute home to Langley. May 22 was subsequently cancelled after low registration.

5/ OPEN HOUSE SUMMARY

The May 28th Community Open House was held from 5:00 pm to 7:30 pm at the Langley Events Centre located at 7888 200 Street in Langley. After the doors opened, the community could view display boards (Appendix B) and speak with representatives from BC Housing, Fraser Health, Stepping Stone Community Services Society and Langley Community Services Society. At 5:30pm a short presentation was given by BC Housing reflecting an overview of the proposal and common themes that had come up as part of the community dialogue sessions. From 5:50pm to 7:50pm, participants had the opportunity to ask questions of a panel of representatives and make statements about the proposal (Appendix G.) The session was extended by 20 minutes to allow for comments to be heard. Participants were encouraged to complete comment forms.




6/ SUMMARY OF COMMENTS RECEIVED

In total, 174 comments have been received between November 6, 2017 and June 4, 2018, by form (submitted both as part of the dialogue sessions and open house) and by email (Appendix D.) The breakdown of stance by method of submission is noted, with the caveat that some individuals may have submitted feedback through more than one source. 74% of comments came from people identifying as Township of Langley residents.

- 88 comments (50%) expressed support of the proposal;
- 69 comments (40%) expressed opposition to the proposal;
- 17 comments (9%) expressed a neutral or undecided view of proposal or sought information.






The pie chart on the right reflects the stance reported in the November 2017 summary report. In comparison, 81% of comments indicated opposition to the proposal.

The key community interests identified in the open house are related to:

- Future Tenants;
- Management of the housing;
- Services provided;

- Process for this proposal.

The responses to the following interests are a collaborative effort between BC Housing, Stepping Stone Community Services Society, Fraser Health and Langley Community Services Society.

FUTURE TENANTS

Understanding the housing type eg."Is this like the Gateway of Hope?"

A number of participants have referred the proposal as a shelter or similar to the Gateway of Hope. The proposal for 6465 201 Street is for supportive housing, not a shelter. Supportive housing is a home, not a temporary place to sleep.

Recommendation to use this property for a non-homeless population

There is no supportive housing currently available in Langley. There are transitional units available at the Gateway of Hope, but these are consistently full. People experiencing homelessness in Langley can currently access temporary shelter beds at the Gateway of Hope, but they turn away approximately 180 individuals per month. There are scattered rent supplements in the private market, but these are currently allocated. This proposed supportive housing is urgently needed for people who are ready to leave the streets and shelter system for safe and stable housing.

Tenant selection, specifically what is a 'Langley resident'

BC Housing and Stepping Stone Community Services Society would collaborate with local service providers on a thoughtful and thorough assessment process with local service providers to ensure an appropriate mix of residents with the right supports live in the housing. Every potential tenant would be considered on an individual basis to ensure that the housing and services provided by the program match the support services that they need, such as life skills training, employment assistance, and help with accessing a range of social and health care services.

People who apply to live at the proposed housing would need to:

- Be over the age of 19
- Be a Langley resident* currently experiencing homelessness
- Need additional support services to maintain housing
- Pay rent
- Sign a program agreement

^{*}Langley resident refers to someone who is currently living in the Langley area, whether on the streets, in a shelter or precariously housed.

Accountability of tenants

Tenants would sign a program agreement before moving in and would be expected to abide by it. The program agreement would address expectations about appropriate and respectful behavior especially as it relates to the health and safety of themselves and others. Staff would work with tenants and the neighbours to foster good neighbourhood relations, including:

- Treating neighbours, the community and each other with consideration;
- Not making excessive noise or cause unnecessary disturbances;
- Ensuring security doors are closed properly and not letting any unknown persons into building;
- Disposing of garbage appropriately;
- Cleaning up after their pets;
- Not smoking in the common areas, including the front entrance.

Stepping Stone Community Services Society may end an agreement if a tenant is:

- Engaging or behaving in a manner which is abusive and/or a threat to the mental or physical health or safety of anyone in the building/community;
- Significantly and repeatedly disrupting the quiet enjoyment of other participants / neighbours;
- Engaging in willful vandalism or damage to the building or property.

We don't want to evict people, but if we work with people over a period of time and they continue to have the same issues, the result could be eviction. Our experience has been that eviction is a very exceptional situation. In that situation, we would work with the tenant to find alternate housing.

Visitors for tenants

As with all rental housing, tenants would be allowed guests. Visitors would need to check in at the front desk with staff. We would be aware of who is in the building at any time. If there are disturbances in the area related to tenants at the proposed housing, we would work with community agencies and the RCMP to solve the issue. We want to create a safe community both inside and outside of the proposed housing. We are committed to be a good neighbour. In our experience, non-tenants would not be hanging around outside the housing.

How will tenants be supported to move forward with their life? Is there a time frame?

The housing is intended to be transitional but without a time frame because it will look very different for different people. There would be conversations with people at the beginning that the housing is probably not a permanent home and how we can work together on getting them into their ideal housing situation. Then we support them to make a plan on what they need to do and what they need to work on in order to get there. Stepping Stone has rent supplements to help people look at market housing. We feel confident there will be lots of people that want to take that next step.

We work with people to help them get into employment. For some people, it starts with volunteer opportunities in the community that help build their resume. We would work closely with Work BC and they have lots of links with employers that people can get work experience with. Our goal would be to create some internal positions, volunteer or casual paid, to help in the building to keep it clean and maybe help with meal preps.

MANAGEMENT OF THE HOUSING

Who will be managing this housing and what experience do they have?

The housing would be operated by Stepping Stone Community Services Society, an experienced and professional supportive housing operator. Their responsibilities would include property management, operations management and resident selection, in collaboration with BC Housing and community partners. Once people move in, staff would remain on-site 24/7 to support residents. The Intensive Case Management Team would also provide services to residents.

Stepping Stone Community Services Society has been providing services in Langley and the surrounding area for over 30 years, assisting people to integrate in to the community through social, housing and employment opportunities.

Stepping Stone Community Services Society would ensure that all staff have the appropriate training and skills necessary to support the residents. The required training, as required by BC Housing, includes, but is not limited to: crisis prevention training; First Aid/CPR; Indigenous awareness training; mental health first aid training; domestic violence and safety planning; substance use awareness and safety training; and trauma-informed training.

BC Housing would have expectations on administration and management of the housing. A Community Advisory Committee would be formed to meet monthly and is formed several months before opening. It will be made up of formal partners (Township of Langley, RCMP, Fraser Health and BC Housing) and nearby neighbours and businesses. This is the avenue to raise concerns, the record of the responses to the concerns and ways to learn and improve our practice.

Also planned for the site is space for an Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. The ICM team, managed by Fraser Health Authority, follows a 'Housing First' philosophy, which helps support people who are homeless to obtain and maintain housing. The team assists people with any significant challenges they have related to health, substance use, mental health, poverty, and education by connecting them to support services and treatment. Using a team-based approach with clinicians, nurses and community-support workers, the ICM team will provide comprehensive assessments for people, and help them access treatment and rehabilitation services.

SERVICES PLANNED FOR TENANTS

What is supportive housing?

Supportive housing is a self-contained studio home with supports provided on-site, to ensure people can achieve and maintain housing stability. Supports could include outreach workers, wellness checks, life skills training, employment assistance, connection and referral to community services and support groups. All tenants would sign a program agreement (similar to a tenancy agreement) and would pay rent. We have found that supportive housing has a positive effect on residents' housing stability, employment capabilities, mental and physical health. When residents are ready to move onto independent housing, staff help residents to view apartments, and liaise with landlords to support stable tenancies.

What do you mean by 'supports'?

There are a variety of support services planned. Each tenant may require different supports. All tenants will receive individualized case planning to further develop life and social skills such as employment planning and managing the transition to independence and recovery, as well as programming space to facilitate training and food preparation. Other services will include outreach workers, wellness checks, connection and referral to community services and support groups. The Intensive Case Management (ICM) team will be on-site to provide enhanced primary support services.

The goal is to provide high support housing opportunities for people who may or may not have substance use concerns. We do not discriminate against a person based on their level of need. Housing applicants will be assessed to ensure they are matched with the right level of support services they need to remain housed and live a more healthy, stable life. Tenants of supportive housing live independently and will have direct access to the support services they need. All tenants will sign agreements in regards appropriate and respectful behaviours. Substance use and mental health challenges will be addressed through onsite and community supports.

What is the Intensive Case Management (ICM) team?

The ICM team has been operating in Langley since October 2017. The team includes a psychiatrist, a nurse practitioner, 3 case managers, register nurse, registered psychiatric nurse, a peer support worker and a housing procurement specialist and an addictions counsellor and administration. Every client has access to each one of these professionals. We do not tell people what is best for their lives. They tell us what they want for their lives and we help them with that process. If people on our case load were able to access services today they would not be on our case load. Our staff are available 12 hours a day and on call for the other 12 hours 7 days a week.

As the clients' goals are achieved, those individuals are able to move onto other services that will better fit their needs and the ICM will be able to take on additional people. The ICM team is an outreach team and they go out to see people. If people are living in the proposed support housing, the ICM team will work with them there. There will not be an office where there is traffic coming into the building to see the ICM team.

Why can't you make the housing abstinence-based?

It's important to note that not all homeless people have addictions and not all people with addictions are homeless. The 2017 Homeless Count found that 53% of people experiencing homelessness report having addiction issues. A recent study shows that 80% of people with mental health and addiction issues developed these issues after becoming homeless, not before becoming homeless.

Stepping Stone has been providing successful Housing First services to Langley residents since 2015. We anticipate that not all tenants would have substance abuse issues, but all tenants will have the opportunity to move forward with their lives. The approach for the proposed housing is Housing First. Our experience is that having a home reduces mental health and addiction issues. People are better able to move forward with their lives if they are first housed. Housing is provided first and then supports are provided including physical and mental health, education, employment, substance abuse and community connections. We want to work with people on their issues, but it difficult to do this until they have a home. If we leave them on the streets, nothing will change for them or the community.

Housing First Principles

- People are better able to move forward with their lives if they are first housed.
- Housing is provided first and then supports are provided including physical and mental health, education, employment, substance abuse and community connections.

Is it an issue to mix abstinent with non-abstinent tenants?

People will not be using substances in common areas. We don't anticipate any issues having people living in the same building who are in different stages of recovery. In fact, it's our experience that tenants will help each other be accountable in making healthy choices.

POTENTIAL IMPACT ON NEIGHBOURHOOD

BC Housing and Stepping Stone are committed to be a good neighbour in developing housing that is an asset to the community. The development of this site will be an attribute to the community. The site will be accessible only to tenants and support staff. People who are currently experiencing homelessness, whether living in shelters or on the street, will now have access to housing with the supports they need to achieve and maintain housing stability. These are homes for people. It's our experience that people take pride in their homes. All tenants in supportive housing have made a choice to work towards living a healthy, stable life. Concern for potential risk to children in the area

As the operator of this proposed site, we are also concerned about safety of neighbourhood and people that would live in the building. People would be signing a program agreement that outlines that they will be expected to be respectful of people in the building and the neighbourhood. We would create a Community Advisory Committee which was described in the presentation. It will have community representation, people that live in the community, businesses, RCMP, Township Bylaw, BC Housing to talk about what people's concerns are and if there are issues that are really happening then how can we address those.

What security features will be implemented?

There are security measures in place but there will not be security guards on site. There will be an environmental assessment done by the RCMP for best safety management. There will be increased lighting around the building, increased security cameras and we will work with the RCMP and bylaws to make sure there is an increased presence around the community.

What is plan for RCMP involvement?

Stepping Stone's intention as the operator is to work closely with the RCMP. We have discussed with them that they would have a regular presence at the site. The RCMP has indicated that they would become an active partner in making sure the community is safe and the project is a success. They are already a partner in working with people who are homeless in the community. Langley also has three mental health and homelessness liaison officers and their role is to respond to whatever needs there are. They have multiple tools at their disposal, but until the problem surfaces they cannot speculate on solutions.

How will this housing impact on the current street homeless population?

The housing would bring 49 people out of the shelter system and off the streets. People may be coming directly off the streets, but if they are coming from the shelter system, this frees up a bed for someone else to come off of the streets. People currently on the street will benefit from this housing, whether directly or indirectly.

ACCOUNTABILITY

This is the wrong location.

We are committed to developing housing that is an asset to the community and the safety of the residents, staff, neighbours and community is a priority. BC Housing has built supportive housing across the province in partnership with experiencing non-profit housing providers, integrating this housing into residential areas, which is important to the success of the people living there. People experiencing homelessness are already in our neighborhood, this proposed housing will provide an opportunity to come off of the street and out of shelters, into a home.

Stepping Stone would develop a Community Advisory Committee to mitigate and address any related concerns that come forward, with representation from BC Housing, Fraser Health, RCMP, local businesses, community organization and community members.

The former Quality Inn hotel is in relatively good condition, meaning renovation for its proposed use will be quicker and more cost-effective than a new build. The proximity to transit, community amenities, and health services is also important.

I won't feel safe if this goes through

We would be committed to building a safe community both inside and outside the housing with:

- Experience: Stepping Stone has over 30 years of experience in Langley.
- Staffing: Minimum of 2 staff would be onsite 24/7 to support residents, manage building, be available to respond directly to any related concerns that arise in a timely manner.
- Resident Mix: Resident selection would be based on ability of staff to provide right level of support to all residents.
- Property Maintenance: Regular sweeps of property and immediate area would ensure cleanliness.
- Design Features: Optimized lighting, security cameras, fob access only, staffed reception, contained outdoor space for smoking and dog walking, would be implemented.
- Agreements: Residents would sign program agreement around expectations.
- Community Advisory Committee: Stepping Stone would develop a Community Advisory
 Committee to mitigate and address any related concerns that come forward, with representation
 from BC Housing, Fraser Health, RCMP, local businesses, community organization and community
 members.

We have about 10,000 units across BC in a range of communities. Some of them are very close to daycares and senior's homes. BC Housing and Stepping Stone Community Services Society are committed to be a good neighbour in developing new supportive housing that is an asset to the community. The development of this site would be an attribute to the community. The site would be accessible only to tenants and support staff. People who are currently experiencing homelessness, whether living in shelters or on the street, would now have access to housing with the supports they need to achieve and maintain housing stability. Timber Grove in Surrey

- 2010 52 units of supportive housing proposed in a residential area, close to businesses /schools.
- 80% opposed / top concerns: general safety, crime, drug use, safety of seniors/ people with disabilities / nearby students.
- Community Advisory Committee formed during site development, creating forum for voicing concerns and answering questions.
- In 2018, many neighbours show support for the project.
- Residents are proud of their home, engaging with neighbors and frequenting local shops and restaurants.

Request for statistics on crime surrounding supportive housing

Our case studies show that police calls decrease within a few months of supportive housing opening: www.bchousing.org/research-centre/library/tools-developing-social-housing

As an example, a recent study on the new Marpole modular supportive housing showed that between December and April the actual crime within that area has decreased by 24% since the housing opened.

Process

Misconception that this is a 'done deal' and May 28 open house was a public hearing

The municipal process for this proposed housing has not yet had first reading, let alone a public hearing. The Township of Langley will be reviewing the application to rezone this property. For the property to operate as supportive housing, the zoning needs to change from Community Commercial Zone (C-2) to Institutional (P-2) zoning. BC Housing is currently engaged in community dialogue sessions to collect feedback from neighbourhood residents and businesses. All input will be submitted to the Township as part of our rezoning application to the Township. The Township will determine when they will hear first reading of the project and if next steps will occur for this project. BC Housing is committed to advancing their rezoning application to meet an urgent need for housing for people who are homeless in Langley.

Process for community engagement was unsatisfactory

We understand that some neighbours within the 1KM radius targeted by the notifications did not receive the invitation letter. The requirements for notification of a public meeting towards a rezoning application are 100 metres, with two weeks' notice given of a public meeting. We had letters sent out two weeks prior to 1KM of the site. We have also learned that the majority of the surrounding community is young families, so we advertised heavily on Facebook geotargeting the Langley area.

We received feedback that people did not feel they received adequate notice of the dialogue sessions. In response, we added two dialogue sessions (one evening session starting at 7pm and one on a Saturday.) We apologize for the short amount of notice for the sessions through the mail. Our promotions were multi-pronged and our intention is to have fulsome input from the community.

We are investigating why the Canada Post mail drop did not occur as successfully as in the fall. We do not have access to the address of people living within 1KM of the site, we rely on Canda Post mail drops to access these homes.

Addressing homeless and affordability issues – this is not enough

We acknowledge that more housing is needed for Langley. This is an important step to address an urgent need, but we will continue working with the Township and City of Langley on housing. Currently, BC Housing funds:

- Rent assistance in the private market (1,106 families and seniors + 80 rent supplements for people experiencing homelessness)
- Social housing units (409 families and seniors)
- Youth beds (6 beds just opened @ Youth Hub on 62nd Avenue)

Coming soon:

 Affordable rental housing for low-income families and seniors (82 units under construction on 72nd Avenue)






Housing Need in Langley

Homelessness is usually the result of many factors including a lack of adequate income, access to affordable housing and medical services, experiences of discrimination, traumatic events and personal crisis, physical health problems or disabilities and mental health concerns.

