# 1. Kristi McIntosh

Kristi McIntosh appeared before Council to discuss opening of the Walnut Grove pool for user groups and the public. She commented that the Langley Olympians Swim Club would like to have the pool open as it is needed for elite aquatic training and sports. The Aldergrove Outdoor Pool will become too cold in the winter months for training use. Many other municipalities have opened their pools with COVID safety protocols in place. BC is now in Phase 3 of the viaSport Return to Sport Guidelines, allowing for a safe indoor facility opening. She asked Council to strongly consider opening the Walnut Grove pool.

#### 2. Susan Mackenzie

Susan Mackenzie appeared before Council to express concerns regarding removing the Fort Langley outdoor pool and replacing with a spray pad. She stated that many residents did not realize that a decision had already been made in regards to the pool. She commented that the large trees around the park may cause issue with the drainage of a spray pad, and that a spray pad may be disrespectful to the cemetery. She further stated that a spray pad cannot be used for older kids and teens, birthday parties, etc. She asked for public input into how to save the pool.

# D. PRESENTATIONS

#### 1. Expanded Patio Usage

Staff provided an update regarding expanded patio usage. On May 22, 2020 the Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch (LCRB) approved Policy Directive 20-13, "Temporary Expanded Service Area Authorization", with an extension approved in September to October 31, 2021. On May 25, 2020, in line with the LCRB's policy

directive and in recognition of the economic impact of the pandemic on the hospitality sector, Council approved the expanded patio service area for restaurants, cafes, pubs, craft breweries, wineries, distilleries, and cideries. Given the success of the program in the Township, staff recommend a continuation of the temporary expansion of patio seating until such time as the LCRB's authorization ends on October 31, 2021.

# Submissions from the public:

- 1. B. MacLeod, a Langley resident, was in attendance and commented that he and his wife support this winery proposal.
- 2. K. Van Spronsen, a Langley resident, was in attendance and commented that a 47-signature petition has been submitted opposing the winery expansion to 96 seats. 96 seats is a large increase from 30 seats.

The following written submissions were received from the public:

1. D. and J. Kormilo, Langley residents, expressing opposition to the winery as it will change the quietness and peacefulness of the neighbourhood. It will increase noise, traffic, and people.

- 2. M. and J. Thorpe, Langley residents, expressing concern regarding having their tranquility disrupted by a business running on ALR land.
- 3. S. and S. Scott, Langley residents, expressing concerns regarding increased noise, traffic, using ALR land, lack of parking, and too many wineries in the area.
- 4. K. Van Spronsen, a Langley resident, submitted a 47-signature petition opposing the winery.

# **Explanation by the proponent:**

A. Chema and R. Slight, Otter Trail Wineries, were in attendance and commented that this will be a small winery, and that the 64 seats extra seats being requested will be in a lounge area so that food can also be offered. 30 seats will be used for wine tasting only. No outdoor parties will be offered and the noise level will be very low. This will be a very quiet, dignified venue with minimal outdoor lighting.

#### **MOTION**

That Council has considered and ENDORSED the request by Otter Trail Winery to locate a 96 seat winery lounge (64 seat interior bistro and 32 seasonal patio seats) and special event area serving the Otter Trail Winery located at 5974 - 248 Street, Langley, characterized as having liquor service from 11:00AM to 10:00PM Tuesday through Sunday.

In ENDORSING this request, Council deems that it has considered and found acceptable the location of the winery lounge; the proximity of the winery lounge to other special or recreational facilities and public buildings; the person capacity of the winery lounge; the hours of liquor service of the winery lounge; potential traffic, noise and parking impacts; zoning; and the impact on the community if the application is approved.

In ENDORSING this request, Council has considered the views of area residents expressed to Council at a Liquor Licencing Hearing held on September 14 and 21, 2020 at the Township of Langley Civic Facility (Fraser River Presentation Theatre), 20338 – 65 Avenue, Langley, BC, the minutes of which and written submissions provided by the public being attached to this resolution.

ENDORSEMENT of this request is subject to compliance with Municipal Bylaws and Policies and Liquor Control and Licensing Act Regulations."

# 2. Consideration of a Township of Langley RCMP Detachment

# Whereas:

- A. The Township of Langley continues to endeavour to continually improve its provision of law enforcement services to the members of the community that is directed and relevant to the unique issues within the Township of Langley;
- B. A RCMP detachment responsible solely to the Township of Langley would ensure that issues within and unique to the Township of Langley take first priority, and that all law enforcement resources and management attention would be dedicated only to Township of Langley residents, businesses and issues, not those within another municipality; and
- C. The City and Township of Langley Policy Capital and Operations Cost Sharing Agreement includes terms for the eventual separation of the services of the RCMP for the Township of Langley and the City of Langley if reasonable and appropriate to do so.

Therefore be it resolved that:

- Council direct staff to prepare a report as soon as practical, but in time for 2021 budget deliberations, outlining the costs associated with terminating the Cost Sharing Agreement between the Township of Langley and City of Langley for the provision of law enforcement services;
- The report include, but not be limited to, a review of the Termination Section of the City and Township of Langley Policy Capital and Operations Cost Sharing Agreement;
- 3. The review specifically outline, in accordance with the cost sharing agreement, the purchase costs to be potentially paid to the City of Langley as given in the Cost Sharing Agreement, including, but not limited to:
- a. 35% of the replacement cost value of the Langley RCMP Detachment building, alterations and equipment;
- b. Less 35% of the depreciation rates for the Langley RCMP Detachment building, alterations and equipment;
- c. The determination of the depreciated replacement costs be calculated from 1993, the year of the signing of the Cost Sharing Agreement to the potential date of termination within 2020 or 2021; and
- d. An assessment of the additional expense potentially to be incurred by the City of Langley as a result of the termination, not to exceed 2% of the depreciated replacement cost.