According to the 2017 Metro Vancouver Homeless Count:

At least 7 6 people are experiencing homelessness in Langley





50% of people have lived in Langley for more than 10 years

this number has increased 114 % in 3 years

According to local Langley non-profit service providers:

- Over 900 individuals currently require support from outreach workers
- Approximately 180 individuals seeking shelter are turned away monthly from Gateway of Hope
- The 80 rent supplements scattered in the private rental market are consistently allocated
- Over 100 individuals currently receive support from the Intense Case Management Team

This graphic is intended to show the rezoning application process for this project, as understood by BC Housing.

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

Dear Langley Township Mayor Jack Froese and Councillors,

We are a group of concerned Langley residents, who resolutely oppose the conversion of Quality Inn into supportive housing. We believe that we need to take care of our own people and homeless people are our own people. However, we strongly feel the location is not acceptable for the following reasons:

First, the proposed supportive housing project is located in the heart of densely populated Willoughby community. Elementary schools, daycare centers, family homes, senior homes, and family oriented business surround this site. On the Quality Inn side of 200th Street, there are 14 townhouse complexes. Each complex has a couple of hundred family homes. There are two elementary schools and numerous daycare centers within walking distance from this proposed site. On the other side of 200th street, there is an elementary school and countless family homes within walking distance from the proposed supportive housing site.

Second, BC liquor store is situated next door. The distance between the liquor store and the proposed supportive house is one-minute walk. The combination of densely populated area, drugs, and alcohol is a dangerous time bomb. It is beyond imagination what kind of consequences we will have to deal with in the future.

Third, the low barrier, no sobriety model adopted by BC housing for this proposed supportive housing is very worrisome. In other words, tenants living in this proposed supportive housing would be allowed to be active drug users.

Based on the information provided by 2017 Homeless Count in Metro Vancouver Final Report/ September 2017, 53% homeless population are addicted to substances while 38% suffer from mental illness.

With that high percentage of tenants who have substance addiction issues and mental illness, is there a plan for drug treatment program and for mental illness treatment program in place? Are there drug addiction counsellor, clinical counsellor, psychiatrist, and physician on site to guide, mentor, counsel, and treat them with medication if necessary? Is there a plan for community risk assessment and management? Is there a plan to manage the safety of its own tenants?

It is very dangerous to mix drugs and alcohol. With such high percentage of tenants who are active drug users, plus drugs some tenants will take for mental illness treatment, the

mixture of one or two substances and alcohol will bring the deadly consequence of violent thoughts and behaviour, anger, stroke, vomiting, paranoia, heart problem, confusion, overdose, and death, etc. The liquor next to the proposed supportive housing is really problematic.

If this model fails, it will be unsafe for its own tenants inside the space of the proposed supportive housing, and the problems will be overflowed into the surrounding community. Remember this site is surrounded by elementary schools, daycare centers, senior homes, family homes, and family oriented businesses. Furthermore, because the area is so densely populated, the negative ripple effect in the surrounding community will be serious.

Based on the data BC housing provided in the information meeting report, 86% of people attended BC housing led information meeting opposed the proposed location. There were approximately 500 people attended the meeting.

We initiated an online petition and paper petition to oppose the location of this proposed project. So far we have 1416 people in the community signed our petitions. We have 301 people signed paper petition. Here is the link for online petition.

We are asking you to reject BC housing's application of rezoning the Quality Inn. However, we are asking you to assist BC housing to find an alternative site to house the homeless.

We need your support and advocacy on behalf of the majority of Willoughby and Langley Meadows residents. We wish to thank you for your support.

Dear Mayor Froese and Langley Township Councillors,

I would like to communicate to you that the location of the proposed supportive housing project in Willoughby is unacceptable. The site is to a certain degree a dangerous time bomb to its own tenants and to the surrounding community.

The 2017 Report on Homelessness in the Metro Vancouver collected the following data. It reported that 53% of the homeless population are addicted to drugs and 38% of the homeless population suffer from mental illness.

A very large liquor store is located next to the proposed supportive house project. The distance between the liquor store and the proposed supportive house is literally about a one- minute walk.

There are many dangers related to mixing drugs and alcohol:

First. Mixing two or more drugs with alcohol would bring with it the risk of overdose and death for these tenants. Mixing alcohol and cocaine may result in heart damage, stroke, seizures, anger, vomiting, coma, etc.

Second. Pairing alcohol with heroin brings with it a greater risk of mood swing, overdose, respiratory failure, and death.

Third. Research suggests that combining alcohol and cocaine may also increase the risk of violent thoughts and behaviours while pairing alcohol and marijuana will increase impaired coordination and judgment.

Fourth. Mixing alcohol with prescription drugs like painkillers antidepressants, and antipsychotics are also deadly. The side effects can include mood swing, impaired judgment, confusion, overdose, and death.

Finally, the most deadly side effect of mixing alcohol and antidepressants can lead to a condition called pathological intoxication. This means the combination of these two substances will lower inhibitions related to committing violent and sexual acts.

I repeat. Based on the data that was provided by the 2017 Report on Homelessness in the Lower Mainland, approximately 53% of the proposed supportive housing tenants will be active drug users in the low barrier and no sobriety model. Furthermore, 38% of its tenants suffer from mental illness. In other words, the majority of the tenants will take one or two substances for the purpose of addiction control or treatment. Is it appropriate therefore to locate the proposed supportive house next door to a very large liquor store?

In my opinion, the liquor store will produce deadly consequences to the tenants of the

proposed supportive housing project as well as disrupting the surrounding community.

For the well being of the supportive housing tenants and Langley children and families, I ask you to reject BC Housing's application to rezone Quality Inn. Instead please assist BC Housing to find an alternative site in Langley that will be farther away from the liquor store, elementary schools, day care centres and family homes in order to house the homeless.

I did attend the October 30 meeting and did not hear any clear, firm and transparent responses to my concerns. Prior to the meeting in fact, I stopped at Wal-mart to shop and was approached for money by several homeless panhandlers. Hmmmmmm. Ironic?

I understand very well the concept of Supportive Housing, Harm Reduction and Intensive Case Management Teams having led several initiatives myself. Each have had clear written Terms of Reference, Objectives and were transparent in their cost. I cannot say the same for BC Housing's presentation on October 30. It was vague, theoretical and ill prepared to inform the community.

What I hear loud and clear from the Langley community is NOT contempt and discompassion for the homeless community and vulnerable populations. In fact, I hear the opposite.

What I hear is empathy and compassion which support long existing and more vulnerable communities in The Langleys which do not have the political and media 'sexiness' that homelessness and fentanyl do. For example, supportive housing for adults with developmental disabilities currently living with aging caregivers, seniors living in poverty after having supported our local economy for years and low income working families who need stable housing for child school enrollment and family development.

The response to one community member's question of why the Quality Inn was bought for the purpose of homeless supportive housing of "because it was there" is unprofessional and nonaccountable. BC Housing needs to own its actions and admit when errors in judgement and due diligence/fair process are made sans public consultation prior to spend.

This location for this purpose is irresponsible and completely inappropriate. I hope both TOL and Langley Cities will support the majority.

We are a group of concerned Willoughby residents, who resolutely oppose the conversion of Quality Inn into supportive housing. We believe that we need to take care of our own people and homeless people are our own people. However, we strongly feel the location is not acceptable for the following reasons:

First, the proposed supportive housing project is located in the heart of densely populated Willoughby community. Elementary schools, daycare centers, family homes, senior homes, and family oriented business surround this site. On the Quality Inn side of 200th Street, there are 14 townhouse complexes. Each complex has a couple of hundred family homes. There are two elementary schools and numerous day care centers within walking distance from this proposed site. On the other side of 200th street, there is an elementary school and countless family homes within walking distance from the proposed supportive housing site.

Second, BC liquor store is situated next door. The distance between the liquor store and the proposed supportive house is one-minute walk. The combination of densely populated area, drugs, and alcohol is a dangerous time bomb. It is beyond imagination what kind of consequences we will have to deal with in the future.

Third, the low barrier, no sobriety model adopted by BC housing for this proposed supportive housing is very worrisome. In other words, tenants living in this proposed supportive housing would be allowed to be active drug users.

Based on the information provided by 2017 Homeless Count in Metro Vancouver Final Report/ September 2017, 53% homeless population are addicted to substances while 38% suffer from mental illness.

With that high percentage of tenants who have substance addiction issues and mental illness, is there a plan for drug treatment program and for mental illness treatment program in place? Are there drug addiction counsellor, clinical counsellor, psychiatrist, and physician on site to guide, mentor, counsel, and treat them with medication if necessary? Is there a plan of community risk assessment and management? Is there a plan to manage the safety of its own tenants?

It is very dangerous to mix drugs and alcohol. With such high percentage of tenants who are active drug users, plus drugs some tenants will take for mental illness treatment, the mixture of one or two substances and alcohol will bring the deadly consequence of violent thoughts and behaviour, anger, stroke, vomiting, paranoia, heart problem, confusion, overdose, and death, etc. The liquor next to the proposed supportive housing is really problematic.

If this model fails, it will be unsafe for its own tenants inside the space of the proposed supportive

housing, and the problems will be overflowed into the surrounding community. Remember this site is surrounded by elementary schools, daycare centers, senior homes, family homes, and family oriented businesses. Furthermore, because of the area is so densely populated, the negative ripple effect in the surrounding community will be serious.

Based on the data BC housing provided in the information meeting report, 86% of people attended BC housing led information meeting opposed the proposed location. There were approximately 500 people attended the meeting.



has been brought to my attention that there is a proposal for Supportive Housing for Homeless and drug addicts in my neighborhood. I learned this morning that there was a final public hearing on Monday May 28 however I was out of town Sunday through Tuesday this week so this is my first opportunity to provide my thoughts.

I currently live with a greenspace behind my property between area provides a beautiful backdrop and a noise buffer for traffic on 200th. It is densely forested which provides privacy for the residents on our street from 200th and provides an area for people to hike/walk, but also for people to congregate or hide. It is not currently a large concern but I know for a fact that drug use has happened here; however it seems to be young people experimenting with marijuana/casual users as we have not had any manjor issues with crime or noise or drug paraphernalia. I know this has happened/happens because I have personally witnessed a couple teenagers using there last summer when I was searching for my cat. As I stated, this does not seem to be a major issue today though we have seem an increase in break and enter crimes over the past couple years, but luckily fairly minimal. However the concern is this area is very close to the proposed development location and could become a favorite spot for use and abuse if more people who are addicts are in the area either to use or for transactions.

The area north of this proposal is highly residential and is a fairly affluent. There is also the issue of proximity to the recently built housing, which I believe is rental properties, at the corner of 200th and 68th Ave and the pedestrian overpass to the residential neighborhood where I live. While the rental properties have not led to any crime that I am aware of, when we combine homeless, addicts and non property owners with easy access to affluent residential neighborhoods I believe the can create the perfect storm for crime.


There are schools close by as well so the proximity of this proposal to kids is highly concerning. Not only could there be a safety issue but if the area I referenced above becomes a favourite hangout and/or transaction location the kids may be more easily influenced.

If I am correct this proposal is where the Quality Inn current resides. This property back onto the parking lot for the BC Liquor Store which I believe makes this a difficult location for people struggling with addiction and/or homelessness.

While I am very supportive of providing support and basic human rights to all individuals I believe the risks to public safety and potential for increase in break & enter crime in the area as well as the proximity to the Liquor Store make this a problematic location. I firmly believe that these types of housing options should be placed in areas either where resources already exist and/or where the impact on the community is minimal as well as an area that provides the right environment to help the individuals. This would be a dramatic change to the area and I believe would not be beneficial for either those seeking the support and housing or for those of us who already live in this community.

I attended the public meeting on Oct 30 regarding the BC Supported Housing proposal for the Quality Inn.

I live in Langley Township and have lived here for greater than 25 years.

FOIPPA s.22(1) and have been volunteering for the past 5 years in downtown Langley with the homeless population and will continue to do this. I know personally many of the folks who may benefit from the housing opportunity. I think this opportunity is a very good one, given the involvement of the Intensive Case Management Team housed there as well. This is a an excellent opportunity that Langley has been given to work at some possibilities for many of our hard to house neighbors. Langley is extremely fortunate to have BC housing and other agencies willing to fund this needed project. I am very thankful that this is being offered here.

As community members, we should be scrambling to endorse this project and to ensure that it goes ahead, as it will benefit both the community as well as the people who will be able to live there. I have seen such ideas (and influx of support) get rejected in other cities due to ignorance about how it can benefit the community.

I was disappointed and embarrassed by the way that people portray our neighbors and friends on the street. I have volunteered with many of the folks who are houseless (and could possibly be living at this housing unit in the future) regularly for about the past 5 years. Last week, I told some of them about the meeting and the fears and perceptions that were displayed. They were offended about being portrayed as people who would harm children. This doesn't fit with the folks I know. The people I have come to know and appreciate need some support in a housing situation and once stable in that setting, may possibly be successful in other aspects of their lives and perhaps move on to their own separate housing unit one day.

There needs to be much more education for those people who expressed fears. Interaction with the people whom they fear may help to learn that they are human beings. I think it would be great to have a number of homeless people represented at the next community meeting.

Another of the misconceptions voiced at the meeting was that it was a shelter. A shelter, such as the one at the Gateway, Salvation Army, is a place where people can go in the evening, sleep on a mat or cot, and have to be out in the morning around 7 or 8:00 a.m. They also need to be there at a certain time in the evening in order to get a spot. They can't bring their belongings in and they can't stay there during the day. It is a very temporary thing.

The supported and supervised 24/7 housing unit is different. People will have their own room and a bathroom. They can lock the door, keep their things, stay there during the day or as long as they want and have a little space of their own where they can feel safe, without having to be moved along regularly, have their stuff stolen or without having to stay awake all night in order to guard their stuff. Once people have this bit of stability, they are then able to work on other aspects of their lives and accept the supports that might be available for them. This supported housing is an important step in helping to break the cycle of homelessness, as it is difficult to do when living on the street.

Thank you Township of Langley and all who have been involved in bringing this much needed project to our community.

I am also interested in being part of the advisory group or other homelessness initiative projects. I have been involved in the FOIPPA s.22(1) in Abbotsford as well as through my work over many year.

I urge you to consider this as a positive step and approve of this proposed plan.

BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the Quality Inn at 6465-201 Street. BC Housing purchased the property and is undertaking renovations to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, and an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. Stepping Stone Community Services Society would operate the supportive housing units and provide support services and programming for the residents. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness.

COMMUNITY DIALOGUE: (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- Q1 What is the difference between the Gateway of Hope facility and this proposed development?
- A1 The Gateway of Hope is a shelter. The 32 people that are in the shelter can come and go during the day. In order to be on the Mat Program, you have to be there for seven in the evening. You can't be on the property during the day and there is no programming other than a community meal on certain days. It is not supportive housing. Individuals staying in the shelter can apply to go into second stage housing and that requires someone to be abstinent and they can stay up to two years.
- C2 If we are going to get people that are out on the curbs pan handling and shooting up leaving their needles all over the street with tarps set up everywhere. I have a problem with that big time.
- A2 Primarily part of the difference is that they are in different stages on the continuum of housing. This is a home. For these individuals that are coming in, this will be their own space. They will have their own fob to get into their space. The only difference between this and renting in the private market is that some of these individuals need some extra support to maintain their housing. It will not be new people coming and going on a regular basis. How long they stay depends on how much support they need before they are ready to move on to the next step of their life.
- Q3 If people show up late looking for a place to stay, are they asked to leave the premises or do you take them in if you have room? We are concerned about them hanging out with their buggies.
- A3 When people move in there, it is their home until they are ready to move on to something else. As an operator, I can tell you that there will not be people hanging around in the parking lot. We will work with BC Housing to look at storage in case people have a bike or something. They won't need a shopping cart because they have a place where they can keep their belongings. As the operators, we are going to take responsibility for that property and make it look nice.
- Q4 Can you confirm that this is low barrier housing and people living there can be actively using drugs without being in a treatment plan?
- A4 There might be some people that have drug or alcohol problems and just like if they were living in market housing, we are not going to tell them they can't. We will be able to identify that and be able to support people with services.
- Q5 I have heard that in other supported housing environments that there are homeless group housing family units. If one person gets housing and the others don't then the one person in the family takes the others in and there can be chaos. I have heard that this is when you get people congregating in that area. How will this be addressed?

- A5 The Residential Tenancy Act only allows you to have people stay overnight with you for a very restricted amount of time. This Program Agreement will be like that as well. People can have guests because it is their home. We will be monitoring who comes in and out of the building and if someone is having someone stay overnight there will be a restriction to how many nights.
- C6 I find the word NIMBY to be very condescending and disrespectful to our community, and the people of our community who are concerned for our children and for the well-being of their community. I am all for helping to house the people who are in their cars because they are newly homeless, or the veteran that was in the newspaper. I am not for low barrier housing where people can be actively using drugs while not seeking treatment.
- Q7 If there becomes a problem with homeless people with shopping carts moving in, maybe not necessarily on your property, what are you going to do about it?
- A7 The community advisory committee will be looking at what some of the issues are that need to be addressed. If it is immediate issues, we will be working closely with the RCMP. We work with bylaw as well. We will be reaching out to community partners to say that this is an issue for people that live around here and what should we do about it.
- **Q8** What is being done at Gateway of Hope because there is a huge population that seems semi permanent living around the facility?
- C9 It has really gone downhill in the last few years and there doesn't' seem to be any communication between Gateway and the community at all. There is open drug use there and they have no respect for the neighbourhood. I have only seen Gateway do a clean-up once in all the years it has been there.
- C10 I think it is a very large concern for the Langley Meadows neighbourhood. I don't think anyone is against the supportive housing, they are against residents that are drug users and the fact that it will not be clean and dry. We also think that is too close to the elementary school and the liquor store. It is an honour to live here and we love our neighbourhood and community. I know that not every homeless person is a drug user or has mental health issues. Some people just have bad luck or bad things happen to them. We need to find a balance where our community, our children, and our way of life doesn't change and where we can also help people, who need help, improve their way of life. Have you considered a model where it is more specific as to who can stay there? Maybe like foster kids who have aged out of the system or single moms or moms who have gone through rehab and are trying to get their children back.
- A10 I have seen how supportive housing has changed individuals. That person walks a little taller and they care about where they are living and care about themselves to make those lifestyle changes.
 - We are working in partnership with a senior's services agency trying to do something on a bigger scale to reach the seniors that are suffering with homelessness. In our outreach office we partner with an agency that deals with youth homelessness and deals with

youth that are aging out of care. We have a close relationship with Langley Lions working with people who are either going into subsidized housing or are coming out of it and trying to get into something else. When it comes to balance, we can have youth that are aging out of care as long as they are 19. We can also have seniors who have nowhere else to go. We can have a whole mix instead of just one specific set of people. If you can get that mix there will be support and self-policing.

- Q11 If there is a tenant in the building and they are not following the guidelines at all, do you evict them? What happens to them?
- A11 Eviction would never be a first step. We are clear about what the expectations are and what we can do to support residents to change the behaviour so that they would be successful to live here. In the end some people do get evicted from their housing but that would be a last resort.
- Q12 There are three elementary schools right there and a baby park right across the street. With the 87 year old woman and veteran that were in the newspaper, does Fraser Health have places for these people to go stay?
- A12 They could, depending on how they are connected to services.
- **C13** From what I am reading, seniors are really going to be in trouble in the next little while. There is not enough housing for anybody. Everyone has seen the market out there.
- Q14 So if you make a rule or determine a number of nights that someone can have a guest stay, then what do you do with them after they have exceeded that time? What do they do when you kick them out, they end up going down to the ravine and hang out at the park.
- A14 We have dealt with this and we talk to the tenant to let them know they can't have a permanent guest or move someone in with them. I am not sure that I can answer about where the person that is asked to leave goes but I understand that you are concerned about that.
- We are concerned that people that aren't allowed to permanently stay with a tenant will leave the facility and hang around or live in the park.
- A15 We will have 24 hour staffing with supervisors outside of that staffing. If there is a problem that people feel is directly related to the supportive housing they can call and we will be responsive to that.
- C16 We back onto the park and if we don't call bylaw or police, there will be a tent city there in an instant. Since this was announced there is a bigger influx of people in the area and at the Quality Inn site. My kids can't walk to school, and it is a 100 meters away, because people are shooting up in the middle of the day. Housing seniors and single moms and veterans, I am all for. But if you build it, they will come. At the last public meeting, the police were asked "what do we do?" and they said to call non-emergency and they would be there. We call non-emergency all the time because one shows up in the park with a

buggy, the next day there is two then three, then there is tents and piles of human feces. There are needles and at night you can see them smoking crack and in the day they are shooting up. Many of the neighbours call non-emergency and we get "are you seriously calling about this?" We are made to feel stupid so we call bylaw and maybe three days later they will show up. When the RCMP said they were going to be here for us we thought that was great but it just didn't happen.

- A16 When you have a community advisory committee, the RCMP will be on the committee that meets once a month or whatever is determined. Those are issues that can go to the committee. This has 49 units in it, it will not solve the whole Langley homeless problem and we recognize that. We recognize there is a bigger issue but this is about the first step and recognizing that more still needs to be done.
- Q17 (Facilitator) In your experience living in the neighbourhood and in greater Langley, is there anything going on in the community that you see is working well in terms of this issue?
- C17 Nothing is working. You see signs that pan handling is illegal and they are leaning on the pan handling sign. If it is illegal, why are the police not chasing them out? Day after day they take their shifts. I am concerned about this housing because they say there is going to be 24-7 support. I read there will be two people on staff 24 seven for 49 rooms.
- A17 Just to clarify, there will be a minimum of two staff 24 hours. There will be other staff as well.
- C18 I am in favour of this and I think it is the perfect location. You are never going to go anywhere in Langley without hitting a liquor store and it is across six lanes of road including turn lanes to get to the school. There is a ravine there now and if people want to be there they will be there. As far as the Bylaw Officer, they are at Gateway all the time. I think this gives dignity and a home to 49 people and if this is successful, and I believe it will be, then we have another place open up somewhere else. We need to start somewhere.
- Q19 I have been seeing a lot of enabling and so much addiction. I was hoping when they put in the Gateway of Hope that they would put in one room for people to go through withdrawal and then carry on into a program. I am seeing such horrific mental illness outside my windows and it is terrifying for us and must be for them as well. What about dealing with the actual problems, with the mental illness? I understand that there is a shortage of places where they can go through a rehab type program and am wondering if you are working in conjunction with that kind of thing and have more of it?
- A19 This program is unique as it has a lot of other supports attached to it. The ICM team is a specialized team of health individuals. It consists of a psychiatrist, a nurse practitioner, nurses, social workers and an addiction counsellor. This team will provide supports for the residents on site as well as individuals currently in the community who are looking for housing. Many of the homeless individuals are quite complex, they have lots of health

- and addiction issues. By putting a roof over their head, you can then engage them in some of the other supports and services that are available.
- **Q20** Where do we have this program right now where people can actually go and get off drugs?
- A20 In Surrey there is detox that they could use but there is nothing in Langley that they can use.
- **C21** Sometimes they are mentally ill and other times it is a lifestyle choice of taking drugs and partying. I think it is important to have a home for people but more importantly to have it working with a program to move them forward and get them off of that lifestyle. I am not seeing that part happening.
- A21 One of the challenges we have had in the past is that if we just provide housing for someone with no services and we leave them to their own devices the success rate is 50/50. We are trying to provide a home not just a house and services so that they start to feel comfortable and feel like making change is possible. If we can find a way to stabilize some of these individuals and get them to a point where they actually feel like there is another choice then we can start to work on getting them help from the different team members. We can start working on some of the mental health issues and substance use and connect them with their families. It is a process that is not just about providing housing.
- Q22 We talked about positively impacting 49 people's lives and that is great. What is the potential negative impact on many families and children in the community though? You can't guarantee that all 49 people in those rooms are going to be positively impacted and make a difference. We want to lessen the negative impact while still having that positive impact.
 - (Facilitator) From your perspective, if this was to go ahead, what factors do they need to consider that would have an impact on the success of supportive housing in Langley?
- Q23 Maybe more of a preventative measure and preventing 49 people from becoming homeless. We are envisioning the surrounding area of Gateway of Hope. This may not be the reality but we are envisioning the tent city that was by the overpass. We do have to consider that that could become a sort of reality. Maybe tweaking who is going to be living there. A change in the surrounding neighbourhood is very likely and we want to minimize that. Why can't you make it a dry and clean facility? Are you afraid that people will not want to be there? I am pretty sure that there is a percentage of homeless that are not drug addicts or alcoholics so why can't it be dry and clean?
- A23 It is a program called Housing First and it is a nationwide standard in terms of how you deal with people who are homeless and also have some of those issues. There is housing out there that is dry and high barrier but to address that individual and get them inside that is a barrier for them to even want to consider housing. What this program is saying is

- ok, you have challenges and issues and we are going to address them but we need to get you safe and indoors. They then start to heal and start considering how to move on.
- Q24 Doesn't the Downtown Eastside have the highest percentage of supportive groups in that area and yet it has gotten worse than it has ever been in terms of drug use and homelessness? So much money is poured into it but it doesn't seem to get any better.

 Just because you throw money and community groups at this issue it doesn't mean it is going to improve anything. When the Gateway of Hope opened, did they have community meetings like this and make promises and tell you (other participant) what was going on?
- C25 There were meetings before we even knew where it was going to be. I actually hoped it was going to be in the empty lot because I thought people were going to be fixed. I thought there would be a lot offered there, not what it became. There is no community group that deals with them or our concerns with the Gateway. There was no input from the community. People in our building have gone over and expressed concerns mostly about drug use. They have a policy about no drug use so they all just come out and do it in our back yard basically.
- Q26 For the first year this place will probably be good and they will police it. What about the second year when you have high turnover of staff and you don't have a continuum? You might get people staffing the Quality Inn that may not care about it as much as the people that started it. It could get worse as the years go on.
- A26 We are accountable to BC Housing and BC Housing will hold us accountable as an operator. They have high standards with regards to operating their buildings and properties and we currently operate a property for them in Langley. I am confident that we will do a good job and BC Housing will hold whoever is operating it accountable.
- Q27 Is there going to be annual reviews and checkups with the community to see how it is working?
- A27 We absolutely can do that and think it would be what we are looking at through the community advisory and maybe even through these dialogues. We need to know what we need to do to make the community feel more confident that what we say we are going to do, we are actually going to do.
- **Q28** What about the facility you run right now? Do you get feedback from the community? Do you ask them every six months what is going on and how they feel about the project?
- A28 We are responsive to any of our neighbours and if there is any feedback from them we are responsive to that. We have been operating that housing for many years and it is long term tenants that are in there so we actually haven't had any community complaints about issues at that property.
- **Q29** So if somebody has a problem you address it?
- A29 Absolutely.

- C30 I really don't think that this is the place for mental health issues or addiction to be treated. I think mental health needs specialized care that can't be addressed in such a small facility. I will continue to say this until the bitter end. I do not support this project.
- A30 In terms of people being treated for mental illness, the ICM team would link people and take them to services. They may monitor and make sure they are taking their medication so they stay well. In terms of actually treating them on site, it is not going to be a mini hospital it is really a link to supports and services and they are taken to where there are services.
- C31 I have lived in the neighbourhood for s.22(1) and I don't get to choose who my neighbour is. I want to be clear that the few people who came out tonight are not speaking on behalf of everybody that lives in the Langley Meadows area or the Elements area. It is unfortunate that the people that support this don't' come to the meetings. It is the people who are fearful and can't understand the difference between Gateway and what they are trying to do here. I wish we could come away from this meeting and understand the difference.
- C32 The big meeting that had 500-600 people show up, I understood that 80% of those people were against it or at least that is what the media said.
- C33 I think we all fear the crime, the stealing, being on our balconies looking in our windows and things like that. When we do call the police, they don't come and don't address it, they don't chase them away. Where do we get the support from the police and the community to say we understand that you don't feel safe in your home? It seems like they have rights but we don't.
- Q34 (Facilitator) Whether or not this particular development goes ahead, what needs to happen in the community in terms of the issues you have raised?
- C34 The Township needs to do their job because we are paying taxes. They should be cleaning up the streets and saying you can't have a tent city here. I think the problem is that the homeless just don't care and have no values. They throw things all over the place and we have to clean it up. There is a difference between being homeless and being homeless and disrespectful. There wouldn't be a problem with homeless people if they just cleaned up their mess, their needles, and their feces.
- If you asked everyone here I think they would say they are for it minus the zero tolerance. I am sure you can find 49 people that are clean and sober and need the help. Fraser Health does harm reduction they are not about zero tolerance. If people come into this place and it is zero tolerance, people that need to get sober won't get sober.
- A35 I think we all want it to be safe for the residents in the building, we want it to be safe for the community and the neighbours as well. I think that is the goal for all of us. The goal is how do we do this so we can achieve that. Something to think about is the fact that these are individuals that are already in the community right now and some of the issues that are coming up tonight about camping in the ravine, the feces and some of those things

are as a result of the fact that you have people in the community that do need connections to the services. If you open up the house and only allow people to move in that are sober, you are going to help the 49 that are sober. You are not going to start to address the wider issues that are already in the community. The huge benefit is that there is an ICM team here that has those services. Not all of the supportive places actually have the connection to that. There is an investment from Fraser Health as a commitment to this community to help and try to address this. We are providing the housing to help support the work that the ICM team is already doing. To have a place where they can start to bring people inside where they can connect them to the services. I can't guarantee anything at this point except for the fact the BC Housing has processes in place to try to hold the non-profit providers accountable. There is a commitment on the part of Stepping Stones. Having a community advisory committee will make sure the community has a voice.

- We get that you can't get people to stop living in the park and ravine because they were there before you came. All I can say though is that if you build it they will come and then there will be even more. When we call the police and try to get them removed we are made to feel bad because we are asking for help.
- A36 Contacting the community advisory committee gives you one extra avenue to call. We recognize that there is a homeless issue provincial, regionally and all across Metro Vancouver. The conversation we are having here about supportive housing is the same one we are having in Chilliwack, Surrey and Maple Ridge. There are a number of other communities we are looking at to try to address the issues in those communities so that people won't go to one area. This is for people who are already in Langley.
 - BC Housing speaking about next steps: There will be a series of other community dialogue meetings with different dates and times. There is going to be another big open house on May 28th where we talk about what we have heard in the dialogues sessions and what the next steps look like. If you have questions email communityrelations@bchousing.org and we will get back to you. You can also email any comments that you want captured, everything received will be submitted to Council.
- C37 My experience with Council is no matter what we do here tonight and no matter how many meetings there are, at the end of the day whatever they decide they will put it through even if 95% of people are against it. They have already torn that place apart and put the dumpsters in way before these meetings even started. This is a go ahead no matter what.
- **C38** We have seen an email from the Mayor of Langley, it said even if the residents decide yes or no, the provincial government will put it through if we want it or not.
- **Q39** What is the building that is going up next to the skateboard park?
- A39 It is a youth centre on 203 Avenue, right across from Canada Bread
- **C40** I think it is in a great location and it is fabulous

BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the Quality Inn at 6465-201 Street. BC Housing purchased the property and is undertaking renovations to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, and an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. Stepping Stone Community Services Society would operate the supportive housing units and provide support services and programming for the residents. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Q & A (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- Q1 Is the ICM team just available to the residents of the housing or are they there for anybody who is homeless and needs help?
- A1 In terms of case management in our community, it is already operational and has been running since late last summer. It is a referral based program and they are currently in a temporary space until they can relocate permanently. They screen individuals for suitability and interest because it is voluntary and they are not forcing their services on individuals. Individuals who fit the criteria for the program are taken in and then supported on their goals of obtaining housing, stabilizing mental health conditions and medical health conditions. They are linked with health services and other supports. As those goals are achieved, those individuals will be able to move onto other services that will better fit their needs and ICM will be able to take on additional people. The ICM team is an outreach team and they go out to see people. If people are living in the proposed support housing, the ICM team will work with them there. There will not be an office where there is traffic coming into the building to see the ICM team.
- **Q2** Is there still a waitlist for the ICM team?
- A2 Yes and organizations can still refer and the person will be put on the wait list. We will be serving 80 people. There are eight individuals we were able to work with and get them housed in market housing.
- **Q3** Who is part of the ICM team?
- A3 There is a total of 12 of us that make up the team. We have a psychiatrist, a nurse practitioner, an addictions counsellor, an RN, a registered psych nurse, a peer support worker, a housing procurement specialist and three case managers. There is also an admin assistant and myself. Generally, there are three to four people on staff every day.
- Q4 What is the relationship with the Gateway of Hope and this facility?
- A4 The Gateway of Hope is a community partner but there won't be any direct relationship other than there may be people living at the shelter that may apply to live here. The hope would be that it may free up some shelter spaces as it is very overloaded.
- Q5 I have heard that a big problem for Gateway is that after being in the program for two years there is then no place for them to go. Would this be like a transitional place for them?
- A5 It possibly could be. Some people may be ready, after being in the program for two years, to be in a market rental and receive a subsidy so they would not necessarily need to be housed in this facility.
- **Q6** How many units are in the 49 units?

- A6 The hotel has 50 rooms in it and one room will be converted into an office space for the intensive case management team. There are some rooms that were suite rooms that possibly we could look at couples so that number could be 51 or 53 people. There will be no children in the facility.
- Q7 (Facilitator) From your perspective, are there any things that are going well in the community in terms of homelessness or around this issue?
- A7 I think the relationship the church has with the homeless population is going well. Wednesday mornings they serve coffee and sandwiches and food for lunch. There is a great deal of respect and the homeless people are asked to clean up after themselves and they do. They are asked not to do drugs there and for the most part they respect that. They police themselves. On Sunday nights, there is the same kind of group where a lot of homeless people come and have coffee and food. They love to be able to hang out together and then when the evening is over they know they have to disperse and take their things away. They are very respectful of us and I trust them. If you want to come on Sunday nights you can meet some of them.
- **C8** I have heard the pastor is doing a good job and having a good affect.
- C9 I work in the Douglas Park area and notice the police have a good presence there and do walks in the park. It is not just about chasing people away, it is making sure that everyone can see that they are there and they have a relationship with the people there. There is a community policing office downtown and I think that because they are so close they can attend very quickly if there is anything that comes up.
- Q10 Is there a community policing office in the area of the Quality Inn?
- A10 Yes, they do at Township Hall. Langley also has three mental health and homelessness liaison officers and their role is to respond to whatever needs there are. Our intention as the operator is to work really closely with the RCMP. We have discussed with them that they would have a regular presence at the site whether things are good or not so good.
- C11 I think the Gateway of Hope has been a great addition to Langley. They do a lot of good things for people.
- C12 I really like the ICM team and Stepping Stones because they see people in the hospital, help in the hospital and help with addiction referrals. There is really a sense of community outreach.
- C13 This housing will give those people who want and desire to have stability, supports and relationships again, the opportunity to regain what they have lost or many of them have never had from early years.
- Q14 What kind of an assessment will be used and what will be asked of them?

- A14 We use a vulnerable assessment tool which is a tool that is used around North America by people who work with the homeless. At the end of the assessment it gives us a score which is a measure of their vulnerability. It looks at physical and mental health issues, addictions, survival skills and history of homelessness. The tool has two clear functions, it helps to match the level of supports required to make sure they are housed effectively. It also helps create a healthy tenant mix when you start these programs. The people who would be moving into the Quality Inn would be diverse and a range of people that represent the community of Langley.
- Q15 I heard that it is a low barrier so they are allowed to have access to drugs and alcohol and will probably have mental health issues as well. What about criminal record checks?

 What are the requirements to stay in the facility and to get in?
- A15 We don't do criminal record checks. We all want this to work and we all want to have a community that we feel safe in. There are expectations about people's behaviours. There are expectations to be connected to support services and people will have to sign a program agreement that includes managing behaviour.
- **Q16** What are the rules to stay?
- A16 When people sign a program agreement it is very much like a residential tenancy agreement. It outlines what is expected of people. Things like you pay your rent, you can't be disruptive to your neighbours, and there can't be safety concerns. Those are conversations right up front so people know what the expectations are and that they may have to stay connected with support services. If they are an ICM team client then it would be written into the program agreement that if you are going to live here then you have to see your clinical counsellor. We meet with people regularly to make sure they are following through with that. We are concerned about tenant safety so everyone that is living there is safe and the safety of any staff that are there. If there are people that are disruptive, we would address it with them. If we needed to, we would call the RCMP to support us. We will work with people to help them change their behaviour. We do this with other housing we are currently operating and it can be very effective because often people say they get it and don't want to lose their housing and will ask for additional supports. We don't want to evict people but if we work with people over a long period of time and they continue to have the same issues, the result could be eviction. Our experience has been that that is very exceptional when we have housed people.
- C17 I feel that answer was very vague that there is not a set list of things that are not acceptable and that you are just going to see how it goes as it goes
- C18 As a community we see the issues around and outside Gateway. Living so close to another situation that allows drugs and alcohol when Gateway doesn't, our concern is what is that going to do to our community. As it is already, needles are sometimes found. Situations like that are hard for us in our neighbourhood and we have questions about how that could be addressed and dealt with.

- A18 Just to clarify, Gateway is a shelter and people can only be there and night and must leave during the day. During the day, they have to take their stuff with them and find places to be and that is why we see them in the neighbourhood. This place is a housing unit, like an apartment building, where they can be in there all day long. They can do their stuff there and keep their stuff there and don't have to cart their stuff all over the neighbourhood. They don't have to try to find places to do their drugs. In any kind of apartment building or whenever you rent something, they don't say you can't use drugs or alcohol in your place. You are paying rent and there are limits of what you can control on what they can and can't do in your own home.
- **Q19** Can you please talk more about the program agreement?
- A19 There are expectations about people being connected to services. If people are using drugs we could build in doing wellness checks on people if we don't see them. There are very specifics that we can build into the program agreements that would not be on a regular residential tenancy agreement. We are concerned about people's safety and the safety of people that are using substances or drinking.
- C20 If people have substance abuse they are not going to be able to quit on day one and if they need this kind of program, I would rather see them inside supportive housing. I don't think this place will be a draw for people to come and do drugs, it will be people who are residents that are currently using and they will be doing it in doors in a supportive area where they can get the help they need.
- Q21 What happens with those that want assistance with getting off their addiction? Does that maybe not work well if it is allowed in the rest of the facility or does it work within the facility to do both?
- A21 I think it will work within the supportive housing because if people are using substances they will not be doing it in common areas, it would be in the confines of their own apartment. The harm reduction approach is talking to people at the very beginning about what changes they want to make in their life. It is about meeting people where they are at and having the resources available to them when they do want to make those changes.
- Q22 My assumption is that if someone wants to get off drugs that they need to go off to a recovery facility to do that. I assume the process would be that if they want recovery your team finds them a place to go do that?
- A22 Yes there are lots of people who go to recovery facilities from supportive housing. If it is a goal for someone in supportive housing, we will facilitate that with the ICM team as well.
- **Q23** There are 49 units and one office, what other amenities are going to be in the building itself?
- A23 On the main floor there will be a staffed front desk because we want to know who is coming in and out of the building. It will be fobbed and only people that live there will have a fob. If people are bringing a guest in, the guest would have to sign in because we would want to know who is in the building. The main floor also has a restaurant which will

be operational and we will be providing one hot meal a day. Upstairs on the second floor there is a common area that has a kitchen in it. Our vision is that it is a very good programming space. There could be support groups for people with substance use or support groups for people with mental health issues. There could be some recreation and social programming. As tenants start to move in we will talk to them about what kinds of programming they would like to see and what they would benefit from. It would be a space where we could bring community partners in so maybe employment programs could come in. They could run some programs and help people who are interested in looking at employment. There will be a designated medical room with a nurse practitioner with the ICM team.

- **Q24** Are there any other examples of supportive housing units in BC so we can see how those have impacted the communities that they are in?
- A24 We have links on our website that we can show different models. We have about 10,000 units across BC in a range of communities. Some of them are very close to daycares and senior's homes. We are in an opiate crisis but not all homeless people are drug users so we are not going to have 49 people in this building who are using drugs. The homeless population is as diverse as the community of Langley. It is important that we focus on that but it is also important that we focus on the issues of mental health and addictions amongst people who are homeless and that their needs are addressed. That is why BC Housing and Fraser Health developed the ICM program.

There are five case studies (community acceptance studies) on the BC Housing website. They were done as part of our research team to look at supportive housing for people who are homeless in the community. It is a very thorough assessment of some of the concerns that were in the neighbourhood before the supportive housing was put in. It shows the lessons of success, what people learned as they went through the process and it looks at both before and after. There is also a video that is about four minutes long and it shows two or three different supportive housing projects in Victoria and talks about the experiences. It has interviews with some of the individuals who live in those buildings. We could show it at the end of the meeting if anyone is interested in staying and watching it.

- Q25 Will there be a place for the homeless people who are not in the program to take a shower and do laundry?
- A25 No, this is not open to other people that don't live there. People that live there have their own bathrooms and there is shared laundry on every floor.
- Q26 When the people are being assessed to be part of the program, is one of the criteria for people to seek employment through the program? I understand that this is long term and not a shelter but will people who come into this project be encouraged or helped to find permanent housing outside the program? If there are only 49 units, there are more people than that out there that need this program. How is that process going to be managed from when they come in to how they are supported getting out?

- A26 It is intended to be transitional but without a time frame on it because it will look very different for different people. There will be seniors who are currently homeless who will be moving in there and there could be younger people. There would be conversations with people at the beginning that this is probably not a forever place and what would their ideal home be or where would they like to be next? It would be what they need to do and what they need to work on in order to get there. We do have rent supplements where we can help people look at market housing. We feel confident there will be lots of people that want to take that next step.
- Q27 If people do want to do the next steps, one of those is finding a job. If they don't have a lot of job experience to add to a resume, but they do want to try to get into the work force to be able to make their own money, is there a program that they can work for a company or organization to actually get the experience to put on a resume?
- A27 Through Stepping Stones we do work with a lot of people to help them get into employment. For some people, it starts with volunteer opportunities in the community that help build their resume. We would work closely with Work BC and they have lots of links with employers that people can get work experience with. Our goal would be to create some internal positions, volunteer or casual paid, to help in the building to keep it clean and maybe help with meal preps.
- Q28 Can you tell us one example of a community and how it worked? Can you tell us of a community that was afraid at first and how it actually turned out?
- A28 There is a lot of supportive housing in communities both big and small that exist.

 There are good examples of a diverse range of communities across BC on the BC Housing website. I encourage you to look at it.
- Q29 When we first learned this was in the works, and that it was likely to be transitional housing, we were very for it because it is really needed. My concern is what happens to people who may have to be evicted, how is that done and are they just kicked out? You said people have to sign in if they are coming in from the outside, how well is that activity and those coming to visit someone who is living there handled? Is that just going to increase that activity in the area? What can we expect from that overflow activity?
- A29 I would expect that it would not increase activity in the area. If anything, it is going to decrease activity because some of the people that are currently living in Langley Meadow's parks and in the ravine may very well be people that are housed. We operate other housing and our experience is people do not hang around or start living in adjacent spaces. Guests come and go and don't just hang around.
 - We will have 24 hour staffing in the immediate area and that would prevent people from just hanging around. Stepping Stones has the expertise and the skills not to evict people to the street. The community advisory committee will be able to measure the impact this housing program will have because the neighbours, Bylaw and the RCMP will be telling us very clearly if it is having an impact on the community.

- Q30 Is there any turn over stats in general on supportive housing and placement into market housing? I don't know what steps have been made in regards to affordable housing rentals in the area and not for market rentals open outside of this. How do we push the onus from being in the unit to then renting in the community and what affordable units would be available?
- A30 That is a good question. There is low income housing in the community. We currently work with the housing service providers to house people and we do have rent supplements for market rents. We are also in bigger conversations with the Township and the City of Langley because there is a housing crisis in Langley in terms of affordable rental units. Hopefully in the future there will be an investment in that type of housing and we will see an increase.

There are affordable housing programs in the pipeline. I know discussions have started both with the Township and the City because the government budget announcement made a big statement around affordability of housing. This Provincial administration is committed to develop 140,000 units of affordable housing over the next ten years. We recognize that we need to develop supportive housing programs but also right along the housing continuum of affordable housing as well.

- Q31 I know there is a big focus on affordable housing in Vancouver and across the river. I have seen it especially in Surrey. How has it been progressing further into the valley?
- A31 There are some things in the pipeline but I don't have that information off the top of my head right now. We can get that information and share it with you if you provide your email after the meeting.
- Q32 It sounds like the trend is more to supportive housing giving the increase in property rental. If this is just transitional then we are going to get people into lower income markets but is that really going to happen because the rental market is constantly increasing? There are constant waitlists for low income housing. I feel that the problem is so much more systemic so why aren't we looking at those systemic issues more than just dealing with the affects and kind of reacting?
- A32 We really do need to deal with the systemic issues. Providing employment opportunities is important. For the first time, we have a poverty reduction strategy. It is now Ministry of Social Development and Poverty Reduction. There is provincial consultation as we speak, we are not part of it, around poverty reduction and what does that look like. That is how you are going to address some of the systemic issues whether that be affordable housing, employment etc.

The governments focus on the supportive housing is because there is such an urgent need right now in the community. There is a homeless issue across the province in a number of communities and affordable housing is a big need. BC Housing has a number of new programs and funding streams that are coming on board to look at funding for low income families and seniors that is separate from the focus on supportive housing. As that

- funding starts to come on stream you are going to start to see more conversations around what that is going to look like for Langley and the Fraser Valley.
- Q33 We were talking about the creek and how there are homeless in there. Are you saying that that would no longer be there because of the housing unit that you are going to put in?
- A33 That is the goal
- Q34 For the assessment of the individuals being brought in, is it going to be based on location? How are people selected to live here? Will it be people who are already in the neighbourhood or will you be bringing people in from around Metro Vancouver?
- A34 Having the 24/7 presence of staffing, BC Housing's expectation is that they would address any immediate issues and connect those people to housing supports. The expectation is that people will come from the immediate neighbourhood but also would target people that are homeless in the Langley community whether street or shelter. That is how we get a mix of people moving in.
- Q35 Would the homeless people increase in the neighbourhood. I think it kind of would because they are not all going to be homeless from the location that you are choosing. They are going to come there looking for a room.
- A35 People have to be registered for this. It wouldn't be people coming to the Quality Inn saying "do you have a unit available?" There is going to be a separate process put in place and a different location for that.
 - There will be an application process. We have an outreach team that have relationships with most of the people who are homeless in Langley. We will work really closely to make sure that people that are in need that are homeless and wanting to be housed have an opportunity to apply. We won't be able to house everyone so there will be a selection process. It is very likely that some of the people that have camped in the ravine and around Langley Meadows will apply to live there.
- Q36 What are the rules with visitors? Are the people that are visiting, and not living there, then going to be camping across the street in the creek?
- A36 They definitely will not be camping and staying around the property. If they go across 200th street then we won't know that and that is when the community advisory will come in. Those would be the issues that need to come to the community advisory. Guests will come and go but we will monitor it because it will be staffed. People will have to sign in their guests and the guests will have to check out.
- Q37 If this goes through, how are we going to address the needs of the community? There is fear of needles at the Langley Meadows School. How does the school feel like the Township is going to address that?

- A37 Lookout is an emergency non-profit society and they have recently opened an office in Langley. They have two Housing First staff people who work with the homeless in Langley to get them housed. They have a mobile unit with some people on bicycles. The City and Township of Langley do not have a lot of collection boxes for used syringes. The people that go around and pick up the used syringes are part of the homeless community and they get paid a stipend from Lookout to go out into the community and pick up used syringes.
- C38 That should really be highlighted and put into the newspaper because they do that a couple of times a week.
- C39 It is important to know that we are already seeing needles and people are already there living on the street. Having this housing isn't going to cause more people being there.
- C40 Are people that are living in the building going to be able to go and visit their friends in the other units? Is there a concern of people, that aren't substance users, being exposed to substance abuse?
- A40 Yes, people will be able to visit other people in the building. We will have staff on 24/7 so we will be able to address any of those issues. If any tenant is concerned about their neighbour or anyone else in the building, we would encourage them to bring those concerns to our staff and we would address them immediately.
- **Q41** Is there an age range that you are focusing on?
- A41 It is 19 plus. Where I work 65% of our clients are over 45 and our oldest client is 72.
- C42 We don't actually have a problem at Langley Meadows Elementary with needles. We have an issue with the park behind it and there is often people camping out at Matheson House, that is an issue and the Langley Meadows Community Association has found needles there. The Principal and Vice Principal of the school do a sweep to look for needles before kids get to school. There is a lot of petty crime in the area and people are worried about their safety and are worried it is going to get worse.
- Q43 (Facilitator) From your perspective, what factors need to be considered that could have an impact on the success of supportive housing in Langley?
- Q44 In other communities where the supportive housing has gone in, is there anything specific that the community has done to make it easier for the residents or make it successful?
- A44 I think it is very community specific. There was a lot of concern around the Marpole area in Vancouver, but there were some people that live in the area that ended up bringing in welcome baskets and things like that.
- C45 I came here with the hope that this will go ahead because it is necessary. I do have some concerns about what may happen in the area though. I think it is a good idea that there will be a community advisory committee so that there is accountability to what is going on and there is the ability to address concerns. I think it will be important not only for the residents in that area, for the businesses in the area but also for the support and success

- of the supportive housing facility. As a representative of a significant commercial land owner in the area, I would be happy to be involved in that.
- Q46 Many people have discussed over the last several months that this building is in the Township right now, and a location that you didn't get to choose because that is where the hotel was. A lot of people asked why this kind of thing wasn't done in the City because that is where a lot of these people tend to group together. There is a bit of a premium of land in the City and not a lot of places where you could build now. In Langley, since there is such a big demand, are there other places you have been looking at to build a place like this since there are only 49 units available?
- A46 We are actively exploring the whole continuum of housing both with the City and the Township. Working with Bylaw and the RCMP, people do get moved along, so the homeless are in the Township as well as the City. There is a lot of movement so we are open to working with both entities.
- Q47 How will all these wrap around services, like Stepping Stones, BC Housing, Employment and Fraser Health work collaboratively instead of individually so that it is not overlapping and people are not competing and actually working together for the success of the clients?
- A47 In our community, with somewhat limited service providers, we already work closely. ICM is funded by Fraser Health and we also fund other programs through Langley Community Services Society. We have regular meetings with administrative structures and front line clinical support structures. BC Housing funds some of the homeless outreach programs and we fund the mental health and substance programs. Our partners are the Gateway of Hope, the ICM team, Fraser Health mental health and substance use issues and all of the non-profits. The Langley division of family practice as well. We have advisories that are already running.
- C48 Thinking of what can help to make this successful, communication is a big thing. A number of residents got the BC Housing notice after the first meeting had already happened so maybe that can be done in a better way and not lumped in with junk mail. Maybe they could be addressed to people's homes because it is an important issue. This is important as well for any future housing opportunities you look into because people get their backs up because they weren't informed and it feels like you are trying to sneak it in.
- A48 Because of federal spam laws that have come in, you can't address it to people homes unless they have given permission. We have been using Facebook postings, and advertisements in the newspaper.
 - When you sign it at the front there is a section that says "do you want information from us?" It then gives us permission to send you notices of upcoming things or to keep you in the loop.

- **C49** Our communities also have community associations that we get notices from, the school could send that out. Those areas could be used.
- A49 We actually did send out notices to some of the key groups such as Langley Meadows Community Association but maybe we need a little more lead time prior to meetings. We are continuing to look at that.
- **Q50** How many properties do you have in Langley Meadows or around there with BC Housing?
- A50 I don't actually have the information right off the top of my head how many specifically in Langley Meadows. We generally look at Langley as a whole and I would have to double check that and get that information to you.
- c51 In terms of how to make this successful, maybe you could show the video you talked about earlier at the big community centre or at your presentations. You tell people to go to the website but I don't think everybody does so if you can show the videos and let people know how it worked in other communities it would be good. Also having the personal testimony of someone standing there saying this is what has happened to me and this is how I was helped. I think that really humanizes it and helps people to realize what it is.

BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the Quality Inn at 6465-201 Street. BC Housing purchased the property and is undertaking renovations to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, and an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. Stepping Stone Community Services Society would operate the supportive housing units and provide support services and programming for the residents. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Q & A (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- I went to the public meeting at the Langley Events Centre last fall and heard a number of the community concerns. I don't live in the neighbourhood but what I heard loud and clear were two things: safety for the neighbourhood and needles in local parks, school grounds and areas where might be implications for children running into used needles and paraphernalia.
- The individuals in our community that are homeless are here. It is a growing issue. If we have a service that supports them we have a better situation than what we have now. I work with Lookout Society and FOIP who is also here works with a group called DOPERS (Diverse Organization Providings ducation and Regional Supports) help people with lived experience. You might see their bikes around the community that say Rig Riders. If you call this number 604-812-5277 Rig Riders will go out and pick up needles. Harm reduction workers will come to you and provide training.
- An example of how things are changing. I am a tenant support worker that works in Abbotsford at a new supportive housing. One of my residents came in last night with two syringes that they had found on the street and asked me to safely dispose of them. Other residents have a pride of ownership in the building and help out with the landscaping and maintenance. It is good to see how things get better over time in the neighbourhood.
- I live in a senior's manufactured home park and we are not without issues. In April our neighbours son past away in FOIPPA s.22(1) . This young man was FO was semi homeless staying sometimes with his parents. These homeless people area our backyards already and I would much prefer that they are housed and supported owe as citizens are also protected and I think this is the way to do it. I am very much) in support.
- A1-4 We hear that safety and security are issues, that is why at BC Housing we work with long established providers such as Stepping Stones that has over 30 years experience working in Langley with deep relationships. Homelessness is not going away, besides the human cost of homelessness which we just heard about, the fiscal cost of homelessness is huge. The most expensive way to treat people is to keep them on the street. Just think of the cost to Municipalities, to Bylaw, to ER's to police.
- I would like to say thank you for this. I live near the proposed development and there are already quite a lot of homeless. Today our strata had to hire someone to clear up the two vestibules near our parkade entrance as it is very private for people to shoot up. Yesterday when I was walking with the landscaper we saw a needle. Thank you for this phone number. I am here to support this project. These are our neighbours, they are living with us and sleeping under our tree
- C6 I think people are afraid and they don't know that needles are being picked up and that things are being done. It is better for the homeless to have some where to go rather than them being in your backyard or dying in your backyard.

- C7 This is not about bringing homeless people to their community. It is housing people that are there already. It is housing people that want to be housed.
- C8 A concern of mine is that the only way you can be part of this meeting is if you have an email. We may not have people here that have contrary perspectives because they didn't hear about it through a community organization and if they are not online. There was no phone number on the ad which makes it difficult for someone to call. Also many seniors are not on Facebook.
- C9 If you think about the site location, there is Langley Meadows School which is attached to Langley Meadows Park and then there is Langley Meadows Edge Park. The area of concern, both our kids went to Langley Meadows School and my wife worked there for a period of time, the school has protocols in place at the start of the day as to how to make that environment safe place for kids. Is there a way now to let people know that you are going to pay close attention to those particular spaces.
- A9 Excellent idea, Stepping Stones have heard this concern about safety and needles loud and clear. I also live in Township but not in that neighbourhood as a parent I hear that concern. This is where the Community Advisory Committee will play an important role. We have a good relationship with Bylaw, the RCMP and other community partners. If that means what can we do to make Langley Meadows safer in that neighbourhood then we are committed to doing that.
- Q10 What exactly is the criteria for residency? In my estimation people will think oh this is a good thing and they will flock in from other areas. It sounds like you are offering accommodation to substance abusers? 100% is that correct?
- A10 We have been providing Homeless Outreach Services since the Province piloted the program almost 12 years ago. We know who has been homeless in Langley for a long time. We also work closely with Gateway of Hope, Lookout, ICM so when people apply we know who has been living here. We are confident it will be Langley people that are housed.
 - No, we are not just housing people with substance issues. Anyone that is homeless on the street or in the shelter can apply for housing. There will be an assessment to select people. There may be some people that do not use substances that may feel this is not the right kind of housing for them. We can connect people with other services and provide other housing options.
- C11 Hearing about criteria and assessment for clients entering these buildings, the more supports you have for a mix of people, the better healthcare outcomes they will have. We underestimate the impacts of stress of not having a home has on the choices people make
- C12 The housing project I work at there is a vast difference of people from a 23 year old to someone in their 70s, some who use, some who don't. It works pretty well. It is a huge benefit for people who use to see people that are not using and are able to do it. They get

strength and peer support from each other.

- C13 I have lived in Langley for SOLPPA and I can't think of overall other than Stepping Stones, Gateway of Hope and Vineyard Church I don't see anything else in Langley that is working. I see a lot of things that are going bad. I keep hearing our homeless are not going anywhere but what I am not hearing people say is by denying basic human right a place to live, water, a place to go to the bathroom. There was a report in Vancouver Sun and City of San Francisco that by not providing public bathrooms and water we have created a health situation that is worse than third world countries and have increased the spread of Hepatitis A. This project will go so far to helping to curb those situations.
- C14 It is a familiar re-frame we need more affordable housing. We refer to it as a continuum but we are missing that huge component in the current crisis historically local government did not think they had any role to play in providing affordable housing. We must partner with others to spearhead initiatives because market forces are not taking care of that at all. You have to have political will
- a few years ago. Now there are drug issues. We have been trying to navigate a system that is very difficult. When I look at people living on the street I see my son and we are able to help him now but we are not going to be here forever. I think about the people who are struggling with mental health issues and how easy it is for them to become homeless. I want to believe that we live in a community that will look after those that are disenfranchised and can be re-connected with the community.
- C16 I think it is easier to see the big things that are working and some visible partnerships. There are so many programs and relationships that work more discreetly. For example: we see people go into the hospital and through a connection with Lookout Outreach we are housing people from the hospital so they are not hitting the street. Involving ICM team in Langley and other services that provide youth aging out of care, and youth homeless piece. Working with the RCMP and Bylaw so they call us when they are going into camps so we can talk to people and connect them to services.
- Vas lucky I had friends that I could stay with. I had to navigate disability and income assistance.

 FOIPPA s.22(1)

 and have remained stable for the most part. As I was navigating the system, I was thinking to myself, that I as someone that is seemingly capable, I had such a hard time. I thought how does anyone navigate this system who does not have the help. I was supported by Ishtar Transition Housing Society. They are an amazing resource. I am waiting for affordable housing and on the list.
- A17 I was encouraged to hear the premier and our minster announce this morning funding for 1500 units province wide for second stage housing for women at risk of violence. It is important to remember that there has not been any investment in affordable housing since the 90s

- C18 The crucial role that the ICM (Intensive Case Management) team plays with this project is to support clients to navigate the system. We have on our team a psychiatrist, a nurse practitioner, 3 case managers, register nurse, registered psychiatric nurse, a peer support worker and a housing procurement specialist and an addictions counsellor and administration. Every client that comes to use our services has access to these each one of those professionals. We do not tell people what is best for their lives. They tell us what they want for their lives and we help them with that process. It is a wrap-around service.
- C19 I have been in this community for $\frac{\text{FOIPPA}}{\text{s.22(1)}}$ and there are people and services that I did not know about. I support this for the patients I work with but also for the opportunity to work with others to build on the services for our community.
 - On a personal note, I would like to share that my daughter was very close to being homeless. She had to be re-located to another community. There are so many of my daughters in this community. I see how many patients in our community don't have people in our community that can support them.
- C20 These people need help now. We need to work together so you find housing, you don't lose your son, so you don't lose your daughter.
- Q21 It is hard to talk about personal things but I feel I need to because housing made all the difference. When I was 16 my mom, brother and I experienced homelessness. We were Church members and we had a huge family but my mother was so mortified that she could not pay the rent and we were evicted. She felt she had created it. We spent three months navigating it. A boyfriend's family opened up their home for us to stay. I am saying that housing is so important from survival to heal, move on and thrive. This development is a safe place for homeless people. I am not sure if misunderstood what you said but did you say that only people with substance abuse issues will be provided wraparound service or would people that have only mental health issues get help too?
- A21 The criteria for the ICM program is the individual is at risk or precariously housed, that they are over 19 and have issues with substance use. However, we do include mental health as a confirmed disorder so it is a wraparound service for anyone that is eligible.
- C22 As chair of Triple A Senior Housing on May 7th I did a delegation to the Township of Langley to support Councillor Arnason's motion for a needs assessment for affordable housing. It has gone to Committee. This project has to go to rezoning. All of us need to be at the Township's Public Hearing as they need to hear the stories that we are sharing. You need to fill out a form so you can get 5 minutes to speak. The Councillors need to hear the impact that this housing can have for the whole community.
- **Q23** What is the date of the Public Hearing?
- A23 The Township has not set the date
- **Q24** How do people find out?
- A24 Council announces it and it is added to the Township Council Agenda. The community

> partners will need to share the date. BC Housing has a website for this project and when the date is announced by Council we will post it there as soon as we are informed by the Township. The BC Housing website for more project information is:

- C25 Fear is the biggest opposition to change and there is a stand off until crisis happens. That pushes us over the edge. The question is how do we want it to look. Homelessness occurs because of lack of a number of things. When I look around this room at the strength and in incredible vulnerability have exhibited incredible courage. We all have stories, everyone of us. If there is anything that all these things that result in homelessness does is push us into isolation because of shame, guilt or social or cultural pressures press in on someone. They isolate and are afraid of sharing their situation.
- The incredible courage of people in this room has touched me deeply surprisingly because I have worked in Langley in mental health substance use for FOIPPA am listening today that every one of those stories is unique. What we are talking about is creating housing for 49 individuals with 49 different stories that have led them to where they are currently are. Thank everyone for sharing your stories, but also your concerns because it is only working on those concerns that we will make this or other projects successful. The other piece I heard was around trauma, so having resources is critical. The ICM team focuses on individuals that have severe problematic substance use. We have other mental health services and we already work with Stepping Stone so people will be connected.
- **C27** Langley Community Services has other mental health programs and they will also provide and be connected to the new housing
- C28 I am resident of Langley and recently found myself homeless so I am staying in the

 FOIPPA s.22(1) This housing complex is perfect for me and others who want to stay in this community. FOIPPA s.22(1) the Langley Overdose Committee and I do harm reduction in the community. I am happy out here. I have been looking for a place but it is hard. Rents are high. It is a great opportunity for people to get back on their feet.
- C29 I was at the October 2017 community meeting and the majority of people that spoke were against the supportive housing. I live by Douglas Park in a ground floor apartment. I look out on to the park. There is a big old maple tree outside my apartment that people who are homeless stay all day under. A couple was sleeping there last night. The reaction from people in our building when homeless to come and put their tents up was very negative. It was the fear that you have been talking about. There needs to some way to assure people that these issues that they are worried about are going to happen. I think that some people in their hearts do not believe that homeless are good people and we need to get rid of them. I think you need to assure people on Monday that there will be surveillance in the areas that they are concerned about.

- **C30** At Fraser Health there are many avenues of services from medical situation and other supports.
- C31 I think there are two sides to the safety concerns, one is the actual safety concerns and perception of who the homeless are, are they safe, their character, etc. I would suggest that there needs to be a paradigm shift on how we hold the homeless. Who they are, values. To stigmatize a group of people I think comes from a personal fear that we don't want to be homeless. I would not make those kind of choices, I won't make those kind of decisions, it won't happen to me. It is a them/us way to protect ourselves
- C32 It may be worth shifting the focus away from all the services that are going to support people to our intention to help that person to settle in, to feel at home, to have a safe place to heal, to be able to feel they are part of a community.
- C33 I was involved in Gateway of Hope when they first began and it was very divisive. I wrote to Mayor and Council about an individual that was housed there. He is now a very productive member of our church, he has a job and is stable.
- C34 I am happy to hear the understanding in this room about supportive housing and the support for this project. I also am happy to hear we have more work to do on affordable housing in the community. We haven't talked about the systemic cause of homeless which is poverty. When you are on disability, the housing portion is \$375. Even with a rent subsidy of \$450 it is really difficult to find a place.
- We are hearing in this neighbourhood around Brydon Crescent, this idea of gentrification is happening. The favorite refrain of our Mayor is we are open for business and you can start development in 10 weeks. We have had 6 couples that attend our neighbourhood meal at the Bridge Church have been evicted in the past 5 months. Most are living in their car or moving further out. This is a huge stress. As you drive in here every single house has been sold and they are going to be 3-4 storey apartment buildings. Most of the people living in these houses are renters. On the other side of 198 we have had 3 families evicted and moved or living in their cars.
- C36 I wanted to acknowledge that Fraser Health is really effective and their great work. I want to throw it out there that our organization (DOPES) is entirely peer based. No professionals. All members are homeless, live in shelter, on street, in car. Some have mental health issues, not everyone, some have addiction issues, not everyone, some have both and we are talking about people that have been on the street for one week to a lady who has been on the street for over 30 years and she is in her 70s.
- Q37 I have heard a lot of people from the agencies here, I am wondering what happens to people who are not linked to these agencies. Can people self-refer or some else refer them? My other question is what is wrong with the European model where people are subsidized in regular apartments?
- A37 In terms of the type of services it depends, in relation to housing if someone is not in a place where they can't make an application someone else could make that application for

them. They would have to agree to that service. This program will prioritize people who are in Langley of which groups like Stepping Stones know who they are. They will be able to contact people and let them know when housing is going to come available.

The homeless outreach program had rent subsidies when it started. You are correct, the \$375 has not gone up for a long time. The rental rates are going very high. So, what we are seeing in Langley and out to Chilliwack is the low end of market rental units are disappearing. Government has to build them or we have to give incentives to developers to build them. We have a challenge, gentrification is happening everywhere, so we have to think about how to protect the existing rental market.

- C38 I think we would be unrealistic to think that all people that are on the streets want to come inside and want help. 49 units is a great place to start. We need to start somewhere. I will reiterate then our neighbours son would not have died.
- **C39** A number of the programs in our community, Starting Point, ICM, so much about breaking down the barriers and people self-referring is about relationship building. The peer based organizations, the faith based organizations our community has a lot of people on the ground out there building relationships. This work supports people to overcome the fears and anxieties people have to reach out. It is a starting place.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Q & A (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- Q1 You mentioned that you will only allow Langley residents, what does Langley resident mean?
- As an agency who has been providing homeless outreach to the community for the last 12 years, we have a good idea of who has been living in Langley for a longer period of time and that would come out as part of the process. We are not looking at people who just happen to show up in Langley last week saying they have been in Langley. As part of the assessment that person needs to show that they have roots in Langley, where they have family or they have been in Langley for a long period of time and this is the community they call home.
- **Q2** So you control all the homeless people in Langley, do you know all of them?
- A2 I wouldn't say we know all of them. Part of the assessment is seeing where people have been for that last year to two years. I would say that we already know many of the homeless people in Langley who have been here a long time.
- Q3 You mentioned medical support. Does it also mean controlled drug injection?
- A3 It will not be a site with active drug treatment. Some people who are homeless may have mental health concerns and with that they are on medication. For some people who have a challenge to keep on their medication, or follow up on medication, the team would support them to stay on their medication. The ICM team is closely linked with the mental health centre in Langley and any type of work around medication being prescribed would be done at the mental health centre.
- **Q4** Will there be drugs in this house even controlled? Is it a safe injection site?
- A4 No it is not a safe injection site. The clients will have prescription medication and whatever else they do behind closed doors is their business because it is their own home.
 - These are people's homes. They close the door and it is their private space just as we would afford ourselves that privacy, they can do drugs. If they need to get connected with drug and alcohol counselling and those kinds of issues they will have support of the staff that is at the site. It is not a dry facility, it is a supportive environment where if they have issues they can find support.
- Q4 You said when you let people in that you can make arrangements to say "you need to take your medications or you can't live here" Is that correct?
- A4 Yes, it is part of the agreement.
- Q5 If you are going to have a participant agreement saying you must take your medications, why is there not something in place saying you cannot use illicit drugs?

- A5 This is supportive housing so it is staffed with people who have the expertise to support people with issues. When we are interviewing folks, we use a vulnerable assessment tool that is a standardized tool used across Canada. We get to understand the people's needs and then match them to the housing. If we come across people who have mental health and substance abuse issues then we know this is the right type of housing for them because it will match their needs. If we come across someone that needs more intervention from Fraser Health and they need to get certified, then they go to another stream. We are trying to address the needs of Langley, understand who is homeless and get them matched up to the right supports.
- Q6 Why don't you write it in the program agreement that they can't use illicit drugs?
- We are following the Housing First Model which has been researched across Canada. We want to get the person from where they are at and if they have a drug or mental health issues it is not a condition of them getting housing. They are on the street and have these issues. When they get housing they get stabilized and have the support and that makes them able to address their issues way better than if they are on the street just trying to survive. Research shows that people get better.
- C7 You said you are going to have staff on site 24 seven and ICM will be there. You also said that there is going to be 12 hour on site and 12 hour on call, that is not onsite 24 hours it is two different things completely.
- A7 There is more than one partner in this. The ICM team will be on site 12 hours and we will be on call for 12 hours.
 - There will be Stepping Stones support staff 24 seven. There will be two different sets of staff that will be there, one 24 seven and ICM team 12 hours a day but on call for their clients the other 12. Tennant support will be from Stepping Stones, clinical support from Fraser Health and housing support from us.
- I understand you have three different entities working together trying to help to make something happen. If you are going to staff a place it needs to be staffed 24 seven with people who can support people 24 seven, you can't pick and choose when those people are going to be there. People can come in with drug addiction problems and you help them. Where is the mechanism that triggers and says "you have now been here long enough and need to start taking action to make yourself better, here are the drug treatment programs we are going to offer you support and you now have to enter them?" Why is that unfair, I don't understand?
- A8 Housing First really is a model where you try to get someone shelter and then work on some of those issues. Some of the people within those housing units will be ready for that, others we will be working with to develop relationships with and hoping they will come forward but others may not be ready for that. The linkages to some of the supports for substance use services will be through Langley Community Services, they operate the ICM team.

- C9 At the October meeting, it was my understanding that there would be zero tolerance for street drugs for the people going into this housing. Now you are saying that it is behind closed doors and they can basically do what they want. My friend, who was previously on the streets, said that those people who truly want the help need to be put into a facility to get clean for a minimum of 90 days. I don't understand why they aren't going into a facility to get clean and then put them into housing. I find it very disturbing that I didn't get notice of these meeting until after a couple had already taken place. Some of my neighbours didn't even get one. It seems to me that this is already set in stone and it will go ahead and in time less and less people are going to speak up. If it wasn't set in stone, tell me why I didn't get a notice until the last minute?
- A9 I want to speak to the municipal process. This is the consultation phase and the rezoning application goes through the Township of Langley and will have to go through the normal municipal process where citizens will be given the opportunity to have their say at a Public Hearing. This is not a done deal.
 - The notice was supposed to be delivered several days before it actually was when it went into the mail drop. Once we recognized the notification had gone out too late, we actually went out and added a couple of extra sessions. We did a multi phased approach to promotion and promoted it on Facebook and reached out to a number of different groups including the Langley Meadows Community Association to make sure everybody was aware as much as possible. We did a Canada Post mail drop for a one km radius around the site because BC Housing doesn't have all your names and addresses. Anybody who has a red dot on their mail box and doesn't want to get spam mail didn't get the notification.. That is when we reached out to social media to get the word out as well.
- **C10** Spam mail is flyers, what you sent out is not different than the government sending you out a voting thing.
- A10 I appreciate it should have gone out to everybody and recognize that it is not spam mail but Canada Post does not recognize it as such

I want to address substance use. One of the key components of the program is that the person that has been referred to us or who has self referred has agreed that by being part of our program they are going to work on their substance use goals. I also want to let people know that we do an assessment and find out they don't have a substance problem we can send them to other services and agencies in the community.

It is important to know that this is housing for people with a range of issues. It could be a 60 year old woman with MS that isn't able to afford housing in the community. A portion of the people may have substance abuse issues that need support. Part of the assessment process is looking at what the individual needs and matching their needs to ensure they can be met. Part of it is making sure there is a good balance within the facility itself so that you don't have 100% of people with mental health and substance abuse issues in one building. We want it to be a healthy mix for the building and the surrounding community. The program agreement piece has each individual person working with

Stepping Stones through a case management process and will get what they need to help go through. Part of that agreement is good behaviour for within the building and good behavior for the community.

- C11 As a society we need to take care of our own people and we need to help them. I am here to speak on behalf of the children. Based on 2017 official homeless count 53% of the homeless population are addicted to substances and 38% suffer from mental illness. Based on those numbers, 53% of the people that will probably be the residents of supportive housing will be addicted to drugs and 38% will have mental health issues. You also will have this low barrier model that you will adopt in this supportive housing. As a teacher, child protection is ingrained in my blood and in my heart and I don't think it is ok to have this kind of facility two walking minutes away from two elementary schools. There are also many daycare centres around it. I am afraid that because 53% will be addicted to drugs that they will have drug dealers coming into the area. If something goes wrong in this facility, so many families are going to be affected. At the last meeting in October, you wrote in your report that 86% of the people were against supportive housing in that location. Aren't you listening to what the community wants? This is a democratic country, when people say something you need to listen. Is there a risk assessment plan? How do you protect those children in the elementary school? How are you going to protect the families around it? I don't want this area to go downhill and children to get hurt.
- A11 The ICM team does an assessment that identifies what the client's needs are. It is a voluntary program. Part of the ICM team's challenges is to find housing for individuals. If the ICM team identifies someone who needs housing they would then go through the BC Housing and Stepping Stones process in getting into supportive housing.

We work closely with the RCMP and bylaw. When we talk about the community action committee, that would be one of those avenues where concerns coming from the community would be able to be heard by a wide range not just Stepping Stones. There are people from the community that will be part of that committee so as far as addressing community concerns goes, that is probably the readily accessible big picture piece. One of the challenges of the homeless count is that it is a point in time. There is a variance in the people that we will be working with and they are not all going to be this one type of individual.

Other than working with BC Housing and the RCMP, they work in all communities doing this kind of thing so when it comes to community risk assessments, they would be the experts in what they are doing.

As we mentioned, people will go through a thorough assessment and we look at various areas of the individual's characteristics that include mental health, physical health and survival skills. We look at length of homelessness, that is the assessment that we understand the person with. If we deem them too high of a risk for this type of housing, they will not go into this housing. We want to make sure that they get matched to the

proper type of housing based on their needs. With the risk assessment piece, that is how we understand who is going in the building. We can confidently say that the tenant mix in that building is a low risk to the community. There is a range of mental health issues and what we typically find in the homeless population is depression and anxiety and the way they deal with it is to self-medicate. That is sort of the connection between mental health and drug use. Once somebody gets into housing, they can address those issues. It is mainly people with mood disorders that we are dealing with and are experiencing homelessness.

We can partner with the Look Out society who actually has two different programs in place looking at needles in the community. One will go into camps and clean up camps and community spaces. The other is called Rig Riders where they are out on bikes and go pick up needles. If there are areas of high concern we can set up regular patrols.

The 85% was based on the 228 people who submitted comment sheets, not who attended the meeting. There were 419 people that attended the meeting.

- C12 I attended the Public Meeting in October 2017 and when asked what the target group for the residents of the housing would be, we were told it was the 40 year old male with drug addiction. I am not concerned about seniors living there but I am concerned about drug addicts living there. You keep saying that you want there to be a balance of people living there but the focus seems to be on drug addicted individuals. It was also brought out at the meeting that individuals would be able to do drugs in their own units and that they would not have to attend any programs to improve themselves and try to get away from their addiction. It concerns me that everything I have worked so hard for is at risk and you aren't taking my concerns seriously.
- A12 With the ICM team, it is voluntary and when someone is accepted onto our team that we work with, one of the goals is their substance use. There are 49 rooms in the Quality Inn and they are not all going to be working with the ICM. Over 50% of our clients are over 45 and the oldest client we have had is 72. The number one goal of clients is housing and number two is to work on substance use.

As people get engaged in housing and get that shelter over their head, it gives them a bit more opportunity to think about other options and treatment. When they are not constantly thinking about where they are going to find shelter, there is supports that are in reach to them to get linked to support services. It is not going to work for everyone it just gives more opportunity to reach out to services once the housing part is dealt with.

- Q13 What happens in the instance that it doesn't help and they don't turn that corner and are now in my community? What happens then?
- A13 If they are not working out as far as housing and there are repeatedly challenges then they won't be able to stay at that housing.

- C14 I have lived in the neighbourhood for about FOIPPA s.22(1) and have seen an increase in the number of homeless in the area. There are people in the parks, just walking around and pan handlers on the streets. What is this housing project doing to address that need? From what I have seen, those people are probably addicted to something. What is this project doing to address that need for those people? You say you are putting low risk people into this 49 unit complex but it is high risk people that are clearly in the neighbourhood already.
- Q15 On the slide it says BC Housing already owns that building and I am wondering what research was done to say that that building was a valuable asset to purchase as compared to what may have been available in other areas?
- A15 People coming into the neighbourhood that are homeless are an increase in number and a saturation in geographic area. As we have worked in Langley, we have seen the downtown core start to expand. People going into different areas which is unfortunately a natural progression. When you ask how the Quality Inn can address that, it is by taking 49 people from the streets, and places like hospitals and Gateway. We can open up other spaces for service providers.
 - This is going to be part of the continuum of housing. There are homeless people in the shelters, move them into the Quality Inn and then we free up some space in the shelter. That is how it will impact our community. We are seeing this type of increase of homelessness all across the province.
- Q16 You mentioned there will be two overnight staff, is there going to be security as well?
- A16 There are security measures in place but there will not be security guards on site. There will be an environmental assessment done by the RCMP for best safety management. There will be increased lighting around the building, increased security cameras and we will work with the RCMP and bylaws to make sure there is an increased presence around the community.
- **Q17** Will it be a locked facility where people need fobs to get in?
- A17 Yes and it will be staffed at the front so we see people coming in and out.
- **Q18** What is the amount of rent based on?
- A18 The majority of folks coming in will be on social assistance welfare. Part of the welfare support is their shelter portion which is \$375 and will go towards their stay there.
- Q19 How often will staff check on people in their rooms? Is there a timeline that if you haven't seen someone you go into their room?
- A19 Yes, that is something that can be addressed through a program agreement.
 - Best practice for supportive housing is to do health checks on a regular basis. If we haven't heard from them in 24-48 hours the staff have to knock on the door and to in to make sure people are ok.

- Q20 There are concerns that a whole bunch of people will come into an area when supportive housing is offered. Is that what is happening, are you collecting a whole bunch of people and they are coming into the neighbourhood or are they already there? Is it an influx of scary people that are coming in? Are the drug dealers already there and is this a community problem you aren't seeing because it is defused across the neighbourhood?
- A20 We want to make sure this building is impacting the local homeless within this area. These people are residents and neighbours and are already amongst us. We just need to understand their needs and get them in.
 - I would say the problems are already in the community. If you took everything that happened in a homeless camp and took that individual and gave them housing, some of those issues lessen. The dealers are already in the community, petty crime is already in the community. This would be a way to help address some of those issues for 49 individuals at a time.
- **Q21** What does the research say about communities when supportive housing comes in? Does it bring more crime? Does it bring more needles? Are people safer or not?
- A21 There are a series of case studies on the BC Housing website, under the research centre, called the community acceptance studies. They are looking at supportive housing going into communities and what some of the best practices are for making them successful and how to engage the community. Some of the research that comes back shows that there is a decrease in police calls in the area. For people that have been following along with what has been happening at Marpole, there was a recent study showing that between December and April the actual crime within that area has decreased by 24% since Marpole opened up.
- Q22 Lets say it was a high risk facility and you are taking a bunch of scary dangerous people that we worry about into community and put them in this housing unit. What happens to them after they are in the housing unit? Do they seek out services, are they good neighbours?
- A22 People who are homeless aren't scary and dangerous. There may be some but that is the same with the general population. We are talking about understanding people's needs and getting them housed. We are trying to create a community that is going to be healthy and can help people that have some issues get better. We want to make sure this building is successful and make sure it fits into the community. We have various supportive housing across the province that becomes part of the community. It gets integrated and there is a level of inclusion for people that have issues that are amongst us and they integrate into the community. As people get better we get them along the housing continuum. If they get worse then we help them find the proper supports.
- C23 I know that mental illness and crime are not correlated overall, there are very specific disorders that are associated with crime. By the time we are 40, half of us have had a significant mental health issue so it is common in the general population. A stat of 58%

- isn't that much higher than the general population. Not all substance abusers engage in criminal activity but there is the harm reduction component, things like needles on the ground. I worry about needle disposal on site and safe disposal. The main issue is point in time counts and if you are counting couch surfers and those who are struggling and would they qualify? What is your definition of homelessness for residency versus at risk?
- A23 We have a Housing First program within our outreach team. Individuals who are eligible to access that program have been chronically homeless, meaning homeless for 180 days in the past year without shelter. Or if they have three episodes in the last year where they have been homeless for at least 90 days. We can look at people who have been couch surfing and are the hidden homeless that might not be caught in a point in time count. Those people will be part of the pool of people we look at when we are looking for people to live here.
- Q24 I want to know what Stepping Stones is doing right now about the homeless feces and cleaning up of needles in the park and camps? Who other than the Township is responsible for clean up or volunteering?
- A24 When it comes to camp cleanup we are not involved directly. We are involved if a camp has been visited by Bylaw. If there are individuals in the camp that are at risk, we get a call to go in and see how they are doing before the camp is taken apart. RCMP and Bylaws call us when a camp is going to be closed and we can go talk to people and let them know what is going to happen if they don't clean up. We have harm reduction and capacity to pick up needles in camps when we see them.
- Q25 I understand the units will be the resident's homes where they can do what they please. Does that mean they are allowed to bring in guests at any time?
- A25 There has been discussions with a group of people potentially interested in going into the Quality Inn and the topic of guests came up. They talked about the impact of guests on residents and the community and the program agreement. One of things they said was, for the first while as everybody is getting used to each other, why won't we limit the number of guests. The program agreement would be very much like the residential tenancy agreement where you can't have ongoing guests. We would know who is coming in and going out. The front desk will be staffed and there will be a sign in process to know who is in the building.
- Q26 Are there other facilities that offer such support that will be doubled up or duplicated by this facility for people that need help with addictions and substance abuse?
- A26 Depending on what their need is. If they need detox they could be referred to Surrey and access service there. There is no inpatient detox in Langley. There is substance and alcohol abuse programs offered through Langley Community Services. If it is identified they want to go into support recovery, then we can get them linked into the larger services and there could be a bed found for them.

- There are three or four agencies trying to do everybody's job and everybody has a hand in the pot. Seeing success as being their version of it, success being we have found homes for people, helped people off the street and fixed their additional issues and all sorts of things. The problem is that you aren't together and consolidated as a group to have cohesive answers. You tell us one thing one time and something else another time. Because you are not on the same page it creates a lot of mistrust and makes it so the general public thinks you have no idea what you are doing. We get different answers for the same type of questions. If BC Housing can't find a way to get a piece of paper in my mail box how can I trust them to do anything else? Maybe they should hand deliver the flyers.
- My neighbours and I are strongly against this idea and we believe it will raise crime in the area. We have to make sure the whole community gets notified so that the whole community can make this decision. RCMP can't handle the current problems in Langley and it has one of the highest crime rates in the City. Now you are trying to introduce more crime into this area. You say in a study that people are homeless for three reasons, rent to high, income to low and non-suitable housing. I don't believe that to be true because I did my homework and people are mostly homeless because of addiction, having spent time in jail or mental illness. We need to help these people but the way you want to help them won't help them. You tell them they can live here but do whatever they want behind closed doors. You are not helping them. I think you are mixed up. If you can't guarantee zero drugs in this facility, then my neighbourhood and I are strongly against this facility.
- C29 I have family members that live on the street and have been addicted to drugs since their teenage years. I also have family members that have gotten help because they chose to stop. They went into a facility to get dry. I would like to see the people that you want to help, go into a facility for 91 days or whatever because they truly want help. Once they are clean move them in and set them up, educate them and get them back into society. I am against you putting drug addicted people in there and say they can do what they want in their room. I would prefer you help seniors who are on the streets because they can't pay their taxes. Or a single abused mother or any other people who actually want the help. I am concerned that the drug addicts are going to solicit the children because the school is right next door.
- C30 There is a big liquor store right next door and I have heard that a cocktail of drugs, mental health and alcohol can create deadly results. It can create sexual aggression and violent behaviour and then you have children 2-3 minutes away from this facility. I haven't heard a thing today about how you are going to address child protection. When you are bringing 49 people in you need to take that into consideration. You talk about studies and according to Vancouver Courier on September 23, 2014, social housing on the former Olympic village was 147 units. It generated 729 police calls in the first 16 months that included break-ins, stolen property, frauds, suicide attempts, domestic disputes and missing persons.

- A30 That article is referencing the Margret Ford. It was developed around million dollar condos. What did not happen in that process was a thorough assessment and understanding of who was going in the building and making sure that they were getting matched to the housing. We learned that we have a thorough screening process that we work with our non-profit provider and since then we have opened close to 1,200 units. The results from lessons learned is we have had buildings that integrate into the community quicker.
- C31 According to Global News, April 21, 2016, Rain City housing operated social housing in Port Coquitlam. There was lots of broken glass and needles and human feces left around and vomit everywhere. The staff at the nearby daycare showed the kids pictures of needles and they thought it was crayon and Lego or darts. I think with this model and this type of tenancy, we will see that kind of thing. At the October meeting 86% of people (that handed in a comment sheet) opposed this location. After talking to people in our community I think that percentage is very accurate. These are not bad people they just want to reduce the risk to the community and want to protect their families.
- C32 What percentage of the 500 filled out comment sheets?
- A32 There were 419 people at the meeting and 228 filled out the comment sheets.
- Q33 What percentage of the people who are in supportive housing seek out the services of the ICM team and how many of them are using it instead of just living there? Is there more people using than not or is it a significant minority that are using?
- A33 The majority of people in supportive housing are connected with services.
- Q34 What would constitute removal from a unit if you do have someone that is problematic?
- A34 If you had an episode that was severe in nature, say a violent outburst, then that would be a rapid response. If there are issues that can be addressed on a progressive level, presenting the issue and looking at solutions that would be the process we would take. Not necessarily a one strike out for everything.
- Q35 I wondered if there was a process because sometimes with rentals if you have a difficult tenant or something, the laws are very strict and I don't know if it is the same here. Could somebody be removed if they were causing issues?
- A35 Yes
- Q36 Am I correct in understanding that renovations have started on the Quality Inn? There has been some pushback from the community that I have seen, has that been put on hold until the decision has been made that the supportive housing will in fact go forward? If a resident were to be kicked out, where do they go? My biggest concern is what happens when they have to be removed because of behavioural issues.

- A36 No the renovations have not been started on the majority of the Quality Inn. The renovations that have started are to do with the fact that there is a sink hole by the building which is creating a safety issue for the area as a whole. They are doing remediation work on the sink whole because it is a safety risk. The renovations to make it into support housing have been put on hold until the decision has been made.
- Q37 Was it started and then put on hold or has nothing ever happened in terms of them starting to prepare the building?
- A37 I think they have done some basic pieces but I don't think they have done any major renovations.
 - If somebody was in a position where they were not able to stay at the Quality Inn then my first priority is to find a different place for them. Part of the agreement that we will have with the Gateway of Hope is taking people from their opportunities program, their transitional housing or if they have been in their emergency shelter and shown the ability to be stable and work on goals to bring those people to the Quality Inn. If we have someone that can't be in the Quality Inn, moving them back into the process so they can access the shelter space.
- C38 My issue is the location. I don't care what statistics say, the fact is drug addicts support their habits by stealing and committing crimes. I saw a pile of sand with needles stuck in it and there are kids walking by that pile of sand. I don't want it in our community and there are other places you can build it.

BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application to the Township of Langley for the Quality Inn at 6465-201 Street. BC Housing purchased the property and is undertaking renovations to convert the existing 50-room hotel into 49 units of supportive housing and programming space, and an office for a new Intensive Case Management (ICM) team. Stepping Stone Community Services Society would operate the supportive housing units and provide support services and programming for the residents. The ICM, in partnership with Fraser Health, would provide access to treatment for people who are experiencing homelessness.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Q & A (Index: Q: Questions C: Comment A: Answers)

- Q1 What other housing projects does BC Housing do in the community?
- A2 I realized I skipped an important slide that speaks to our recognition that we need a range of housing both affordable and supportive that we are investing in the City and Township of Langley. This includes regular social housing for low income seniors and low-income families, rental assistance through applied market WRAP and SAFER program for seniors. We have started to invest in youth housing and affordable rental. The BC Government budget includes an investment of 6.6 billion dollars over a ten-year period. There is a lot of work to be done and we need a whole spectrum and continuum of housing
- C2 What if we were not talking about supportive housing but we were talking about my son, or your son, who was successful, moved out and then had a sports accident and then he was no longer able to complete his apprenticeship, not able to do what he wanted to do and he could not see the future and went into drugs. What if we were talking about a wife who faced the tragic loss of a child but simply could not cope. And could not deal with the difficulties in her life and could not see a way forward and started to drink and it just got worse but she could not deal with it. What if we were talking about a husband that had a psychotic break totally unexpected and the person took the family car, drove to Phoenix and is now using drugs and is not getting help. What if we were talking about that sensible daughter we had great hopes for but then she got involved with a guy who was not good for her and things went from bad to worse and she got involved in all kinds of things she should not have got involved in. She needs help but doesn't want to come home and face that. These people are people we know, they are in need of help. I look around the room and I honestly believe these people would help their son, daughter,

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father..they would go, but what if that didn't help, what if you didn't have the resources or there was more than one issue, a divorce in the family, or not enough money, we then say what can the government do to help us, this is what the government can do to help.

- Vant to follow up on what this man just said. In my own family, I have a brother-in-law with FOIPPA s.22(1) and he lived on the street and now is living in a home with proper meds living the best life possible under supportive conditions. I have another brother-in-law who is also FOIPPA s.22(1) and he also lives on the streets in another province and they do not have supportive housing over there. A month ago I had to rent an apartment for him as he was sleeping the foyer of the police department. These kinds of places where you can have a managed environment, all the assessments can happen for addictions, trauma, these things work. I have seen it from my own experience and the more we can set up these types of environments for people who cannot help themselves. These people need help. We have to have the compassion to help these people or they will die. I am totally in favor of these types of places that are properly managed and supportive.
- Q4 I am a resident in the Willoughby community for over 10 years. I would like to reiterate my concern over this proposed supportive housing project because this site is located in the heart of a densely populated Willoughby community. It is surrounded by daycare centres, elementary schools, senior centres and family homes and family orientated businesses. On the east side of the Quality Inn there are 14 townhouse complexes each is comprised of over 100 family homes, two elementary schools and several daycares within walking distance of this site. On the west side of the Quality Inn Langley Meadows Elementary school and countless family homes. Behind closed doors the tenants of this proposed housing units do they have the freedom to do what they want being such a low barrier model. The homeless count report states that 53% of homeless are addicted to substances 38 % suffer from mental illness. My question is how are you going to manage the risk It will bring to the surrounding community, the risk it will bring to our children, our families and our businesses? My conclusion is that this is not a suitable location for the supportive housing.
- A4 I hear your concerns about safety of the neighbourhood. As the operator of this proposed site we are also concerned about safety of neighbourhood and people that live in the building. A few things even though people would be dealing with different issues that may be living there will be wrap around services and supports. It is not that it is a free for all, with no rules or expectations within building. People will be signing program agreement that they will be expected to be respectful of people in the building and the neighbourhood. We are concerned about safety. We will strike a community advisory committee which was described in the presentation. It will have community representation, people that live in the community, businesses, RCMP, Township Bylaw, BC Housing to talk about what people's concerns are and if there are issues that are really happening then how can we address those.

Q5 The 5:30 start time was very inconvenient, because my husband had to leave work early and I had to rush. I am not against the hotel being turned into housing, but my concern is finding a balance between the need of the homeless people you are seeking to help and the families surrounding the location. Is BC Housing willing to tweek the plan for this location? Does it have to be or can it be a drug free location, where people there are in programs. Or changing the clientele or residents to people who have come out of a treatment program instead, having that as starting point rather than current model. If you have considered other approaches, why have you not chosen any other approach based on the concern of the community?

Are you concerned that if you put a restriction on the terms that for example someone has to be in a rehab program for drug use, then people would not want to live there and it would fail?

Can people continue to live there while they are in a rehab program? Is there rehab program paid for?

A5 The slides talk about the number of homeless people in Langley and not all of these people are drug users and not all drug users are homeless. What BC Housing, Stepping Stone and Fraser Health use is an assessment tool used throughout North America to make sure that everyone that moves into this housing has the right level of supports and helps us to create the right level of tenant mix at site. We want like everyone in this room to make a difference in people's lives. We don't want this to impact negatively on the community. From BC Housing perspective, this has to target people that are street and sheltered homeless. We are in the midst of a crisis in this community. We will prioritize people that are homeless in the community of Langley, not people from outside Langley. Those people that move in will have the right level of supports whether physical health issues or mental health issues.

A lot of individuals have varied backgrounds and different needs, some have addictions issues while others have mental health issues. By starting with housing, it is the first step for the team to work with individuals to make small gains. People may not be ready at that time to go into other programs such as rehab, while some may be ready. The team is there with a variety of skills to support people.

Yes, people can continue to live there while they go to rehab program unless it is a residential facility where they have rehab. Yes, substance use services are free of charge and then they can come back to the housing.

C6 I was at the last meeting in the fall I filled out the survey gave my email address but I was not notified about this meeting. I found out about this meeting and the other dialogues three days after the first community dialogue on May 15. I found out that it is being blamed on Canada Post that if you have a red dot on your mail box then they don't deliver general mail to you. I don't have a red dot, I live within 100 metres of this proposed place and I am opposed. I am against it. I am against the allowance of drug and alcohol in the rooms. I am agreement with helping people. If this was for elderly people

for battered women. Why are these people homeless there are many different reasons. Some of these reasons are because their mother, brother, or son don't want them in their house because they are scared of what is happening around their other kids, things going missing. I live in this area, why do I have to be told this is what you are going to do. My question is why not use the land Trinity Western wanted to buy but was turned down to build a hospital and have a treatment centre where people that need to be treated because they have a drug addiction, an alcohol addiction, a mental illness why not do that.

My main concern is why is there not better communication. With no disrespect I live within 100 metres. I don't have a red dot, you had my email and I did not receive any notification explain that to me. I said I was publicly against this and that is why I think I did not get any notification.

- A6 There was a multi-prong approach to notification around this process. We notified it on Facebook, in community papers and we sent out a neighbourhood letter. I appreciate that some people have said they did not receive it or they received it late. The letter was sent out to a 1 km radius around the Quality Inn on May 11. It was done through Canada Post mail drop those without a red dot (indicating they do not want flyers) did not get it. BC Housing has to use Canada Post because we do not have the names and addresses of people that live in the area. We also reached out to the Langley Meadows Community Association and other stakeholder community groups and asked them to share it through their networks. My understanding is that they did this. Given that some people missed the earlier community dialogues we added extra sessions the next week in the day, evening and on the weekend.
- FOIPPA s.22(1) **C7** Hi, I have been homeless for the last . I have nothing FOIPPA s.22(1) to be ashamed of. , I would like to get inside but I do have addiction issues. I am addressing them right now as we speak. I am in the methadone program and have been on it since October. I have stuck with it, I have fallen back once and picked myself up. I really want to live inside. I don't want to live outside anymore. I have the right to a place. I live in Langley Township for FOIPPA s.22(1) . I had a house in the Township that we owned for SOLPPA s.22(1), then I became a renter in the City of Langley. I really feel like I am a piece of crap on the side of the road the way people talk about homeless, we have schools down the street, we have this or that. It makes you feel unwanted. I have daughters and granddaughters. I would never hurt your children or be part of a community that was not caring enough to look after their neighbours. I grew up in White Rock when it was a small town, and Langley was a really small town. I know what it is like to be part of community. I would want you to voice your opinions against the things that are done wrong by the homeless community but I would also want you to voice your opinions about the things that are done right by the homeless community. I know we have done a lot of good things around our neighbourhood at the Vineyard Church. We are not all that bad of people. If you had one on one talks with us, I would even buy the coffee I will sit and address your questions, please have a look at what the

face of homelessness is now. We are people that have had problems, by brother FOIPPA s.22(1)

have been trying that long to get a place to call home for that long for her and I. It is probably why my addictions got so bad because I had no home and I lost hope. I don't want to leave Langley it is my home, my community. Why should I made to go to Hope, Kelowna, somewhere else. Why should I be made to go because you are not comfortable and I am made to feel not welcome.

- C8 I want to reiterate that I don't know why everyone assumes that the homeless are all criminals. I assure you there are more criminals living in houses in Langley. If you are that concerned about safety I would check out your neighbours criminal history. Recently two people were murdered in Willoughby and another at 232 Street in a drive by shooting. I would like to say that people take a look at yourself before you start pointing fingers. Most of the homeless people in Langley are indigenous, that means they have been raised here and lived here all their lives. It is not fair that they should be told to leave or given housing in their own community. And especially since most of them have raised children here, paid taxes here. A lot of people are homeless because of medical and health issues.
- C9 I have participated in many community meetings and a few of us said we wanted to give back to the community, some ideas included gardening, community kitchen, and I wanted to volunteer supports for seniors and ongoing maintenance of the facility.
- C10 I am a Langley resident and have been in Langley for over solved. I have a business and my son has a business. I am standing here trying to be positive and encourage people not to judge and this gentleman behind me in the audience says, "bullshit" as someone else is talking. We are calling them these people, the less fortunate but they have names. Do you know their names? Do you say hello? Until you live in their shoes for one day, I would not judge. I hear you complaining, these people are everywhere. They are on the street, by Gateway of Hope, by the Church, what BC Housing is telling you that they would like to take people off the street and put them somewhere safe so you don't keep complaining about it. So let's work together as a community and open your heart.
- C11 I spent my weekend walking around neighbourhood to gather opinion of neighbours. What I found was that approximately 80% of people I talked to have no idea about this project, so it is about communication. Around about 96% of people are against idea.

(Facilitator) Can you tell us how many people that represents in actual numbers?

I talked to 60 people, why are we against this, we are not against supportive housing especially if it is for people that need it like single parents, elderly people, students or people with disabilities. We are concerned about drug abuse. We want to help people with drug abuse but providing them with shelter is not help. They require a comprehensive help. You have a very successful competitor John Voken. He helps drug addicts, he builds community, provides education and job training. There has to be a will and a wish to be there. You cannot help me that do not want help. If you are drug free we will help you. If you want to continue using drugs then we in this community are against

- it. We also have kids, who will find needles in playgrounds. We know it will increase crime although I agree that not all homeless have predilection to crime. It is about drugs.
- C12 I would like to thank BC Housing for all the programs you are setting up it is awesome news for Langley. I would also like to thank Lookout get off the street. It is a great program. For the people that are saying you don't want programs that give people a home and help get off the drugs. I want that in the community. I want to make people better.
- C13 The Lookout Society is on Glover and Logan in Langley. We have a program with two full time staff and a number of peers. You may have seen them riding around and these two ladies that are part of our harm reduction team. You can call them anytime, if you find rigs (needles and paraphernalia) in parks, school grounds, business, you can call 604-812-5277 and say the location and they will go out and pick up needles etc. If you see a homeless camp you can also call the number on this card they do outreach and will go and talk with that person and can connect them with a number of other people at agencies that provide support. I will pass these cards out we collect from Langley City, Township and Aldergrove.
- My wife and I and our family have been a resident of Langley for FOIPPA s.22(1). I work in the FOIPPA s.22(1) . We are in the midst of a crisis not just Langley but in every North American and European city. This initiative is one of the great things that is taking place, in the presentation they demonstrated five other great examples where this type of housing is operating very successfully in dense residential areas. After opening they have very favorable reviews from the community. I know 85% of the applicants that have applied to live in this Quality Inn. By far the majority are applying because they want to see change in their life. To have this available to them when they need it and as a community what we have to continue to push is compassion, understanding, and cooperative spirit because you cannot get off the street by yourself that is a reality.
- What a difference an address makes, if you are homeless and you go to the hospital, the second question they ask you is where do you live? Once they find out you do not have an address then the services are significantly curtailed. It is not that they don't want to help but help needs to go somewhere, they need to follow up for specialist appointments, or you have a bad sleeping situation and you sleep through an appointment, or you don't have a way to get to the Hospital. The Housing First program out of Medicine Hat that has brought the services to the people. So that people who need different kinds of help get the help they need. For someone that has significant disabilities they can have difficulty doing taxes, getting support
- C16 I fully support what you are doing.

 FOIPPA s.22(1)

 The biggest challenge we have is connecting people to services. The other thing about families is we have involved our children for the past 20 years working with the homeless in Langley and Surrey. Our children have grown up respecting the homeless and wanting to

- help. I want to encourage those families having fearful thoughts to one Sunday come down to Langley Friends Vineyard and meet some of these amazing people.
- I ran the petition to support this project. I have to say it was enlightening process getting involved in the for petition. Originally, I was not sure what I was getting myself into but I was seeing more and more homeless people on the streets of Langley and it disturbed me. I started to look at the research particularly the Housing First model. I totally understand the emotional reaction people have when they hear about a project like this. I would encourage you to dig into the research and read the papers. There is one by SFU Centre for Applied Research in 2008 on mental health and addictions. Many of the reasons to be for supportive housing have already been mentioned. This research and others demonstrate that the safety concerns and negative property value impact is not borne out in the evidence. I am scientist myself so evidence is important to me. I want our governments to make decisions based on evidence not emotions. I encourage everyone to have an open mind and look at the evidence.
- C18 I am resident about 1 km away from building. I heard a lot of speakers speak and I wonder how may live close to Quality Inn. If you live further away and you say I am Langley resident it is not really fair because most of the impact is to us. This project is not around your home. I am educator, not just about needle on street, I chose Langley instead of Surrey when I moved from Burnaby was because I thought Surrey was not safe. I felt that this little town when I passed by on the way to Hope twenty years ago was safer. All the neighbours have young kids, they learn behaviors from what is going on around them. I would say if you don't want to do this around your home please don't do it around ours.
- **C19** Get them in there as soon as you can. I am for this supportive housing
- when I was a child, more recently I have lived in Langely for Riders, we ride around and pick up the needles you are concerned about. Please contact us, we can even do extra runs around your neighbourhood if that is what you need. Recently I found myself homeless and this would be a perfect place for me to live. Unfortunately, I have fought addictions problems for many years. I need a break
- Q21 Hello, I am recent very proud Canadian citizen a couple of years ago. I live in the neighbourhood. I got a letter on achieving my citizenship, the letter goes on but when I became a citizen I swore to protect the rights and freedoms of others and to work to make this a better place. I believe it is everyone's right to have a safe place, and I believe they need a home to begin to do that. My question is related to one of our fundamental needs and that is belonging. I don't know how to help people recover from addictions but I do know how to be a friend, but I want to teach my young boys this too. Do you see a way that this housing project can welcome members like myself to build a healthy and welcoming community for those in need?
- A21 By providing a home for 49 people there will be a home within the building and we are looking to people in the community that want to be part of that. You are right community

- and connection is what is really going to make difference in people's lives.
- When you sent out the letters what was the radius that it went out? I hear that people speaking are from all over Langley, yet the letter you sent was to those in the 1 km area as they were most affected. I feel that their voice should be the ones that are really heard. I am not saying they are 100% right. I speak to balance, maintaining the lifestyle that the children and families are used to having while helping the most people we can. I feel that those people in the 1 km radius are not being considered to be as important as the need of the homeless. Are the children raised in this environment, are their needs not equally important as the homeless. I would ask for a compromise in the selection of the residents to people who are already in process of being healthier.
- A22 I hear members of the public saying that BC Housing said it was 1 km.
- Q23 I want to know how the communication for the Public Hearing is significantly better than this public meeting and the other meetings. I wonder if some members of the homeless who are not drug addicted are feeling that the supports are not there so they need to say they are drug addicted to the ICM team to get into this supportive housing. Why does Langley not have a Detox Centre?
- A23 The Local Government Act governs how you proceed forward when you are doing a land use change. This is what this is, BC Housing has submitted a rezoning application, then as the applicant BC Housing is required to host a Public Information meeting, the first of which we held in the fall. BC Housing has engaged in a public education campaign to build understanding and address concerns. To ensure we address your concerns we have done further community dialogues, some newspaper articles, advertisements and this public meeting. All of which go to Council. The Public Hearing is the municipality's jurisdiction, we host this meeting, they host the Public Hearing. They communicate about that based on their requirements under the Local Government Act. The municipality has not set the date but once they do they will communicate with citizens.

In terms of the Detox Centre question, there is a Detox Centre in Surrey that is a regional resource that anyone in the Fraser Health area can access. Individuals who need detox can be referred there. These is also new models out there that Fraser Health has been using called Mobile Detox. We have that in the eastern Fraser, which is Chilliwack, Mission so that is another option. It is a matter of resources as a Detox Centre is quite expensive to operate.

In terms of the question about the ICM team, we have 73 clients that we work with, and we have had 110 clients apply for our services. We do an assessment whether someone is referred from an agency or a shelter or by themselves. In that process, we determine how we are best going to help this individual and the services they need. In that process, we have had 2 individuals who have stated that they have had a significant substance use problem. In the assessment, we determined that was not necessarily the case and through conversation with them we determined they just want housing, as with any referral we receive, if we deem the client does not meet our criteria then we connect

them with community services that can help them. For the ICM program they have to be 19 years of age, they have to be willing to attend our program and want a change in their life. In our program, we will support people to work on their substance use issues. The #1 goal for all our clients is to get housing, the #2 goal is to get help with treatment or assistance with their substance use.

- Q24 I work with the homeless feeding them on street on Thursday night and I am also an emergency room nurse. I have seen drug use and it's affect at its very worst. I think the panel is downplaying the problem of drug use in the homeless population and what that drug use does to the communities in which they live. I have a couple of questions, inside the home, I am assuming many of you have worked with people with drug addictions, maybe not in emergency, you realize how violent they can get, how high they can get and how crazy it can become. Do you have security in the home for staff and for other residents and how well trained they will be? Who will check on people could there be someone that is dead for five days. Also I would like to know what the plan is for RCMP surveillance in the area and what plan is being put in place to ensure that drug deals do not increase in places such as the Home Depot parking lot, the Walmart parking lot. What is the plan? I don't think we can negate the impact of bringing people who use drugs on a regular basis into a community, has on a community. I appreciate the stories from the homeless people, but after I serve them supper, they shoot up under a tarp right beside me. I do believe they need help, but I don't want to bring that into my community.
- A24 There will not be security people in the building but there will be staff 24/7. We currently support people that are housed in market housing people that use substances, that use alcohol and they are responsible tenants. We have people sign program agreements that clearly lays out expectations around people's behavior, we will work very closely to make sure everyone is safe in the building. In terms of the neighbourhood that will be part of the discussions on the Community Advisory Committee. If there are issues that are coming up off our property like people are witnessing drug deals involving people that live in the housing we would be working with the Committee to address that. I hear your concerns and while I have not worked in an Emergency room, we have a lot of experience for the past 30 years operating housing and supporting people in scattered market housing in the community. Some of those people have substance use issues, are there ever times when we have to call on the RCMP, absolutely there are times. We will use the resources available to us at any given time. My experience has been that most people once they are housed and have the proper supports we do not anticipate that being a huge, ongoing, daily issue.

To be quick the RCMP on any new project in the community we love to become active full partners in making sure the community is safe, the project is a success. If this project gets off the ground we will be at the table. We are at the table now, if it takes special targeting as it gets off the ground we will be there. We will constantly assess any crime issues as we do in any other part of the community and respond accordingly. It will be under the microscope if it gets up and running. From the policing perspective, it depends on what is

being reported and what we are seeing, we respond appropriately, whether that means plain clothes surveillance, plain clothes engagement, or uniform engagement. We have multiple tools at our disposal, until the problem surfaces I can't give you a solution as it would be speculative.

I speak as a former social worker prior to being the Executive Director & Strategic Advisor on Homelessness, Supportive Housing Programs, BC Housing I spent two years in St Paul's Emergency Room in Vancouver and worked in ER's in London, England. I have seen violence in ER's, I would respectfully suggest that the ER is a very different setting than what we are trying to do here. This is supportive housing and what I have seen working in the health system and ERs and community based setting, is the difference a community based setting makes for people who have had the experience of homelessness and living on the street, just the impact of coming inside and shutting your front door in terms of the impact that makes on your behavior. I am not Pollyannaish about it. This is why we are putting high level supports into this housing. In addition, BC Housing as part of our contract for supportive housing has minimum 48 hour room checks. It can often be more than that depending on individual assessment and the person's needs.

- I am really struggling with the logic of the No side. You put people in a home there is no needles on the street, there are no needles in the park, on the school ground. You leave people living on the street that is where everything is and that is where everyone's problem is. I have a daughter in Langley Meadows school. We live in the neighbourhood. They found needles on the playground. I would love anything to not find needles on that playground. What is the solution, its right here, put them in a supportive housing and the needles stay in there. The other thing I would like to bring up is there a lot of people that are dead set against this, came and sat down and didn't even read the boards. These people have to pay rent. Its pretty hard to pay rent if all your money is going to drugs. It seems to me that people's priorities are skewed a bit and more focused on property values and not wanting it close to their homes. And by the way no one complained when the liquor store went in and it was close to their house so they can get their booze for the weekend.
- Q26 I live right across from the proposed development I never got a notice. I have emailed BC Housing a number of times, spoken to you and the Mayor but got no notice. Of the 82 residents in my complex 6 people got one. You are lacking in your communications. Maple Ridge has the same problem, lack of communication. In my complex 82 families no one is opposed to housing we are opposed to low barrier. We are opposed to you not working with the neighbours directly adjacent to say what is going to work for you guys. I think it is done deal, you buy buildings like Surrey Place and it went through. We don't have a say, you are not listening to us. I am concerned our needs are not being met and this room is empty compared to how many people came out in the fall. I want to know how many supportive housing that BC Housing proposed around the province get stopped, got shut down by community? I also want to know have you ever changed the program from low barrier model to high barrier zero tolerance model because the community is opposed?

- A26 Certainly while there are some that don't get developed we are hearing more Council's and communities saying yes to modular housing including Chilliwack, Sechelt, Richmond, Abbotsford. Right now we have approximately 1,000 units of modular housing either opening or scheduled to open in the next 12-18 months across the province.
 - No, we have not changed the approach from low barrier because we need to bring people who are street and sheltered homeless inside. The more restrictions we put on the more people will stay on the street. Beside the human cost to homelessness, the most expensive way to treat people is to keep them on the street.
- **Q27** I am in support of the project. I live two blocks away from the Quality Inn. I live close and would like to understand more about the ICM team?
- A27 The ICM team has been operating in Langley since the end of September beginning of October 2017 we have as part of our staff a psychiatrist, a nurse practitioner, 3 case managers, register nurse, registered psychiatric nurse, a peer support worker and a housing procurement specialist and an addictions counsellor and administration. Every client that comes to use our services has access to these each one of those professionals. We do not tell people what is best for their lives. They tell us what they want for their lives and we help them with that process. If people on our case load were able to access services today they would not be on our case load. Our staff are available 12 hours a day and on call for the other 12 hours 7 days a week.
- **C28** In Abbotsford the Salvation Army operates with the same type of ICM approach. There are about 90 people that live around that homeless shelter in shanty squats. It is not a criminal activity to put up a tarp or defecate on the sidewalk so the police can't do anything and as a result Paladin Security has a full-time contract so hopefully the Provincial Government is accounting for that. I am a homeowner and a small business FOIPPA s.22(1) the proposed project and my voice is disenfranchised because I was not given anything in the mail that let me know that this project was being considered. I do have a deep sense that this is a fete accompli. Are projects like this being considered in West Van, Shaughnessy, Point Grey, Kerrisdale, North Vancouver. I agree with the pastor that this is not just happening in Langley it is a Canadian issue. In 2009 and 2010 there was a concentrated effort to move the homeless out of the downtown eastside in advance of the Olympics and I believe this project is a continuation of those efforts. Homelessness is a Canadian issue and I don't think it is fair to saddle that only on the Township and City of Langley. Will the Provincial Government be setting aside the extra 300 to 400,00 a year for extra policing costs. If you build it they will come.
- A28 First, in terms of the issues in Abbotsford and the Salvation Army service is a shelter. This is not a shelter it is supportive housing. You are not going to have tents and tarps outside. This has not happened at any other supportive housing project that we have.
 - In terms of housing in Vancouver, many years ago there were 12 sites with 1200 units of supportive housing throughout Vancouver some on the west side and some on the east side and some downtown. Those have been operating for 10 years and have been very

successful. We have learned a lot over the years from issues that have arisen. They all operate well and some are near schools. We have six sites that we have earmarked for this type of modular housing, four of six are already operational, two are under development. Those are all going to operate like this supportive housing project. They will have 24/7 supports. There are no housing projects at this time being developed in the communities you mentioned but there are some being considered. There are projects on West 2, on Ash and Little Mountain, Heather and Fir.

- **Q29** On these other sites have you seen any increase in crime?
- A29 We don't have thos statistics with us tonight. However, a recent media report on the Marpole modular site, the RCMP indicated there had been a 24% reduction in crime in that area.
- G30 I understand what people are worried about. I have two children they are more world. I grew up in a pretty tough life, and while I don't want to shelter my children I don't want them to go through what I did. I want them to be kids. I am all for helping people that want to be helped but you need to listen to people and not have people who are doing drugs in this house. I moved to Willoughby so that my wife and daughter can walk down the street without being scared. So far they have been able to do that.
- Q31 Drug addictive people have strong temptation. John Volken Academy makes them take responsibility for their life. Drug addicted people often have no will so when they start recovery they will not have strong will. They will agree and then not agree any more. What to do if someone agrees to program but then does not have will to work on addiction issues? Also what can you say about what John Volken says about drug dealers find lots of clients in these places? Also, why would you not provide these places to people that would integrate with our community like single parents, mothers, students that are for sure safer?
- A31 Yes, we would possibly house someone that is not ready to work on their drug issue at the time. We would be working with people every day once people have stable place and a home they want to make change. Some might choose to go to treatment centre, others might do it as an outpatient.
 - We definitely will be monitoring the property not just the immediate Quality Inn but the Home Depot parking lot. We are not in support of any dealers being in the area. If that was an issue we would work very closely with the RCMP.
 - More affordable housing is being developed in Langley for low income seniors and others
- Q32 I am representing Triple A senior housing. We advocate for more affordable housing options for seniors, more of whom are becoming homeless. We are proposing 49 homes for 49 people. I have heard 2 people here tonight are applying and I can see they are seniors like me. I have heard of others that are going to apply. The 206 homeless are not all here, but we need to remember they are our neighbours. This will give them hope. We need this housing for seniors who cannot deal with their addictions issues on their own. I

was happy to hear about the Look Out program because I am the and we have found needles on our grounds. There are homeless camping in the children's park across the street. I am happy that there are supports coming to help us with these issues.

- Q33 When I was 16 my mother, brother and I became homeless. My mom had health problems and she didn't want to tell family and friends. We all carried this shame. I had a boyfriend from another church and I was to keep it from him for the whole summer until a series of events happened and I shared with him where we were at. He went home and told his parents and they graciously opened their home to us for a couple of weeks. They helped us get an apartment that had everything we needed because we had lost everything. This was a game changer to have a roof over our head, stability. My brother and I were able to go back to school. I just want you to consider how you hold the homeless. Our socio-economic status does not define our value, our potential is, or our character or moral fiber. Please don't sweep everyone into the same group. Lets look at all people that are homeless from an evidence perspective rather than fear based. My question for those that have mental health issues but not drug addicted would they be able to access this facility?
- A33 Yes, absolutely someone that has those type of experiences does not these kind of supports to stabilize and move on with their life.
- Where is the Detox Centre in Surrey? My other issue is you are going to put seniors, drug addicted people together in a home together. This is not safe. I have drug addicted family members that choose to stay on the street. Others that have sought help. If you want to put this centre here. In your meeting report from Oct 2017 you say 190 people opposed it and you say you want to listen to us yet you have not effectively let the people in that 1 km know about the meetings. We are asking for fairness and that everyone is informed about what is going to be in their back door. Let the home be for someone that has gone through detox, that wants to get ahead in life and is not using drugs. You say you all these other homes well then put them in those homes don't put them here unless they have gone through detox and we can feel safer with. Why don't we have any rights. I also said in the community dialogue that you are going to do what you want to do and you are hoping that less and less people are here
- A 34 It is right behind the Surrey Hospital
- Q35 I agree with her that we were not notified. I live in Langley Meadows we have lived there for FOIPPA s.22(1). It was a great little community but changing. Someone should send this notice for needle pick up to everyone. I am not posting this on Facebook it should go to the principal of the schools. There was a woman who was lying in the Walmart foyer. I told management but they did not do anything. When I finished shopping she was still lying there so I asked them to call the RCMP and I waited. My question is how trained are the businesses to respond to these types of issues? What kind of training can community services provide to the community? Who could do that?

- A35 Look Out will share the information with the schools and post on Facebook.
- Q36 If Canada is a democratic state, I heard 86% of the people that submitted 228 comment forms in the fall were opposed, if that is case why are we still discussing this issue.
 I would also like to know more about the crime statistics around other social housing units.
- A36 This is a public meeting to discuss the issues. The development application for rezoning is decided by the Township Council that are elected. Their job is to consider the interests of the over 117,000 citizens in the Township and make a decision at the Public Hearing.

 Other than the one example provided earlier from Marpole we do not have general crime statistics at this time.
- **C37** I am still concerned about safety issues for children and for families this is all I have to say.

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
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




















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
